I am of the personal opinion that the local school taxes in my District are about as high as we can afford, and would appreciate your thoughts relative to increasing the local school taxes. Your immediate reply by letter or phone will be appreciated.

The probable cost of implementing the provisions of the bill during each of the first five years following passage is estimated as follows: Fiscal Additional

Year State Cost \$ 838,281,000 977,113,000 1978 1,207,062,000 1979 1,271,824,000 1,270,611,000


