ever, you will still owe the doctor money, because Medicare will pay only 80 per cent of the reasonable charge. Also, there is a \$50 deductable for each calender year. which you must bear before medicare starts to pay.

Mr. Draughn emphasized that your doctor is not required to accept an assignment. He has the right to ask you to pay him direct, and file the claim yourself




It has been held and garrisoned at various times by Spain, Mexico, the Republic of Texas, the Confederacy and the United States.
