Work After 65 Can Now Mean Higher SS Checks

Comming work after age 65 can now mean higher monthly social security retirement checks according to Henry Chustz, manager of the Vernon social security office, llevers changes in the social security law provide an increase of 1-13th of one precent for any menth between ages 65-73 in which a person does not get a retirement check because of his work and is otherwise eligible for payment.

The increase amounts to one percent a year; so if a worker communes to be employed until he is 72 old he will have received a seven percent increase,

Chastz pointed out that this increase is in addition to any raise due because of the amount of the yearly earnings.

In order to receive the annual increases, a worker must be emittled to retirement benefits for the first time at age 65 or later, be fully insured under social security, and sorking for wages of self-employment. His income must prevent him from receiving a social security check for the month.
