Specialist Five Billy J. Davis, son of Mrs. Roy J. Davis of Knox City, flew into action against the Viet Cong last week, just one day after participating in one of the longest flights by a massed group of U. S. Army aircraft in history.

Davis, a crew chief in the 135th Aviation Company, flew in one of many "Caribou" assault making the 9,833 mile trip from Fort Benning, Ga.

An Army news release said that the "Caribous," normally limited to 900 miles in range, were equipped with extra fuel tanks and that the longest nonstop leg traveled was a 2,138mile non-stop, 17-hour hop from San Francisco to Hickman, AFB, Hawaii.

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
