Be it remembered, that the Honorable Commissioners' Court convened in regular session, on May 8th, 1961, with County Judge L. A. Parker, presiding, and all members of said court being present, as follows:

J. V. Carver, commissioner, precinct 1, W. W. Trainham, precinct 2, J. B. Eubank, precinct 3, and George Nix, precinct 4.

George Nix made a motion seconded by J. B. Eubank, that all Justice of the Peace fee reports, and also all county bills which were approved to be paid out of the following funds, to-wit: Precinct No. 1 Fund No. 600 (1) Precinct No. 2 Fund No. 600 (2) Precinct No. 3 Fund No. 600 (3) Precinct No. 4 Fund No. 600 (4), Salary Fund No. 200, General fund No. 300, be given to the County Clerk and she be authorized to issue warrants on these bills, a list of which is given below. All voted in favor of the motion.

City Council Hires O'Brien Council Chief Of Police Elects New City Secretary At Meet

Knox City's City Council held their regular meeting Monday, May 1, at the city hall. Wednesday, May 10, a called meeting was held. Below is the minutes taken from the two meetings:

Monday, May 1, regular meeting.

All council members present—Mayor Guy Glenn, and aldermen, A. T. Holcomb, Otis Cash, Dr. Charles Markward, Monty Penman, Vaughn Gruben, and City Attorney Joe Reeder.

Discussion was held on the hiring of a new chief of police after the resignation of Eddie Carr.

Called before the city council to be interviewed were Donald Skiles, Billy Golden, Mutt Ivie, and J. J. Hester.

Motion was made by Vaughn Gruben and second by C. G. Markward to raise the city secretary's salary by \$12.50 per month.

All voted in favor of the motion.

This was the end of the regular session.

CALLED MEETING

A called meeting was held Wednesday, May 10.

Attending the meeting were: Mayor Guy Glenn, and aldermen Monty Penman, Otis Cash, A. T. Holcomb, and Dr. Charles Markward.

Absent: Vaughn Gruben. Motion was made by Monty Penman and second by A. T. Holcomb to accept the resignation of Eddie Carr as chief of police.

Penman, Cash, and Holcomb voted to accept the resignation and Markward didn't vote.

Motion was made by Otis Cash and second by Monty Penman to hire J. J. Hester as chief of police at \$300 per month.

All council present voted in favor of the motion.

Motion was made by Dr. Markward and second by A. T. Holcomb to have O. H. Bartley draw up a new map of the city.

All council members present voted in favor of the motion.

Motion was made by Monty Penman and second by A. T. Holcomb to install street lights where needed.

All councilmen present voted in favor of the motion.

O'Brien Council Elects New City Secretary At Meet

In a called session on May 10, the O'Brien City Council elected Adelle Herring as city secretary-water superintendent, replacing Sam Johnston, who had resigned two days earlier.

Herring, a 1952 graduate of O'Brien High School, has been living in Rule recently. He will move to O'Brien in time to take over his job by June 1.

Johnston will remain in his present position until June 1 and help train Herring.

Herring was hired at \$250 per month and necessary car expenses outside of O'Brien. He is to stay at the city hall to collect water bills the first five days of each month, send out bills, keep books on all city accounts, install meters, keep water pump going, chlorinate the water, clean up around all city property and repair water lines.

He is to get help when needed on repair jobs. The water pump is on manual operation at this time but will be hooked up on automatic, if possible, in the near future. He also is responsible for assessing taxes.

The council adopted a policy of requiring a two weeks notice in case of quitting the job and training the replacement. It also will serve a two weeks notice in case it replaces an employee.

At the May 8 meeting, the council paid its bills, accepted the resignation of Mr. Johnston, and voted not to raise the tax rate for this year.

Those present at both meetings included aldermen Dwayne Johnston, Ikie Ray, L. A. Covey, Dave Cummings, Clyde Covey and Mayor Elvin Mathis.

Sam Johnston was present on May 8 and Adelle Herring on May 10.

O'Brien City Council has regular meeting on the second Monday of each month.

Notaries Public Must Re-Qualify By June 10

Secretary of State Frank Lake announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1963 must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1961 and June 10, 1961.

Lake emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Anyone not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk now and May 20. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of re-appointing present Notaries.

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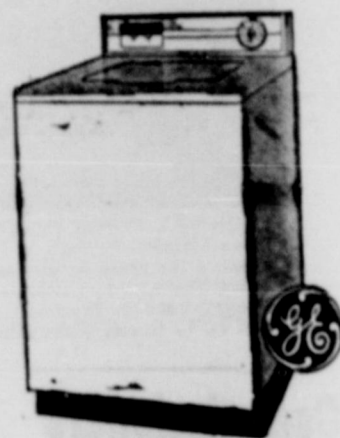

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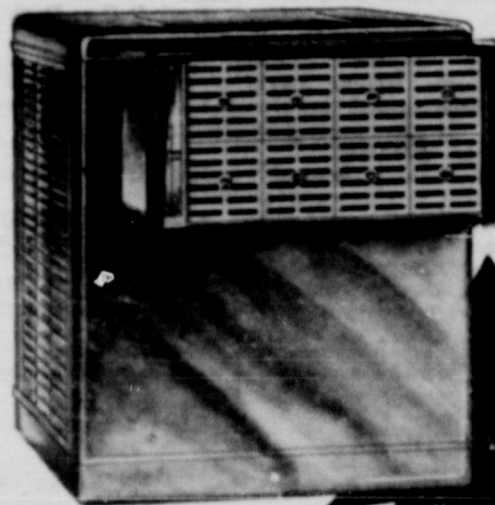

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex. — A showdown is near in the 57th Legislature's money-raising battle.

Final round apparently will be between Gov. Price Daniel, who is anti-general sales tax, and a Senate group, which has indicated leanings toward a sales tax.

Sen. Wardlow Lane of Center, chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, also is serving as chairman of a subcommittee to consider the House-passed sales tax bill. Other members are Senators Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi, Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo, Jep Fuller of Port Arthur and Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells.

Speaking before a Senate committee hearing on the sales tax bill, the governor minced no words in saying he would veto it . . . or anything similar to it.

He urged consideration of a "packaged bill" that would levy selective sales or excise taxes in eight areas. Affected would be gas pipelines, motor driven tools and appliances, jewelry, utilities, stock transfers, soft drinks, beer, liquor and restaurant meals.

This plan, said the governor, would bring in \$166,000,000 a year — enough to cover the general appropriations bill, pay raises for teachers, and leave a nest egg for next time.

HOUSE VOTES TEACHER RAISE — House gave one of the biggest votes of the session to a bill that would give teachers the full \$810 a year salary raise they seek.

Rep. L. DeWitt Hale's bill was approved 143-4 and sent to the Senate.

It would raise the minimum pay for teachers with a bachelor's degree to \$4,014 and for master's degree teachers to \$4,239. Yearly increases for experience would be doubled, from \$54 to \$108.

Superintendents and principals would receive from 20 to 40 per cent more than the base for classroom teachers.

JOBLESS AID INCREASED — A bill to increase unemployment pay, both in amount and duration, received preliminary House approval.

Rep. Tony Koriath of Sherman is original sponsor of the much-amended bill. It would raise maximum weekly payment to the jobless from \$28 to \$35 and increase from 24 to 30 weeks the period during which an unemployed worker would receive state help. It would require that the applicant be out of work for one week before receiving unemployment compensation.

Bill would cost employers an extra \$6,000,000 to \$8,000,000.

CD BILL FILIBUSTERED — A proposal to give the Legislature emergency powers in event of enemy attack came in for attack itself in the Senate.

Sen. Culp Krueger of El Campo is sponsor of the proposed constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to fill offices made vacant because of enemy attack. A first offered, it also authorized the Legislature to "take such measures as may be necessary," even to suspension of the Constitution.

Opposing the bill were Sen. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo, the constitution's most vocal defender, and several other senators.

Even with the offending phrase deleted, the measure was approved by only a 14-to-12 vote. Two-thirds approval is needed for a constitutional amendment.

HOUSE REDISTRICTING OKAYED — Legislature is moving slowly ahead with the politically painful task of realigning the state's congressional and legislative districts to conform with the 1960 census.

House has given final passage to a bill re-shuffling the House districts. It will increase the number of city representatives and

reduce the number of rural representatives, but in general, the city members will represent about twice as many voters as the rural members. The increase is due to the constitutional limit of one representative to 100,000 in urban areas.

If the House bill is finally enacted, a number of representatives will have to retire or run against another House member whose district has been combined with theirs.

House also got two congressional redistricting bills out of committee after passage of a "hurry up" resolution. Texas is due one extra congressman, for which Dallas County is vigorously bidding.

Senate action on a bill to rework the senatorial districts has been slowed by Sen. Jep Fuller's filibustering objections.

ESCHEAT BILL FAILS AGAIN — House voted 72 to 60 in favor of letting the abandoned property bill remain abandoned.

This bill was defeated earlier in the session, despite Governor Daniel's insistence that he would call a special session, if necessary, to get it passed. Rep. Chas. Hughes, sponsor of the measure, tried to get it called up and put on the calendar for a second time, but was turned down.

Bill would set up machinery whereby the state could take over property or bank accounts of persons who die or disappear without heirs. Governor Daniel has estimated it would bring the state some \$17,000,000.

SPLIT JURY BILL ADVANCED — A bill to allow less than unanimous jury verdicts in civil cases — an issue on which the legal profession is sharply divided — was approved by the Senate Jurisprudence Committee.

Under the bill, 10-to-2 verdicts would be allowed.

Opponents of the bill say it would cut away at one of the safeguards embodied in trial by jury. Supporters say it would reduce needless delays and hung juries caused "by one block head."

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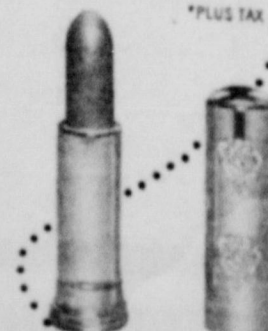
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PLEAD FOR PRISON FUNDS

State Board of Corrections is making a last stand before the conference committee on the appropriations bill to get more funds for the prison system.

Texas prison situation is "explosive," said Director O. B. Ellis, who warned the possibility of riots unless the board gets funds for needed improvements. Crowding three men into six-by-eight foot, one-man cells and requiring 72-hour workweeks for guards were cited as examples of the problems.

Appropriation measures passed by the House and Senate give the Department of Corrections about \$19,000,000, compared to the \$24,000,000 it requested.

Conference committee is the "court of last resort" for those seeking changes in a bill. Each house must vote on the conference committee report on a "take it or leave it" basis.

LOAN BILL PANEL NAMED — After weeks of argument and delay, the Senate State Affairs Committee sent the problem of small loan regulation to a special subcommittee.

On the committee are Sen. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo, chairman, Senators Abraham Kassen Jr., of Laredo and George Parkhouse of Dallas.

Senator Hardeman is Senate sponsor of the House-passed small loan bill which would regulate loans of up to \$3,000 and would allow charges ranging up to 40 per cent.

Representatives of small companies making loans of \$100 and less have urged a different — and apparently higher — scale for loans in this category.

TRADING STAMP BILL HEDGED — Proposed legislation to outlaw the use of trading stamps would be unconstitutional, Atty. Gen. Will Wilson ruled.

Wilson ruled that prohibiting trading stamps would go beyond the authorized power of the state. Proposed bill, said the opinion, cites no reason why use of trading stamps could be considered a danger to the public interest.

SPOTLIGHT ON HIGHWAYS — Need to avoid "hardening of highway arteries" will be emphasized during Highway Week in

Texas, May 21-27.

State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer noted these warning signs:

1. More than one-third of Texas' total highway mileage is obsolete.

2. Building of farm-to-market roads (now a 33,000 mile system) has outpaced the money to maintain them.

3. Revenue from road user taxes (on gasoline, etc.) is constantly in danger of being diverted to uses other than highways.

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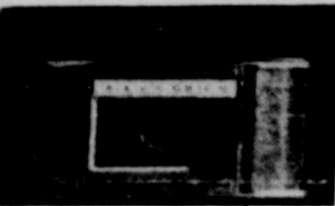

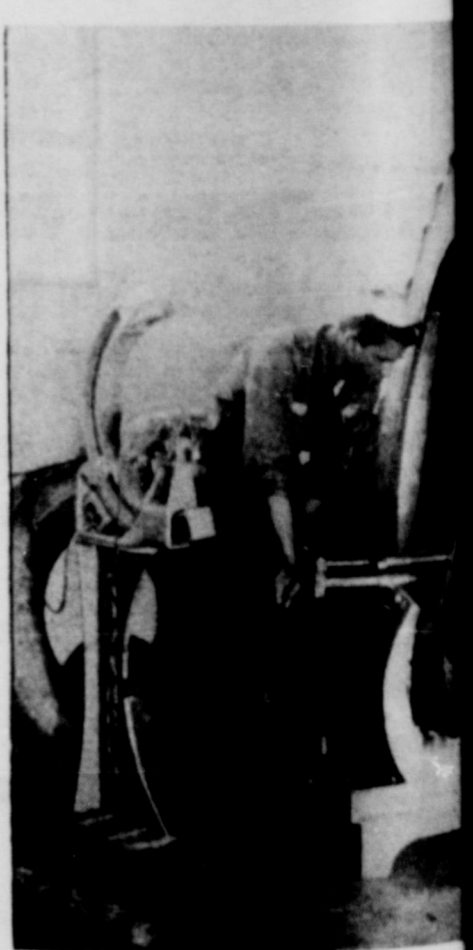
