in their natural leaders by holding the latter up to contempt, ridicule and obloquy.

4. Always preach true democracy, but seize power as fast and as ruthlessly as possible. 5. By encouraging government extravagance, destroy its

credit, produce fear of inflation with rising prices and general discontent.

6. Foment unnecessary strikes in vital industries, encourage civil disorders and foster a lenient and soft attitude on the part of government toward such disorders.

7. By specious argument cause the breakdown of the old moral virtues, honesty, sobriety, continence, faith in the pledged word, ruggedness.

Cause the registration of all firearms on some pretext with a view of confiscating them and leaving the population helpless."

It reads like today's newspaper, doesn't it? It was written years ago. Communistic goals are set as far off as 100 years. Our goal of preserving freedom must be worked at with as strong a set of rules and the set of rules must come from each person in the form of their personal values.

Time Running Out For Some On Insurance

Time is running out fast for about 200,000 of the Nation's elderly people and the Social Security Administration has no way to get in touch with them. Some of these people may be living here in the Knox City and Munday area, Edwin Draughon, social security district manaiger, said today.

They are people 65 and over who have never signed up with the Social Security Administration for either cash benefits or for hospital insurance under Medicare, and who may lose their last chance to enroll in Medicare's doctor bill insurance if they wait until after March 31.

Mr. Draughon urged relatives and friends of these older people to remind them that for those born October 1, 1901 or earlier, this will be their last chance to get the protection that helps pay physicians' and surgeons' bills and other medical expenses. Those born during the last 3 months of 1901, in 1902 or 1903, will have to wait a year for another opportunity. Over 95 percent of the 19.7 million people 65 and over were enrolled in this program that supplements the basic hospital insurance under Medicare as the open enrollment period began on January 1 of this year. The Social Security Adminis-

tration has addresses for 800,000 of the estimated 1 million not yet enrolled for the doc tor bill insurance becasue they have been issued cards showing that they are eligible for the basic hospital insurance. But the agency has no addresses for the 200,000 who have never applied to establish their eligibility.

Last month, the Commissioner of Social Security sent letters to the 800,000 reminding them of the open enrollment period. With the letter was a card for the person to send back marked "yes" or "no".

Older people not signed up for the voluntary medical insurance who did not receive such a letter and card, should fill out the coupon printed below and mail it in a sealed envelope to the social security office, Or, if they wish, they may call or write for information. CONTROL OF PEACH TWIG BORER

The larvae of the peach twig borer attack the developing shoots of peaches and plums in late winter or early spring when trees reach the pink bud stage of growth. The larvae feed on one shoot and then another caus ing wilted shoots and, later. dead blackened tips on shoots. Later generations attack peach fruits, either penetrating to the pits or hollowing out areas beneath the skin up to one-fourth inch in diameter. The fruit of early maturing plum trees is rarely attacked.

Insecticide applications applied at the petal fall and shucksplit stages, as well as the first, second and third cover sprays, also control other major insect pests of peaches and plums, These pests are the catfacing insects (stink and lygus bugs) and the plum curculio,

Timing of insecticide applications as well as the insecticides recommended for control of peach and plum insects is contained in the Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Diseases on Fruits and Nuts. This guide is available at your county Extension agent's office,

VA Benefits Tax Exempt

The Veterans Administration reminded veterans today that VA benefits are generally tax exempt and need not be reported as income on federal or state income tax returns.

Except for interest earned on GI insurance dividends left on deposit with VA (which is a reportable item), all proceeds from GI insurance policies are tax exempt.

Other major items of income that need not be reported include educational assistance allowances, pension and compensation payments, subsistence payments to vocational rehabilitation trainees and grants for special automobiles and "wheelchair homes" for the severely disabled.

Also tax exempt are all benefits to surviving dependents of deceased veterans and compensation allowances for dependents of disabled veterans.


