Democratic Committee Sets Election Filing Fees

The Knox County Democratic Executive Committee has figured the approximate cost of the Democratic primaries at \$2,500 and notified each candidate of his proportionate share of the costs, according to Leroy Melton of Benjamin, committee chairman.

Deadline for paying filing fees is midnight Saturday, May 19, Melton said. If a candidate fails to pay the fee his name will be

omitted from the ballot. Fees for county and precinct office-seekers amounts to 6 percent of the office's annual salary.

The offices, costs of filing, and candidates' names, in the order they will appear on the ballot, are as follows:

Missionary Film To Be Shown at Foursquare Church

The motion picture, "Beyond the Bells," will be shown at the Foursquare Church in Knox City Sunday night, May 20 at 8 o'clock, it was announced this week by the pastor, Rev. Floyd Bailey.

"This motion picture," Rev. Bailey said, "is a fascinating true life story of a missionary's work among the Sirionose Indians. After seven years of hardships, almost beyond endurance, in the primitive swamps and jungles of Bolivia, a modern day marvel occurred. God performed two miracles for the missionary.

"The transformation of a tribe of Indians from savage heathenism to civilized Christians unfolds in beautiful color. This dramatic story was filmed in the beauty and darkness of the 'Green Hell' country of Bolivia.

"The story ends as the missionary, Jack Anderson, inspired by the desire of his own converts that many more of their people should hear the gospel, mounts a mule to ride off into the distant jungle in search of other roving bands of Indians.

"The challenge of this film is tremendous," the pastor concluded. "It has been acclaimed one of the greatest missionary films ever produced. Everyone in the Knox City area is urged to see it Sunday night."

School Board to Study Revised Plans For Heating System

The Knox City school board will meet in special session Tuesday night to study revised plans for the heating system in the new high school building which is now under construction.

Present plans call for individual room radiators, as are now used in the elementary building. The new plan is forced air heating from a boiler located outside of the building. The plan was submitted to the board by Clowe and Cowan of Aparillo through the Rowland Plumbing Co. of Vernon, plumbing contractors for the new construction.

A furniture showing and bidding will also be held Tuesday night. Furniture equipment firms have been notified and several have indicated plans to have displays at the school and representatives at the board meeting.

The furniture will be displayed in the high school library by 4 p. m. Tuesday so that it can be inspected by the teachers, who will make recommendations to their principals. The principals will, in turn, make first, second and third choices to the board.

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WICHITA FALLS NEWSMAN PANS FARM PRICE SUPPORT PROGRAM

Glenn Shelton, farm editor and columnist for the Wichita Falls Times and Record-News, roundly criticized the farm price support program at the Wednesday meeting of the Knox City Lions Club.

Shelton was introduced by B. B. Campbell, Knox City banker.

Prefacing his talk with the remark that he knew his stand was not popular, but that he could speak his mind because he was not in a popularity contest, the speaker said that the farm problem is very complicated, but that he has given it a lot of thought and is convinced that the farm programs of both political parties is wrong.

"I am convinced," he said, "that practically all legislation that comes out of Washington is politically inspired, and I am disgusted with both the Republicans and Democrats for what they are doing for farmers. I do not believe in the government feeding anyone—newspaper man or farmer—and I do not believe the farmer wants a hand-out."

Shelton said price supports—even rigid supports at 90 percent of parity, are no good and will not solve the problem. On the contrary, he said, they are bad for the farmer in the long run.

He attributed the present farm surplus to the fact that during the war American farmers were called on to feed not only their own country, but England and many other countries. American farmers still strive for peak production, he added, but world agricultural production has continued to increase until last year it was 119 percent more than before the war.

"When we quit having to feed other countries we began to have a surplus," he continued, "but Congress didn't have the moral courage to stop price supports when they should have been stopped.

"Our gigantic surplus is what is causing the problem. It costs the taxpayers \$1 million a day to store and maintain the surplus. Also, although many of them do not realize it, it cost the farmers \$3 billion last year.

"The government can hand out all it wants to to farmers, but it will only be a temporary measure. I believe Congress should try to find new markets for the surplus, and tamper with the farmers as little as possible.

The speaker contended that the problem will eventually solve itself, by the less efficient farmers leaving the farms. At the same time he said production will not

drop, because agriculture is becoming more efficient every day.

"We are losing farmers, but not farms," he said. "Knox County has lost 143 farmers and has only 837 farmers, and the average size of farms in the county has increased from 515 acres in 1950 to 689 acres in 1955.

"Farmers who leave the farm will go into industry and we will all live better as a result."

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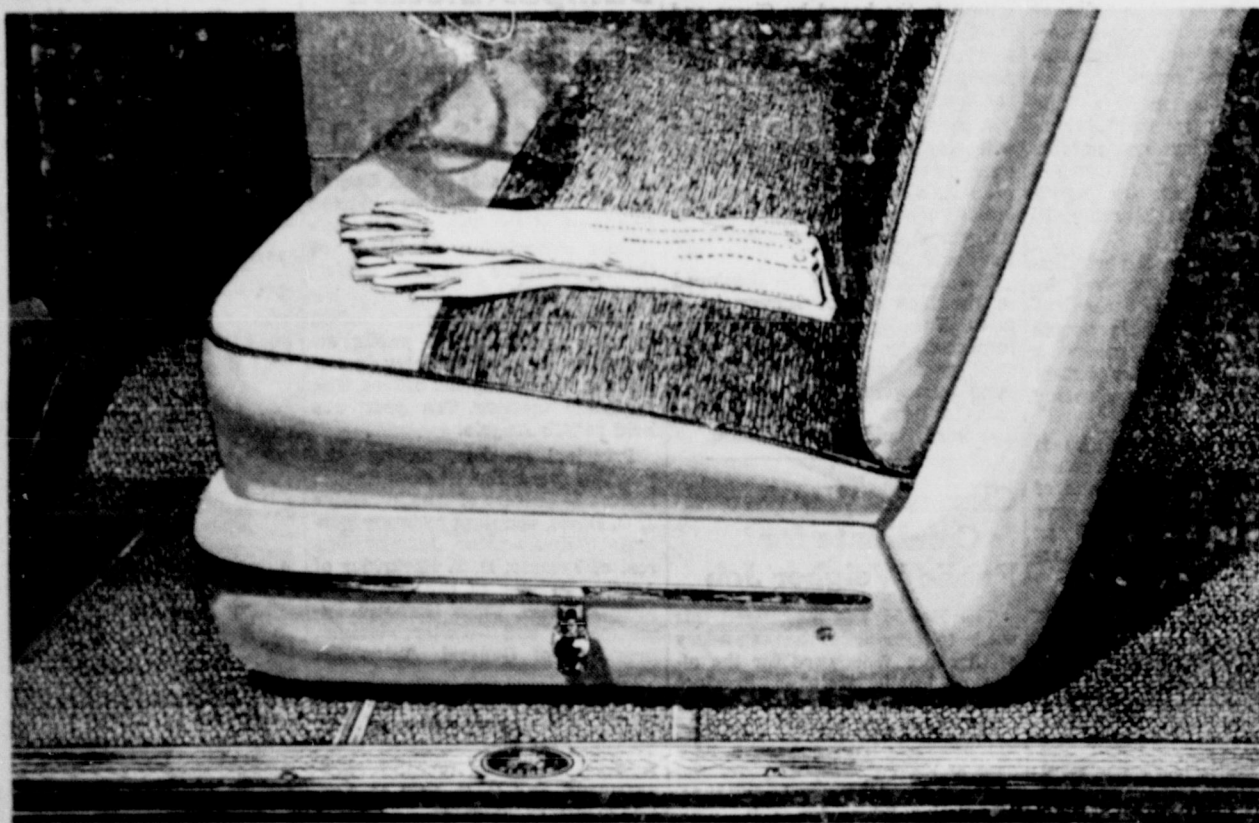

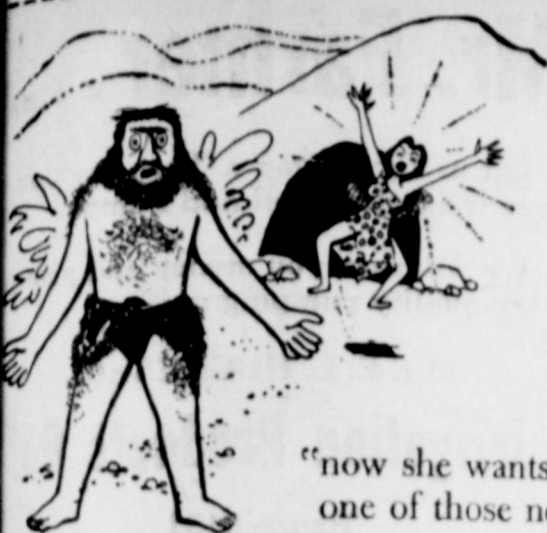

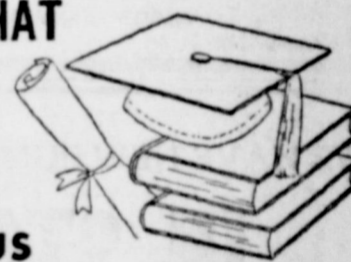

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SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



Now is the time to start planning the soil improving crops you plan to plant this spring. Many different soil improving summer legumes are adapted to the various soils in the district.

Guar is an excellent summer legume, adapted to all cultivated soils in the district. It is a summer annual that is very drought resistant. The seeds are now being rolled and used as a protein supplement in livestock feeding. Guar should be planted during the months of May, June, or early July. Six to eight pounds of seed per acre should be planted when seeded in rows. Row seedings can be done with planters used for combine sorghums. The seed should be covered from one to two inches deep, on land prepared in the same manner as for cotton or grain sorghums.

Cow peas is another annual legume adapted to most cultivated soils in the district. They develop a fair cover and are good in conditioning the soil. Cow peas should be seeded during the months of April, May, June or early July at the rate of 10 to 12 pounds per acre when planted in rows. When planted in a mixture with grain sorghums 5 to 10 pounds should be planted. About 25 to 35 pounds per acre should be planted when the peas are close drilled.

In order to obtain the best results legumes planted should be inoculated with the proper inoculate.

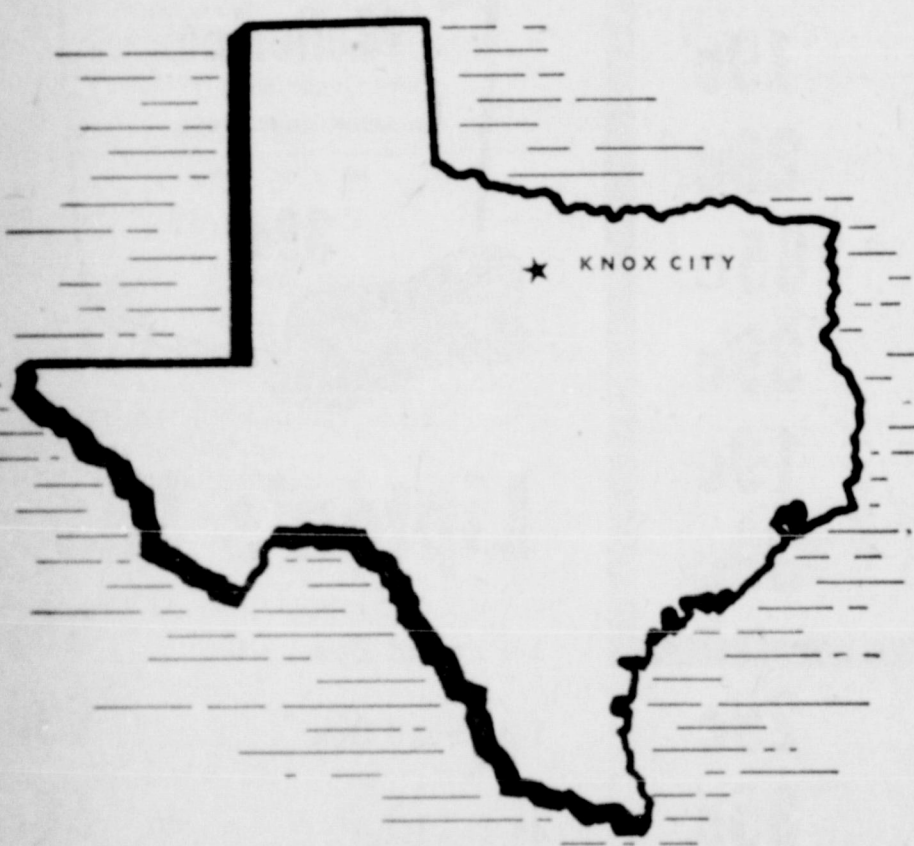

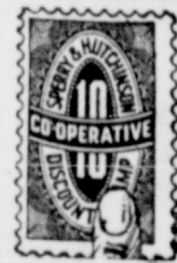
