He is married and has one child.

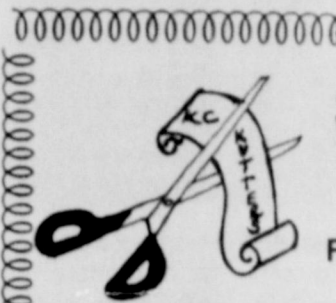

The State of Texas House of Representatives Austin, Texas May 5, 1975

Dear Friend: Enclosed you will find the Fiscal Note of what the present School Teacher Pay Raise Bill will cost the next five years. This will undoubtedly increase local school taxes tremendously and if passed in the present form, would create a large State Tax Bill.

I am of the personal opinion that the local school taxes in my District are about as high as we can afford, and would appreciate your thoughts relative to increasing the local school taxes. Your immediate reply by letter or phone will be appreciated.

The probable cost of implementing the provisions of the bill during each of the first five years following passage is estimated as follows:

1976	\$ 838,281,000
1977	977,113,000
1978	1,207,062,000
1979	1,271,824,000
1980	1,270,611,000

Wanted By The F.B.I.

The Dallas office of the FBI, through its Special Agent in Charge, Mr. J. Gordon Shanklin, has announced it is again in need of clerical employees to fill the positions of Clerk, Typist, and Stenographer at Bureau Headquarters in Washington, D.C. These positions present an excellent opportunity for young people, male or female, who are at least 16 years of age, United States citizens, and who have at least a high school education, provided they can pass a rigid investigation of loyalty, reputation, and character, and are in good physical condition. No previous experience is required.

The entrance salary for a Clerk is \$5,996 (GS-2) per year with a raise in thirty to ninety days to \$6,764 (GS-3) per year, if their work is satisfactory. A twenty word Spelling test must be passed to qualify for the Clerk position.

A Typist starts at \$6,764 (GS-3) per year. Applicants for the Typist position must pass a five minute typing test of 40 words per minute and a twenty word Spelling test.

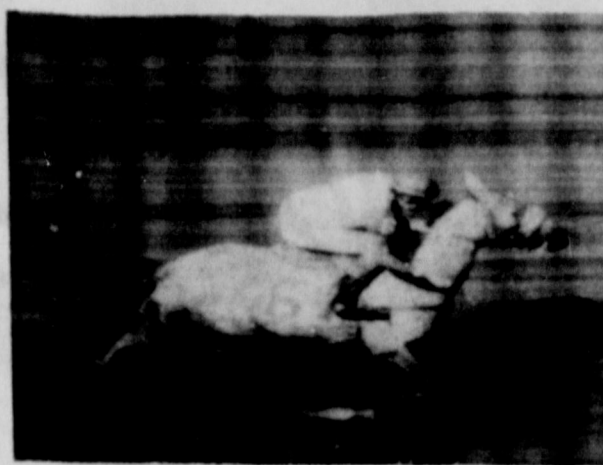
