A long-range battle plan against rampaging polio was outlined this week by the State Department of Health. State Health Officer Geo. W.

Cox recommended these eight points of action in combatting the disease which this year is striking harder at Texas than at any other part of the nation.

1. Spot spray insect breeding places after they have been cleaned up and destroyed. Indiscriminate spraying might destroy a few insects on the wing. but it won't do the job. It might think about cleaning kill valuable plants and create a false sense of security.






