## S. N. REED SEEKS TO IMPROVE COTTON SEED AND MILK STOCK

S. N. Reed was in town one day this week to get out literature about his famous Half and Half cotton. He now has a permit to ship seed into Oklahoma as well as into Arkansas. He has shipped a few car loads but most of his seed goes to individual farmers in smaller shipments and thus receives a wide distribution. Mr. Reed is looking for a fine fullblood Jersey milk cow to come in that he ordered from a fancy breeder at Dublin. Mr. Reed says he believes we should build up the milk strains of this country in preparation for the whole milk market which he expects to come in the future. The sale of whole milk for cheese making requires high producing cows if one seeks a fair margin of profit. A good many of the better types of cows are appearing in the country and in a few years their presence will be felt decidedly. The bull circle established here more than a year ago has added new blood from high producing strains of register of merit and pedigree sires and dams. It may look a long way off to some but we predict that in a few years the milk pail and egg basket will be as staple here as cotton and maize is now. The former does not have to yield its place to the latter but they will be worked together and to a decided advantage at that.

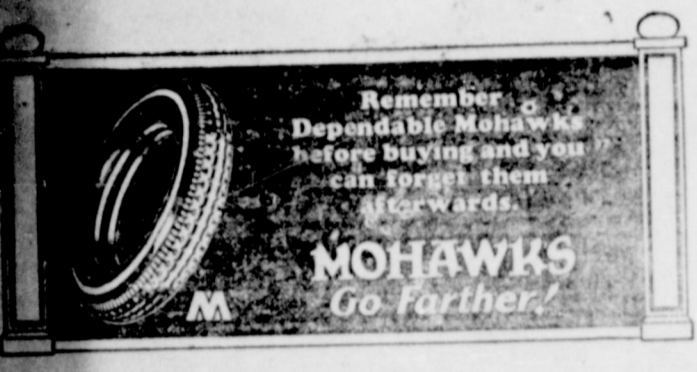

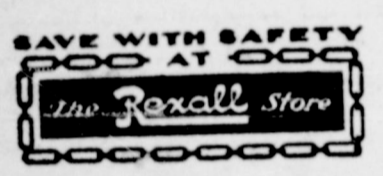

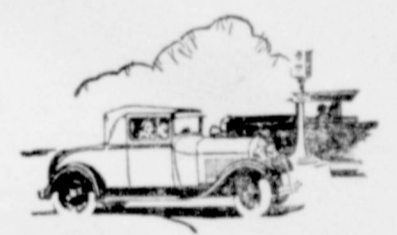

were used to hold

the shaft and worm to-  
gether. The steering worm  
sector is forged and ma-  
chined in the same piece  
with its shaft.

The housing of the steer-  
ing gear mechanism is made  
of three steel forgings, elec-  
trically welded together.  
This housing is then electri-  
cally welded to the steering  
column. Such a one-piece  
steel unit is naturally much  
sturdier than if several parts  
were used and bolted or riv-  
eted together.

Throughout, the new Ford  
steering mechanism is so
