## J. TOM GRAHAMS RETURN HOME AFTER LONG EUROPEAN TOUR

With cardboard covering the holes in the bottom of their walking boots, J. Tom and Carmen Graham returned to Knox City last week at the end of a three-month hitchhiking tour of 12 European countries.

The couple, son and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Graham of Knox City and Mr. and Mrs. Otho Gillmore of Dallas, traveled from Dallas to New York, then through Iceland, Luxembourg, Germany, Austria, Italy, France, Spain, Morocco, England, Belgium, Holland and East Germany before returning to New York—and hitchhiking almost all of the way.

"Since we were hitchhiking," J. Tom said, "we were forced to travel light. The pair of boots we had on were all we could take, and even though they were new when we left, only nubs were left on the bottoms by the time we got home."

"Hitchhiking means a lot of walking anyway," he continued, "but a few times we got stuck on 'scenic routes' and had to hoof it as far as 10 miles. Our biggest difficulty was thumbing from Atlanta to New York in January during what the Easter papers were calling the worst snow storm in 60 years."

But despite the sore feet, the Grahams said that they didn't regret hitchhiking.

"We rode with almost 200 people all over the world and learned a lot more about them and their countries that way," Carmen said. "Besides hitchhiking forced us to try to communicate, to use all the cognates and sign language at our command."

The couple listed the most interesting points of their trip as: —Their visit to Dachau, the prison camp near Munich where the furnaces and gas shower baths used to exterminate the Jews are still intact.

## Cropland Program Signup Continues

Arnold J. Navratil, chairman of the Knox Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminded farmers today that signup for the new Cropland Adjustment Program is still open, even though signup dates for the wheat, feed grain, and upland cotton program signup have already closed.

The program is designed to fill a need not quite met by the annual acreage allotment and diversion programs in achieving and maintaining supply-demand balance for farm products. It is also expected to provide more hunting, fishing, and other opportunities for outdoor recreation.

CAP is especially attractive to farmers who want (1) to shift from production of surplus crops to other activities, (2) to retire gradually from farming while continuing to live on the farm, (3) to continue working off the farm, or (4) to take advantage of other local employment opportunities.

Farmers participating in CAP will receive adjustment payments related to the value of the crops normally produced on the land, and conservation cost-share payments on the land diverted.

The Chairman reported that so far four farm operators in Knox County have applied for agreements under CAP. These signed applications involve about 542.0 acres of cropland. Farmers who are interested in diverting acreage under a long-term rather than an annual agreement are urged to delay filing a CAP application.

The final date to sign application in the cropland adjustment program is May 13, 1966. There is also a limitation on the total acreage within a county or trade area which may be placed under such agreements.

## Area Receives Much-Needed Rain

Even though the recent rains were a little too late for some wheat farmers, the entire area richly benefited from the most general rains received in several years.

The slow, gentle rains began Friday morning and continued through Monday, with the heaviest amount falling Monday afternoon. Gauges in Knox City showed between 3 and 4 inches for a total amount. Areas to the southeast of town received about 3½ inches, and the official rain gauge located at the SCS Plant Materials Center northwest of town recorded a total of 4.84, 2.51 of this amount fell Monday afternoon between 4 and 7 p.m.

Two inches of this amount fell within an hour's time in a strip approximately two

miles wide and covered a distance of about six miles, according to Arnold Davis, manager at the plant center.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN — Candidates for statewide offices are getting set for the final week of their campaign. Democrats will vote at their May 7 primary for seven statewide offices.

Spotlight has been on the race for attorney general. Candidates are Galloway Calhoun of Tyler, Crawford Martin of Hillsboro and Franklin Spears of San Antonio. Spears pledges efforts to improve law enforcement. Martin is emphasizing his 27 years' experience as a lawyer and his long service as state senator and secretary of state. Calhoun identifies himself as the "only real conservative" in this race.

All three candidates are eyeing the large number of voters who apparently still are undecided despite their long campaigns.

Gov. John Connally, seeking a third term, virtually has ignored attacks on his administration by Stanley Woods of Houston. The third candidate for governor, Johnnie Mae Hackworth of Brenham, has not actively campaigned.

Bill Hollowell of Grand Saline, running as Woods' ticketmate, is opposing Lt. Gov. Preston Smith.

Paul B. Haring of Goliad is waging a spirited campaign against incumbent Railroad Commissioner Byron Tunnell of Tyler.

Attorney General Waggoner Carr is opposed by political newcomer John R. (Jack) Willoughby of Houston for the U. S. Senate nomination.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has opposition from Fred Williams of Del Rio.

Only contested statewide judicial race is between incumbent Court of Criminal Appeals Judge W. T. McDonald of Bryan and District Judge John F. Ormon of San Antonio.

Light voter interest is expected to be reflected in a predicted 50 per cent voter turnout.

POPULATION — Texas is growing at the rate of 1.5 per cent a year. UT's Population Research Center reports.

An estimate of population shows that there were 10,336,141 Texans April 1, 1965. This is a gain of 756,464 over the 1960 census.

Irrigated farming areas in the High Plains produced the two fastest growing counties, Randall and Deaf Smith. Respective growth rates are 7.7 and 7.1 per cent a year. Hartley County in the top of the Panhandle, has gained 7 per cent a year.

But Texans still are moving to town. Study shows that the 21 metropolitan counties, which contains cities of 50,000 or more, gained 637,374 of the total. Only three of the 21 failed to gain. They are Midland, Ector and Cameron counties.

POLLUTION — Population growth essentially is to blame for growing problems of stream pollution. For example, the state water plan, soon to be released, predicts that Fort Worth and Dallas will be discharging 750,000 acre feet of waste water a year into the Trinity River.

This prediction has the Texas Water Pollution Control Board looking for ways to require cities and industries to treat their wastes so they will not cause pollution. Board must adopt a plan for maintaining good quality water in all Texas streams by June 30, 1967, or Federal agencies will take over the job.

Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, has appropriated \$25,000 to be used, with matching money from the Pollution Control Board, to devise a work plan for a \$4 million study of how to keep the Galveston Bay Stream clean.

COLLEGES — Population growth produces more college students. Coordinating Board forecasts that enrollments in 17 state colleges and universities will double by 1978 — from 115,015 to 260,097.

This determination was made for the purpose of splitting up the \$156,000,000 Texans will pay in the next 12 years on the 10-cent per \$100 ad valorem tax to finance college buildings at the 17 schools. Schools in the University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems get their building money from their permanent fund endowment.

A \$20 million bond issue to finance the first two years of student loans under an overall \$85 million state program was approved by the Board.

TOURISTS — Texas Highway Department reports that 12,688,000 tourists visiting Texas by car in 1965 spent \$613,148,000 — 16.4 per cent more than in 1964.

Gov. Connally, pushing for tourism, pointed out that when air, train and bus visitors are added to the total, it shows that \$907,000,000 was spent by the

## Free Lite-A-Bike Taping Saturday

All bike-drivers are urged to bring their bicycles to the city park Saturday, April 30, for taping with the same reflector tape that is used on traffic signs and license plates.

This bicycle taping is part of a nation-wide campaign to reduce bicycle-automobile casualties and is brought to Knox City residents by Girl Scout Troop 57.

Taping will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday. Troop 57 has in hand enough Scotch Lite tape to tape 400 bicycles. This tape is furnished all over the nation for this campaign by the Veterans of Foreign Wars. In the past two years this organization has distributed \$1.6 million worth to local groups sponsoring "Lite-a-Bike."

Parents of children 5 to 14 are reminded that in 1964 there were 690 bike-vehicle-fatalities and 34,000 non-fatal-injuries. Most of the bike riders were under 14. Most of the accidents occur in the dangerous dark, or near dark hours.

Troop 57 Girl Scouts ask each rider to learn the following rules, copied from a recent National Safety Council Bulletin.

1. Unless there is an ordinance specifically covering bikes, bicycles are legally considered vehicles and must obey all applicable state and local laws.

2. Cyclists must ride on the right side of the street with the flow of traffic, not on the left side facing traffic.

3. Use of hand signals is now commonly accepted as a safe driving practice.

4. To turn left at intersections in business areas or where there is heavy or high-speed vehicular traffic, a bicyclist should dismount and follow the pedestrian crosswalk to the far right corner, then proceed across at right angles.

These are just a few safety points the cyclist should be aware of in his increasingly important role as a bike "driver."

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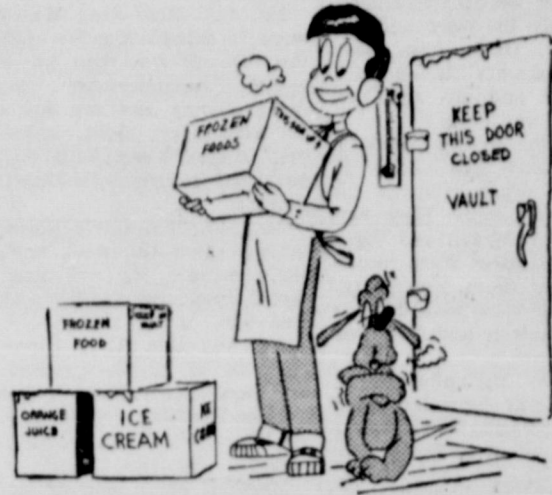

God has given us five rules of life to govern our relationship with each other. The first is: "Thou shalt not kill." (Ex. 20:13). It is a violation of God's law but as to what God does about one who so breaks His law we leave to Him and we know now what the results are. God reserves the judgment for Himself. He takes into account all the circumstances and one's mental responsibility. Murder is prohibited. This law can be broken in many ways. By disobeying the rules of health, exposing ourselves to needless physical risk, working conditions, improper housing, and harmful pleasure.
