

Hospital District Vote to be Saturday, July 22

Citizens here and throughout Knox County will have the opportunity of voting on Saturday, July 22 when polls open at the county will be open at their usual places and voting hours.

The issue before the people is whether or not to create a county hospital district with the authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed thirty-five (35c) on the \$100 valuation of a taxable property. The proposal also includes a provision for the assumption by the district of all bonds herebefore issued by the county for hospital purposes.

Knox County Hospital is one

of many county hospitals in the state faced with the problem of insufficient operating funds brought about by the continuing rise in every day cost of living.

In an effort to meet the rising cost of operation and maintenance here — special legislation was sought by petition and obtained — whereby a hospital district may be voted with an ad valorem tax, a tax in proportion to the value of property.

Under the new medicare laws the Knox County Hospital must have new scientific equipment, as it is released, for special treatment. It must meet the staff

requirements under the new wage and hour laws—and provision made for payment of those not able to pay for hospital treatment — further it continually must make payment for the ever-rising cost of drugs.

The fact is that our hospital does not receive enough income to meet these present and future needs and conditions.

Another important truth is that under a 1965 state legislation a county hospital must operate — and the Commissioners Court, under whose jurisdiction the county hospital now comes, does not have the authority to

close a hospital nor to put a clamp on its necessary spending needs, regardless of its loss or profit.

This is not to say that we don't want a hospital — WE DO — there is no issue on this whatsoever. The benefits of a hospital in our county are many.

The issue is—we're faced with the challenge of providing for the hospital that we already have—and for all practical purposes to do it without obligating ourselves with unnecessary taxes.

The hospital district as is being proposed will pose the least financial responsibility.

Our other alternative, which would be inevitable and imminent, is the raising of our present property valuation. Our tax rate is already at the highest peak allowed by the state; that rate is \$1.25. Our valuation presently is based on approximately 20%.

From each \$100 assessed valuation of county property the state receives 47 cents. When valuations are raised the amount of state tax is also increased.

Valuations would have to be increased 40% to bring in the same revenue that the county would receive if the hospital district is created.

In the hospital district plan all of the tax money will stay in the district and will be used by the County Hospital District.

The Knox County Hospital District if created would assume all obligations of some \$7,000 annual payments on an approximate \$107,000 bond indebtedness against the hospital.

Advantageous also to our entire county with the vote FOR the creation of a Knox County Hospital District would be the representation offered by the 7-man governing board. Four members of the board would be appointed,

one from each precinct and three men to be elected.

Not only will our County be assured of an adequate hospital facility for now and the future, but the vote will be a definite step forward in the growth and development of our county.

The choice is yours. Consider it carefully and cast your vote on Saturday, July 22.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of June, according to Sgt. Frank Jirick, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1967 shows a total of 25 accidents resulting in four persons killed, 15 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$20,326.00.

The number of traffic deaths in Texas continues to rise. For the first six months of 1967 there have been 1,476 traffic deaths compared to 1,396 traffic deaths for the first six months of 1966.

This six per cent increase is very alarming, and chances are it will become very critical because of vacation months and holiday periods still ahead to intensify the magnitude of the accident picture.

This alarming increase of accidents can be reduced by drivers knowing and obeying traffic laws, being a defensive driver and being a courteous driver. The Sgt. stated, "Courtesy is contagious—try it."

J. A. McGaughey Appointed To FHA Committee

It has been announced today by Joe T. Boone, County Supervisor that J. Allen McGaughey of Rt. 1, Monday, has been appointed to the three man Knox Co. Farmers Home Administration Committee. The appointment is for a three year term beginning July 1, 1967.

Mr. McGaughey succeeds Lloyd Waldrip and will join the other two members of the committee, who are Claudelle Bratcher of Vera and Philip Homer of Monday. The three member committee serves in an advisory capacity to the County Supervisor and makes determinations as to eligibility for loan advances for the agency. They are also frequently called upon by the County supervisor to render assistance in the servicing of loans and the development of other community services.

The Farmers Home Administration does not compete with private lenders in the field of agricultural credit; however, they supplement such sources of credit and make loans on a long-range basis for the development of farms and ranches as well as improvement of community facilities, and provide housing for the rural residents. One of the most important programs is the family type loan to young farmers in ever-increasing numbers throughout the State. Recent authorizations have been given the Agency by Congress to make loans for recreation facilities for rural residents, as well as financing multiple housing for senior citizens and labor housing associations. Another of the more extensive loan programs includes that of making loans for small towns and communities for the establishment or improvement of water and waste disposal systems.

Knox County is serviced by the Farmers Home Administration Office located in SCS Building, at 1101 East Main, Knox City. The office hours are 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. Monday through Friday except on legal holidays.

1967 - Crop Wheat Marketing Cert. Value To Be Worth \$1.36 Per Bushel

A value of \$1.36 per bushel was announced today by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture for 1967-crop wheat marketing certificates. Certificate payments to farmers participating in the 1967 wheat program will begin soon from county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASCS) county offices.

These payments to approximately 822,000 farmers participating in the 1967 program will be slightly in excess of \$700 million for the 1967 wheat crop. Over 84 percent of the national allotment is on participating farms.

The certificate value is based on the difference between July 1, 1967, wheat parity price of \$2.61 per bushel and the 1967-crop national average loan rate of \$1.25 per bushel. Certificate payments to farmers are based on the projected production on 35 percent of 1967 wheat acreage allotments. This reflects the wheat used for domestic food on which cooperators receive 100 percent of the wheat parity price.

Certificate payments add substantially to the income farmers receive from marketing their 1967

wheat crop. The \$700 million in certificate payments when related to the total production on the 37.4 million acres of allotment on participating farms reflect an income of at least 47 cents on each bushel produced by cooperators. The total average return per bushel will depend on prices farmers receive in the market from their 1967 crop.

In determining total return per bushel for wheat, cooperators divide their certificate payment by the total production to get an average per bushel payment. By adding this to the price they receive in the market, participants in the program find their total return per bushel.

Wheat marketing certificates are authorized by the 2-price wheat provisions of the Food and Agriculture Act of 1965. Under this law, farmers participating in the wheat program are guaranteed 100 percent of wheat parity price for their share of wheat used for domestic food. This substantially bolsters farm income for wheat while permitting support of market prices through loans at levels more competitive in world trade channels.

Millers and others purchase wheat marketing certificates at 75 cents per bushel to cover the quantities of wheat processed for domestic food use. The remainder of the certificate payment is made up by the Government.

ENROLLS AT ALPINE
Mrs. Mildred Stubbs took her son, Sam to Alpine over the weekend where he enrolled Monday a. m. at Sul Ross State College for the second semester.

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Recent moisture conditions in the County has been very beneficial to the majority of row crops and ranges.

Grain sorghum is making good progress, and is in all stages from just planted up to heads turning toward maturity. With so many stages of growth I would like to caution producers to keep a look out for grain sorghum midge as the plants are forming heads until seed are formed.

Various kinds of larva sometimes eat on grain sorghum heads as seed are being formed. The cotton boll worm, for one, sometimes cause severe damage to the crop. These are easy to find in the heads if infestation is great.

Knox County cotton is at a fast growing stage now, and for the majority should be putting on much fruit. The major pests after this stage usually will be the flea hopper, boll weevil and boll worms.

Many of the county producers prefer not to apply insecticides this late in the summer unless it becomes necessary. Some early season insecticides such as malathion, and azinphosmethyl (guthion) are good as early season insect controls, but may lead to more build up of boll worms if used late. This is because beneficial insects will be kept down to a great extent and these insecticides are not recommended for boll worm control.

Copies of the Extension service guide for controlling cotton insects in the high plains, rolling plains and trans-Pecos areas of Texas are available at the county agriculture agents office at the courthouse.

Forage crops are making excellent growth for July. Native grass is furnishing good grazing. Sudan and hybrid sorghum sudan and ensilage crops are all growing at a fast rate. At this writing there are many fields ready to cut for hay and ensilage. On fields planted for grazing, and growing toward maturity ahead of the cattle, livestock men may want to cut part of the acreage for hay or ensilage to be used for winter grazing.

4-H boys interested in going to the District 3 camp to be at Buffalo Gap July 1921 are invited to contact the Extension Office. Other County Agricultural Agents have mentioned they usually carry 9 to 15 year old boys to this camp. An adult leader is needed also for this camp.

The adult may be one of the boys father. Fees for this camp will be \$5.50 per person.
