Fourteen per cent of the cotton classed was reduced in grade due to bark or grass. Staple lengths for the past week show 13 per cent 31's, 34 per cent 32's, 24 per cent 33's, 18 per cent 34's, and 7 per cent 35's and longer.

The micronaire readings were better than the previous week with 2 per cent reading 3.4 and below and 98 per cent reading in the desirable range of 3.5 - 4.9.

Cotton prices for the past week remained steady with farmers offering moderately. Prices paid range from 26.00 27.25 cents per pound (hog round) for most grades offered with staple lengths of 32's through 34's.

provides information that most people would not expect. Some of these, he noted are: yield-tables which give average yields for each soil type, special soil characteristics, such as tendencies to corrode pipes or cause cracking in buildings, or the feasibility of septic tank filter fields.

Several soil types were used to show the need for conservation practices, such as terraces, waterways, contour rows or minimum tillage.

Risinger said the use of soil survey information is important in locating facilities such as Munday and Benjamin sewage plants or Knox City sanitary landfill to prevent contamination of our underground water supplies. He told how knowing their soil types aids farmers in planning terraces, waterways, or irrigation practices, also helping ranchers in selecting grass varieties or stock ponds.

Risinger said the Knox County Soil Survey field work would be completed in July 1974, but until that time any needed soil information could be obtained by contacting him at the SCS office in Knox City.

O'Brien Bulldogs Lose In Bi-District Playoff

The O'Brien Bulldogs, 9-0 in regular season play, were eliminated from playoff competition in a Bi-District clash at Coleman last Thursday night. The Mozelle Mustangs, with outstanding size and speed, demolished the Bulldogs' hopes of a perfect season by a score of 92-55.

The Bulldogs, never really playing the inspired ball which had characterized their efforts through the season, jumped to a 15-0 lead. The Mustangs rebounded to bring the score to 15-8 at the end of the first period. First quarter scoring came on a 21 yard play from Danny Del Hierro to Arly Watson a 2 yard run by Louis Conn and extra points by way of kick by Rayland Hayes, and a pass from Louis Conn to Steve Figueroa. O'Brien continued to hang on in the second period as Louis Conn scored on a 6 yard jaunt. Del Hierro on runs of 1 and 11 yards and Steve Figueroa scored on a recovered Mozelle fumble in the end zone. Hayes' kick was good on two of these occasions to give O'Brien a half time lead of 43-38.

In the first 46 seconds of second half play Mozelle scored 16 points, and from that point on the Bulldogs' poise dwindled allowing the Mustangs to score a total of 92 while the Bulldogs only scored twice in the second half.

Scoring for O'Brien the second half was Hayes on a 12 yard pass from Del Hierro, and Orlie Flores on a 13 yard pass from Del Hierro. It was a discouraging loss for the Bulldogs but last year lettermen Steve Figueroa, Bobby Summers, Albert Alsidis and James Washington can all be commended for leading the Bulldogs to the second undefeated regular season in a row. This leaves a challenge for the 14 returning lettermen and the seniors of the 1972 squad. The 1972 squad must commit themselves to the goal of establishing a mental and physical toughness which will allow them to play winning football and advance farther into the playoffs. The Bulldogs would like to thank the cheerleaders, pep squad, Mrs. Veta Reid, the student body, and the community in general for their outstanding support this season.

The boys will now be concentrating on basketball and with only a short time to prepare, the Bulldogs take on Throckmorton in the Seymour tournament today, Thursday, at 5:00 p.m.

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Once-Condemned Colt Has Happy-Ending Story

He'll never stand in the winner's circle as he was once destined to do, but Top Moonshine — championblooded racing quarterhorse condemned to death two years ago is alive and well in a Lubbock pasture. He is even kicking.

At three months the colt with bloodlines from Tip Moon and the Depth Charge line was valued at \$5000. A short time later he was worthless, fit only to "be put away".

One minute he was a frisky colt rearing back from his first halter, the next he was a worthless bundle of horseflesh, with a badly broken hip bone. A horse had kicked him and the rearing completed the break.

Today, he is being broken to riding and handling with a bright future ahead of him—in a horse pasture, not on the race track.

"It's like fairy tale," Wayne Qualls, who is training Top Moon, said. He got in on the story almost from the first.

On the day that the colt was to die two years ago a fellow who loved horses and had raised a few pets of his own happened by. On the long chance that the colt could live to pass on its heritage to offspring that could run, if he couldn't, Clyde Day bought the colt for \$25. He invested another \$25 in a goat to be mother to the colt.

It took a while, but the motherly tendencies of the goat won out over the reluctance of the hungry colt.

With the help of some friends including Qualls, Day created a crutch with a padded circle to brace the hip. He bored five holes in Top Moonshine's hoof and attached a metal plate on the crutch end as he would a horseshoe.

When the crutch came off and the colt preferred grass to milk, the scene shifted to a Knox County pasture where the colt roamed in a cow pasture for a year.

Without a place to keep the growing horse, Day decided to sell him, getting \$500 from John Nichols of Rochester who had plenty of graze and a desire for some racing quarter-horses.

Riding hadn't been in the picture until recently, when Nichols decided that a horse that could outrun all his others could be ridden.

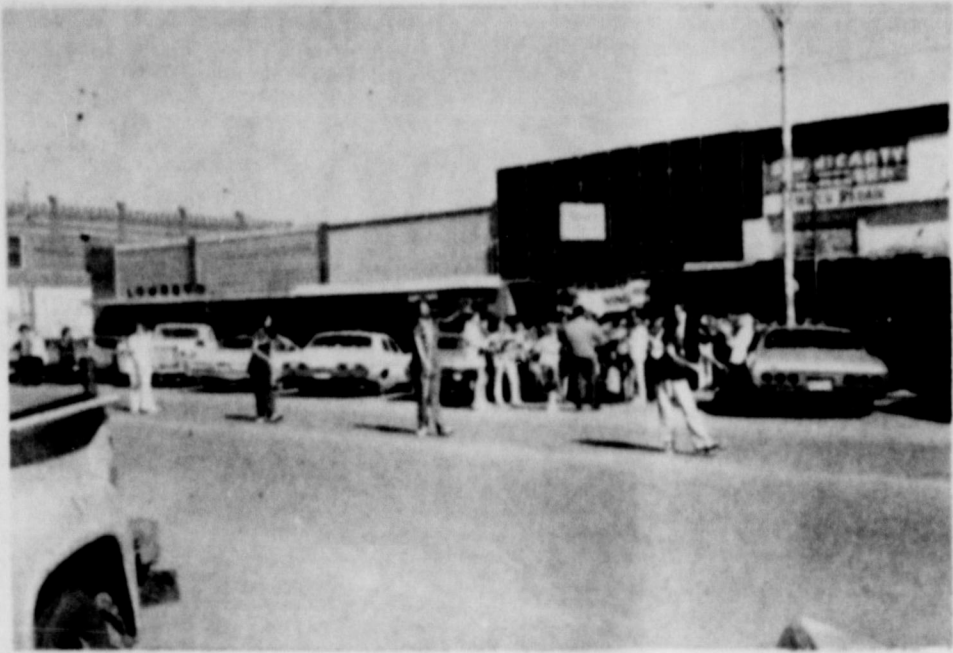

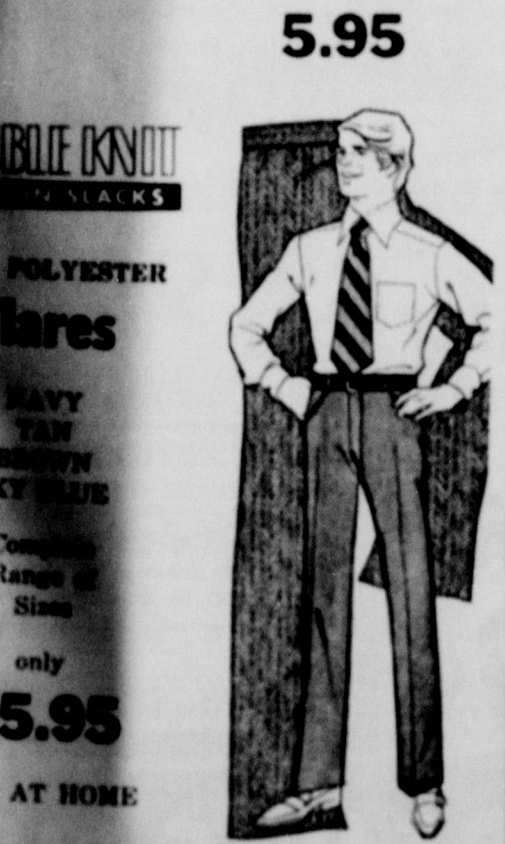

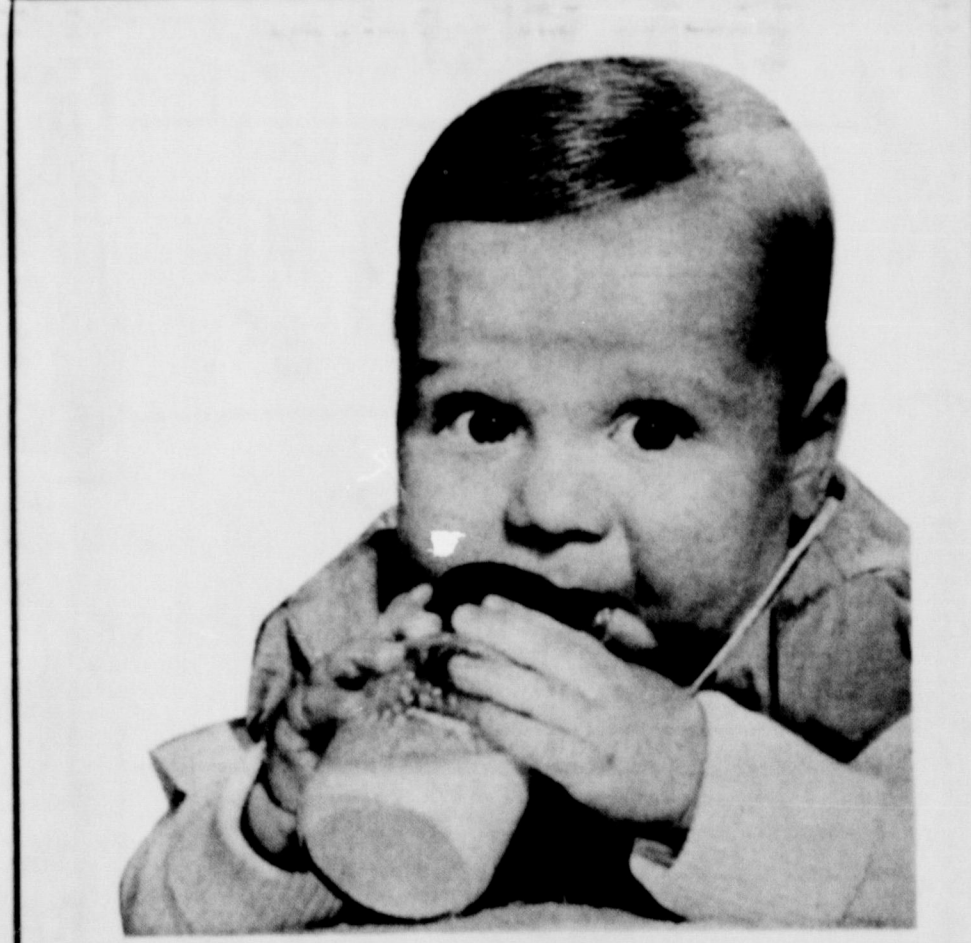
