## ROUND UPS

Texas, the nation's greatest agricultural State, shared most generously the expenditures by the agricultural adjustment administration from May 1933 to June 1936. According to an itemized report released by the AAA, the Lone Star State in this period received \$157,211,490. Iowa ranked second on the list with \$109,017,546.

Celebrating the second annual Railroad Week, the Nation and Texas give thanks to the mode of transportation that brought this civilization out of wilderness of ox-carts and stagecoaches to a faster and more dependable means of dispersing humanity and building material. Without the railroad, we would be as progressive as our ancestors were at the founding of the state of Texas. The rail makes it possible for us to ship grain, cotton, and cattle to distant markets and thereby receive greater dividends. The Texas Railroad, Navigation, and Banking Company was chartered in 1836, but because of the financial panic of 1837 and of political opposition, its stock never was sold.

Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen, who last week married a member of the Danish King's lifeguards like her illustrious father believed that boys and girls of today should be trained for better citizenship by enlightening them of the workings of our government. Once, at her own expense, she took a boy and girl from each of eighteen counties of Florida, of which she was representative, to the Nation's Capitol. There she took them to all interesting points of the city, pointing out the functions of the three branches of government.

A record popular vote in the November presidential election has been predicted by William Tyler Page, minority clerk of the House, who has been watching the balloting for years. Page thinks that there will be from three to five million more votes cast in the coming election than in 1932, when there were thirty nine million.

The "unloaded gun" took the lives of two Texans this week. It seems that people can not be educated against the old evil to take heed to any gun.

Persistence of strikes in the French provinces are keeping France in a state of unrest. A gain of 225,000 new members has been reported by the general confederation of labor. Altogether it was estimated that 100,000 workers were still absent from their jobs in spite of reports of strike settlements in scattered sections throughout the nation.

"The darkest hour in any man's life is when he sits down to plan how to get money without earning it," said Horace Greeley.

Benjamin, the county-seat of Knox County, was named for Benjamin Bredford, son of the founder of the town. Goree was named for Captain R. D. Goree, Confederate soldier who died at Riverside California in 1922 and is buried at Knox City. Munday was named for Ruben Polk Munday, pioneer citizen.

The fixed assets of the Texas Prison System are placed at \$4,015,023 on December 31, 1935. The prison farms produced 4,401 bales of cotton last year.

## GRADY WOODRUFF WILL SPEAK IN QUANAH SATURDAY 3:00 P. M.

Invading the western end of the district after five days of intensive work in the eastern sector, Senator Grady Woodruff of Decatur, candidate for Congress from the 13th Congressional District, will speak in Quanah Saturday at 3:00 p. m. In Vernon the same afternoon at 5:00 o'clock, and will finish the day and the week with an address at Electra Saturday at 8:00 p. m. On Friday at 12:30 p. m. he will fill his regular engagement on KGKO at Wichita Falls.

Speaking in Gainesville at a county-wide rally of Cooke county supporters Wednesday night, Senator Woodruff warned his hearers against the "fear inspired political falsehoods" which are being circulated by hired scoundrels "who are paid to put out this propaganda by men who do not dare say them from the platform." Cauley; a half sister, Mrs. Minnie Gipson; Will McRayner a step-brother, all of Hopkins County, and three half-brothers, Ike McBrayer of Hopkins county, and R. K. and R. W. McBrayer of Knox City. She is also survived by 21 grand children, and four great-grand children.

## ED GOSSETT SPEAKS TO KNOX CITY VOTERS

District Attorney Ed Gossett of Vernon spoke here in the interest of his campaign for Congress. In his speech, Gossett emphasized the agricultural plank of his platform, stating that agricultural prosperity was the backbone of national prosperity. He suggests that a national farm program should include provisions for: Parity prices for farm products, widespread ownership and stability for family sized farms, a better scientific research program to discover new uses for agricultural products and to reduce the cost of plant diseases and insects; he further advocated farmer controlled and directed governmental machinery through which farmers can cooperate and through which they can have equal rights with other classes and benefits of government.

Gossett emphasized the need for a better program of law enforcement and character building. He discussed the peace problem, suggesting that war could be made much more improbable and peace much more certain by a determined effort to barricade the roads that lead to war.

Gossett has stated that we need: Fewer offices and better officers. Less and better business in government. Straight thinking and straight action; Slight, hindsight and foresight; More light and less noise in politics; To punish dishonesty in all its forms; The Golden Rule in Government.

Gossett called upon his hearers to remember that: The dole endangers the soul. Men not machines have built this country; Character is determined by action not words; Opportunity to earn wealth should be shared; Public employees should be more carefully selected than private ones.

In connection with his personal history and background, District Attorney Ed Gossett stated that he was a graduate of the farms of Texas and of the University of Texas from which institution he finished with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1924 and a Bachelor of Laws degree in 1927.

Gossett is 34 years of age, and has made an enviable record as District Attorney in Poard, Hardeman and Wilbarger Counties. In an aggressive manner, Gossett insisted that he has the age and experience for sound judgement, the youth and energy for effective action, the ideals and determination for notable public service.



Cover and bake in food crate oven (375 degrees F.) for 15 minutes uncovering casserole during the last 15 minutes to brown crumbs. Serves 6. This is good with pork or ham."

**ERNEST O. THOMPSON FOR RAILROAD COMMISSIONER**

Ernest O. Thompson was appointed to the Railroad Commission of Texas by Governor Sterling on June 14, 1932, succeeding Pat M. Neff, who resigned to become President of Baylor University. The East Texas oil field was discovered in September, 1930, and its vast size, underlying 183 square miles, soon upset the world's economic and price structure of petroleum. Efforts at legal production control began in August, 1931, with martial law and a called session of the Legislature to make applicable laws. Railroad Commission control began in September, but martial law continued until the summer of 1932. Operators were in a cut-throat war of frenzied production. Many stubbornly opposed any legal control. The mad race brought enormous expansions, the number of wells doubling in the last three months of 1931 and doubling again in the next six months reaching 7,000 by July, 1932.

This was the situation when Thompson became a member of the Railroad Commission. The first problem of the Commission was to write orders under the law that would stand up in the courts. Fluctuations in market prices are an index to the solution of this problem. At the time of the East Texas discovery the price of oil was \$1.10 per barrel. It dropped to 25 cents, rose to 95 cents, and finally climbed back and stabilized at \$1.00 and is now \$1.15. These movements successively indicated first the demoralization from the first flood of oil, then the steadying from early control; then the shattering of control when the law broke down in the courts and finally the tightening again when the Legislature and the Commission guided by court decisions were able to make and write orders that would resist attacks of their constitutionalists.

While the Railroad Commission has no authority to fix prices, Commissioner Thompson personally has been firm in his view, all through this industrial turmoil, that the consumers' interest is equally important with the producer's, and has opposed any policy that would create false price movements.
