WASHINGTON, D.C. -- Congressman Omar Burleson announces a \$79,966.59 Office of Education grant to the State of Texas for 548 children in Knox County.

These funds will provide services for children residing in low-income areas who have need for special educational assistance in order that their level of educational attainment may be raised to that appropriate for children of their age.

The allotment of these funds for fiscal year 1975 were made available under the provisions of Part A of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.

## Bicentennial Inaugurated Here

Knox City's tenth annual Chamber of Commerce banquet Thursday night placed special emphasis on the bicentennial theme and officially inaugurated the community's bicentennial celebration.

John Anderson, assistant director of the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Texas, was on hand to present state and national certificates of endorsement to Mayor Buddy Angle and Mrs. Doris Crowover, Knox City's bicentennial chairmen.

Mrs. Crowover received the endorsement and Mayor Angle was presented the national certificate officially recognizing the town as a bicentennial community.

Following the bicentennial ceremony, Lois Dunlap of Abilene, executive director of

"Uncle Sam in Action", spoke to chamber members and their guests from Haskell, Munday, Stamford, Seymour, Wichita Falls, and Knox City.

Dunlap, attired in his red, white and blue Uncle Sam costume, explained that his sole purpose in the Uncle Sam in Action program is to teach and promote Americanism, patriotism, and good citizenship in every fact of the American society with special emphasis on youth.

"Uncle Sam in Action", chartered as a Non-profit organization in Abilene, has 24 outstanding citizens who serve as its governing body.

Uncle Sam stressed the importance of participation in elections, citing instances in which one vote made the difference in an issue.

Another part of his speech brought applause from the banquet guests when he questioned revenue sharing, asking "just what revenue do we have to share?" He explained, however, that if we must live with revenue sharing, more of it should go toward the construction of youth facilities.

He concluded by saying, "We live in the greatest country in the world. We are blessed to be American citizens."

## KC Scouts Add New Plants On Nature Trail

Boy Scout Troop 161, with the assistance of the Soil Conservation Service, has started a project of establishing new plants on the Wichita Brazos S.W.C.D. Nature Trail, located on a four-acre tract on Farm to Market Road 2279 west of Knox City on the Bush & Burnett property.

Soil Conservation Technician Danny Bell and Scoutmaster Joe Clonts selected the plants and instructed the scouts on proper planting methods.

The plants, furnished by David Lorenz, manager of the Knox City Plant Materials Center, and Lynn Pace, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department employee at the Center, consisted of Prairie Cordgrass, Eastern Gamagrass, Indigo Bush, Skunk Bush, Four-Wing Salt Bush, and Englemann's Daisy. They were placed in different locations

so the natural look of the Nature Trail would be preserved.

Following the planting of the plants, water was carried from a near-by stream for watering the new plants.

The Nature Trail is used as an out-door class room by students and other interested parties to show conservation examples and a place to identify plants and animals.

"The Soil Conservation Service is proud to be able to work with the Boy Scouts of America and other organizations interested in our natural environment. Organizations such as the Boy Scouts have done a great deal to help preserve our natural resources, and Scoutmaster Joe Clonts is doing a fine job of teaching the young people the need for Conservation in working with our environment," stated a spokesman.

## Knox County Accidents Are Investigated

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of February, 1975, according to Sergeant J.W. Garner, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and no persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first two months of 1975 shows a total of 12 accidents resulting in no one killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for February, 1975, shows a total of 435 accidents resulting in 12 persons killed and 199 persons injured as compared to February, 1974, with 322 accidents resulting in ten persons killed and 208 persons injured. This was 113 more accidents, two more killed, and nine less injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

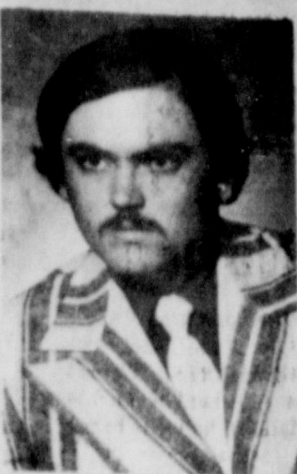

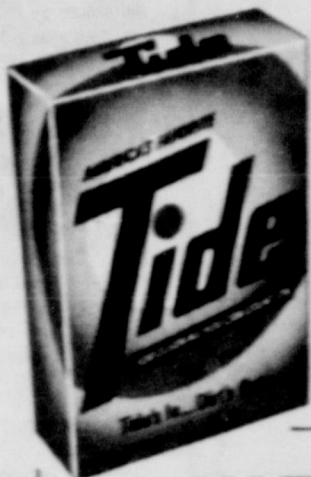

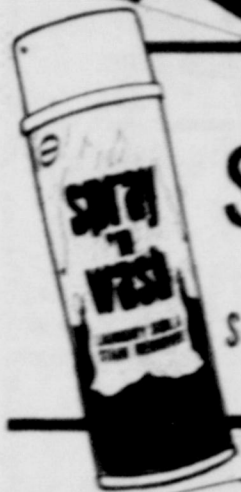
