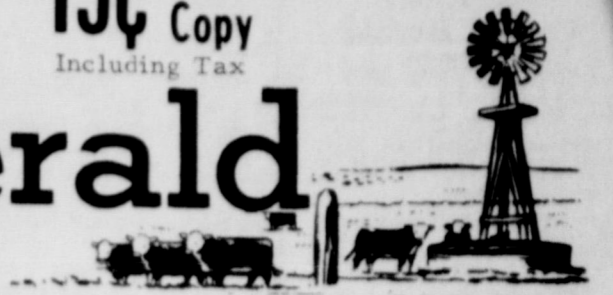

Knox City's own Kathi Kent was crowned the 1972 West Texas Fair Sweetheart Wednesday night of last week during the Sonny James Show at the Taylor County Coliseum in Abilene.

The seventeen-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Kent was chosen from a group of nineteen candidates who were sponsored by area Future Farmers of America chapters and 4-H Clubs. Miss Kent was sponsored by the Knox City FFA and Leon Burkham, advisor.

Miss Ginger Rodgers of FFA, 1971 fair sweetheart, relinquished her crown to the Knox City senior, and Dr. R. Lee Rode, president of the fair, presented Kathi a dozen red roses and a heart-shaped pendant centered with a diamond. Kathi will also receive a college scholarship and will reign over the '72 fair.

First runner-up was Marilyn Marshall of Tuscola and second runner-up was Riva Hitt of Rochester. Kathi and her mother were guests at a brunch on Saturday, August 28, at the Westwood Club where the nominees were interviewed by a panel of six judges and the 1971 fair sweetheart. Contestants, judged on achievements, scholastic ratings, personality, and beauty, were presented a gold charm as a souvenir by the West Texas Fair Association. The judges also were present for the coliseum shows on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday nights for further judging on appearances.

Myers Accepted At UT Medical Branch

Jerry K. Myers, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Myers of Knox City has been accepted for admission to the 1970-71 freshman class at the School of Medicine at The University of Texas Medical Branch.

He is one of 173 students accepted into the freshman class.

Jerry, a 1967 Knox City High School graduate, is married to the former Susan Reese. He graduated from North Texas State University at Denton with a bachelor's degree in Chemistry and is a member of the medical fraternity, Psi Chi. The Galveston Medical Branch, the sixth largest medical school in the nation, enrolled a total of 653 medical students at various levels of their four year training. Approximately 266 other students have also enrolled at UTMB in the School of Allied Health Science, Graduate School and Clinical Branch School of Nursing.

Located on an 80 acre campus, the Medical Branch is one of the largest single concentrations of medical, scientific and professional people in the Southwest. The school's nine hospital complex has facilities for more than 1200 patients.

Pete Elliston, local soil conservationist, delivered the program at the regular Wednesday meeting of the Knox City Lions Club.

The program was designed to inform the people about practices and programs of the Soil Conservation Service that are implemented by working through local conservation districts.

Elliston stressed continued need for brush control and pasture improvement. Emphasis also was placed on cropping systems, tillage methods, partial terracing, waterways and critical area shaping.

Also discussed and explained was the function of the small watershed program administered by the Soil Conservation Service.

SMALL GRAIN SEEDING

Several people have been asking when to plant wheat or oats since the armyworms have become a problem. I feel the producer should first consider if he wants to produce fall and winter grazing or if he is planting only for the grain crop.

In considering only the grain crop, October 10th to November 1st is considered a good planting time. For a fall and winter grazing crop the producer may consider his possibilities are better even by having to spray for armyworm control by planting in early September or as soon afterwards as will fit in his schedule.

Close attention should be given to small grain when it comes up as the armyworms can severely damage a stand in 2 or 3 days.

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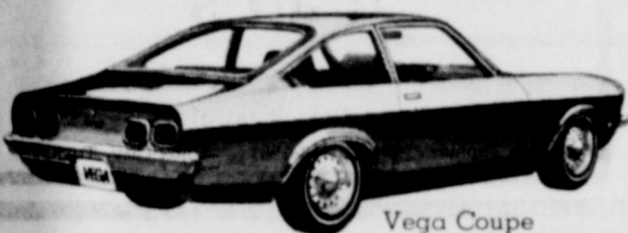

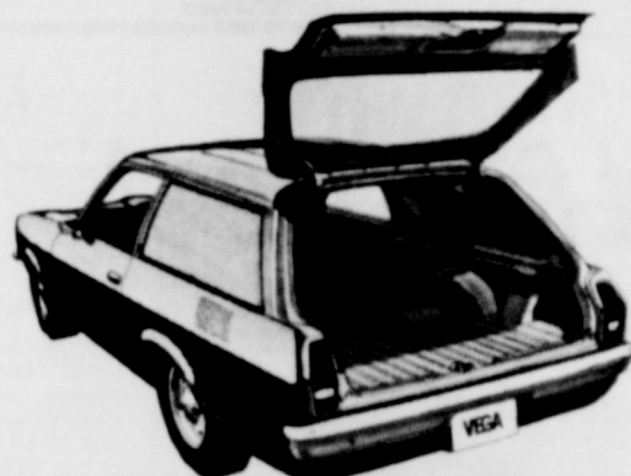

Legal Notice

TEXAS LEGISLATIVE SERVICE, 8-27-175.
S. R. No. 249 AS FINALLY PASSED AND SENT TO THE GOVERNOR.

AN ACT relating to the recording and rerecording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties, each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act, all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months, only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be reregistered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this act. 9-2-4tc.

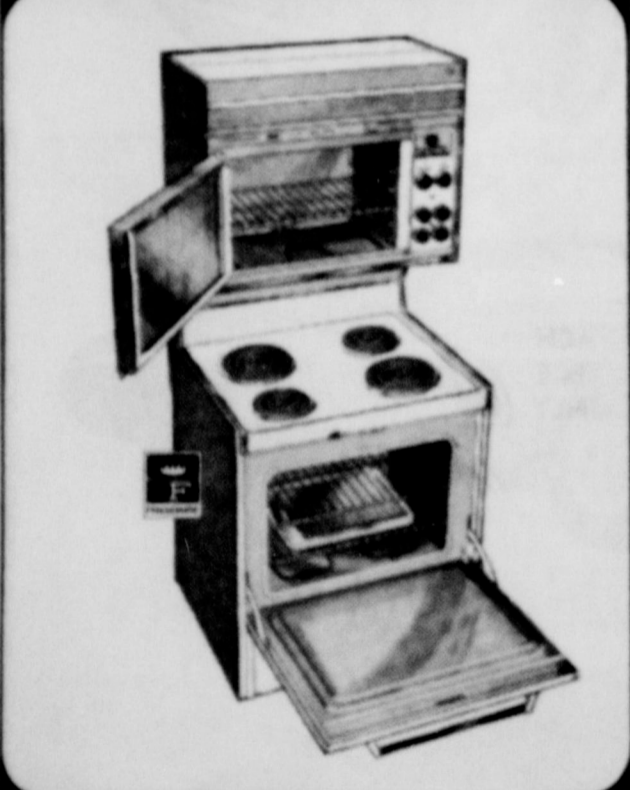

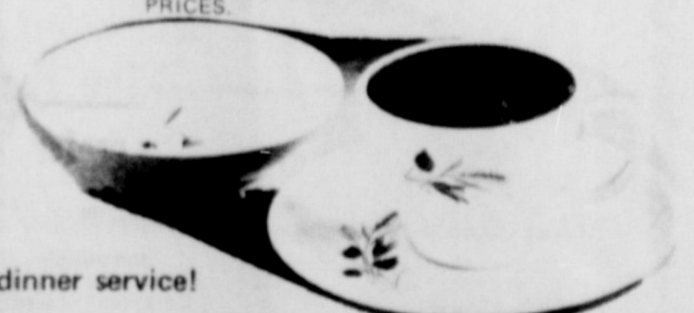

August Accidents Injure Twelve In Knox County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of August, according to Sergeant J. W. Garner, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in 12 persons injured and some killed.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1971 shows a total of 48 accidents resulting in one person killed and 62 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for August, 1971, shows a total of 581 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 400 persons injured. This was 17 more accidents, 13 less fatalities, and 76 more injured than during July.

The 25 traffic deaths for the month of August, 1971, occurred in the following counties: Wise, five; Gray and Potter, three

each; Garza, Hale, and Carson, two each; Baylor, Crosby, Montague, Parker, Briscoe, Castro, Randall, and Roberts, one each.

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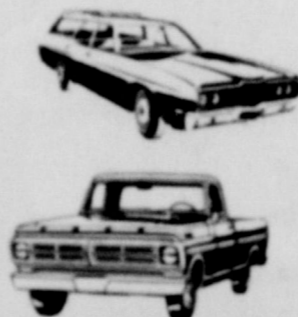

Hearty, Well Balanced Breakfast Keeps Persons Alert All Morning

College Station - A hearty, well-balanced breakfast will keep you alert and ready for work all morning, reports Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist. After a long night's sleep, the body needs a chance to refuel from dinner the night before. Breakfast provides this refueling process, Mrs. Clyatt explains, and enables you to turn out more work in the late morning hours. Also, you won't tire as easily and your reactions will be quicker.

A "refueling" breakfast must be a basic breakfast, the specialist points out - one that provides from one-fourth to one-third of the day's nutrient requirements. Planning a nutritious breakfast can be easy if you follow a basic pattern, such as the one developed by food nutritionists. This pattern consists of fruit, cereal with milk and/or egg, bread and butter, and milk. The quantity of each can be adapted to the size and activity of the individual, but the types of foods needed are the same for all.

If breakfast menus at your house have fallen into a rut, Mrs. Clyatt suggests checking the pattern. Think of all the juices, fresh fruits and melons,

ready-to-eat cereals and breads on the market; and how many different ways an egg can be prepared. Then surprise the family with a hearty morning meal that will spark them with new energy.

Accent on Health

J.E. PEAVY, M.D., Commissioner of Health

Of all diseases, tuberculosis is probably man's oldest and most puzzling enemy. It remains a major public health problem in many states today, including Texas.

"Texas is recorded as having the third largest total of new, active tuberculosis cases in the nation last year," says Dr. James E. Peavy, Texas Commissioner of Health.

Today, with careful diagnosis and conscientious drug treatment, the chances of curing tuberculosis are very good, no matter what the stage of the disease. Great advances in treatment have brought TB under medical control. But don't get the idea that TB is now a rare disease. It isn't.

Tuberculosis affects 37,000 new patients each year and kills over 5,000 people. In 1970, Texas recorded 2,889 new cases of the disease, placing behind only New York and California in the number of new cases reported. At the beginning of 1971, there were nearly 20,000 cases on the TB register in Texas being kept under surveillance.

Today, over 300,000 people in the United States are under medical care or supervision for TB. More than 100,000 of these have active cases of the disease.

"That's why medical and health authorities view the situation with concern," Dr. Peavy said.

Actually, the high rate of new TB cases in Texas is due to the Health Department's intensive new program of searching out and diagnosing cases of tuberculosis. Progress is being made in reducing the rate of occurrence. The number of cases recorded in 1970 actually fell almost 100 cases from the number reported in 1969 and was over 300 cases down from the number reported in 1968.

The highest incidence of new cases in Texas occurs in the very large cities and in areas near the southern border.

TB can be cured, but it is a long, tedious process. Recovery from tuberculosis, unlike many other diseases, takes months or sometimes years. Although other drugs have been useful in the past, the Texas Health Department is optimistic that a new oral anti-tuberculosis drug promises to be a significant development in tuberculosis therapy. Known as "rifampin," the drug was developed by a team of Italian scientists, and has been available in this county since last May.
