## Grassed Waterways Being Planted On Several Knox County Farms SCS Says

Several farmers in the Wichita Brazos Soil Conservation District have recently planned grass waterways on their farms.

According to Archie Lieb, local Soil Conservation Service Work Unit Conservationist, grassed waterways have been planned on the Joe Wilson farm east of Rhineland and on the White Hudson farm and C. C. Hutchinson farm west of Knox City.

These farmers will receive technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service on design and layout and cost share assistance from the Great Plains Conservation Program.

Why are grassed waterways needed on the farm? Grassed waterways are like a foundation that supports a house. All water conservation practices on the farm may depend on the proper functioning of the waterway.

Control of erosion by grassed waterways is important to both farm and city people. For the farm they provide outlets for

terrace water and water that enters from adjoining land. For the city people grassed waterways prevent eroding fields from depositing silt into our water reservoirs and recreation.

Properly established and maintained are not "wasted" acres. Besides serving as safe water outlets for fields, the waterways may be used for hay, grass seed production, or limited grazing.

In most cases the number of acres within the waterway is less than the number of acres that were damaged by gullies before the waterway was established. Besides this saving in acres the waterway does much toward improving the appearance of the farm.

Check the low areas and drainage ways on your farm after the next heavy rain. Chances are there will be finger gullies on the fields and silt deposits in the low areas. This indicates the need for a grassed waterway, then terraces after the waterway is established.

If you like in the city and don't "have" a farm to check, go to your city water reservoir or favorite recreation lake. If you find large deposits of silt near where the stream enters the reservoir and mucky water it is evident that grassed waterways are needed to help slow down this filling of the lake with silt.

Now is not too soon to start on planning construction of a grassed waterway for your farm. Cost-share assistance is available through the Great Plains Conservation Program administered by the Soil Conservation Service and through the Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service. Technical assistance on planning and design can be obtained by contacting your local Soil Conservation Service office. Make sure you have a strong foundation for your conservation practices Lieb said.

## Local Oil News---

Haskell County Regular Field has gained a new well in the area five and one half miles east of O'Brien and five and one-half miles northwest of Weinert. It is D. H. Bolin of Wichita Falls No. 3 M. S. Lowrey, located 1.458 feet from the north and 2.173 feet from the west line of Section 191, Block 45, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 31.40 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus 10 per cent water. It is pumping from an open hole treated with 100 quarts of nitroxyceerin.

The 5 1/2 inch casing is set at 4,814 feet and the hole bottomed at 4,839 feet.

D. H. Bolin of Wichita Falls No. 5 E. G. Parkhill was staked 6 1/2 miles northwest of Weinert and is slated for 4,950 feet. Site is 1,870 feet from south and 467 feet from east lines of section 190, block 45, H&TC Survey.

Another regular field location was staked three miles south of Rochester. It is Rankin & Graham of Midland No. 1, Alma Reid, having a proposed depth of 5,000 feet. Site is 1,135 feet from north, and 3,937 from west lines of Red River CSL Survey 74.

The tire exploded, hitting Davis on the forehead and fracturing his skull.

He was taken to Knox County Hospital for emergency treatment and transferred to Wichita General Hospital in Wichita Falls for surgery.

Davis improved satisfactorily and was returned to the Knox County Hospital on Monday of this week.

## Knox City Soldier Flies To Viet Nam

Specialist Five Billy J. Davis, son of Mrs. Roy J. Davis of Knox City, flew into action against the Viet Cong last week, just one day after participating in one of the longest flights by a massed group of U. S. Army aircraft in history.

Davis, a crew chief in the 135th Aviation Company, flew in one of many "Caribou" assault making the 9,833 mile trip from Fort Benning, Ga.

An Army news release said that the "Caribou" normally limited to 900 miles in range, were equipped with extra fuel tanks and that the longest non-stop leg traveled was a 2,138-mile non-stop, 17-hour hop from San Francisco to Hickman, AFB, Hawaii.



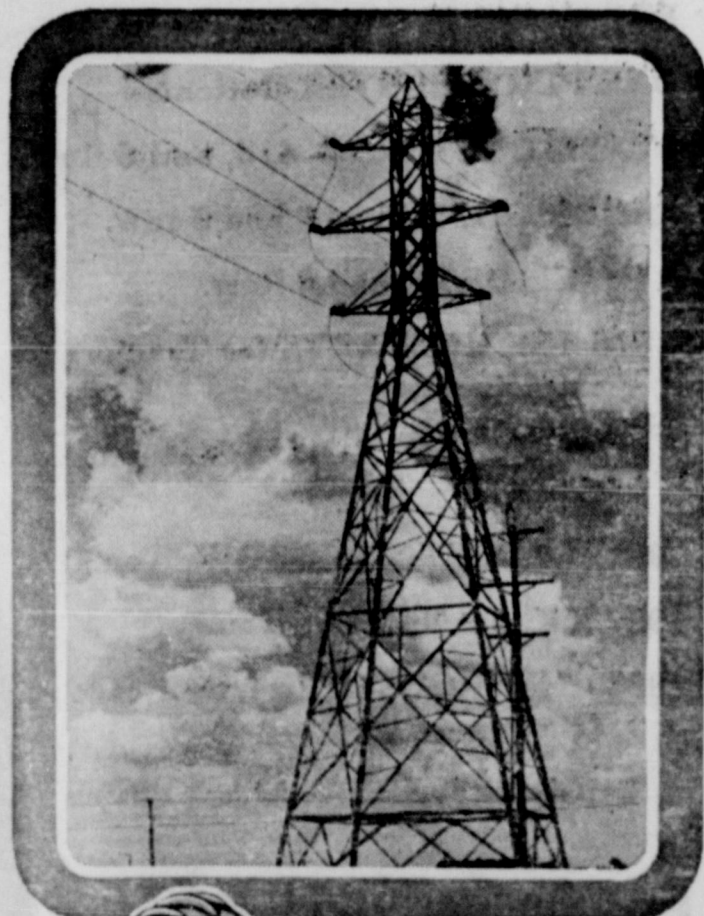

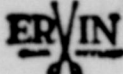

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN — While the Legislature in special session on voter registration grabbed the headlines, far-reaching developments were afoot in the field of higher education last week.

Coordinating Board for Texas Colleges and Universities recommended a whopping increase of nearly \$160,000,000 in appropriations for its state institutions during the coming biennium.

That would bring the total 1967-68 spending level to \$429,100,000 for the tax-supported college-university system, including \$62,800,000 for public junior colleges.

Board also concluded that "primary responsibility" for doctoral degree programs should be restricted to four schools: The University of Texas, Texas A&M University, Texas Technological College and the University of Houston. Doctoral programs at other institutions will

be terminated by Sept. 1, 1968. Exceptions were allowed for North Texas State University and Texas Woman's University, Denton, which will be allowed to continue higher degree programs now under way, pending further study. Consideration will be given to Arlington State College's offering joint doctoral degrees in the Fort Worth-Dallas area with the two Denton institutions.

Law School training, said the Board, should in the future be limited to the University of Texas, University of Houston, and Texas Tech, and existing medical schools should continue under UT jurisdiction.

A preliminary report on the role and scope of junior colleges recommended that these institutions should provide a full two-year college transfer program at the freshman and sophomore level, plus technical, vocational, adult and continuing edu-

Seven state schools were placed on a priority list to share \$7,097,742 in federal matching funds released through the U. S. Office of Education to be used for undergraduate building projects.

Funds will go to Stephen F. Austin State College, Sam Houston State College, Southwest Texas State College, Texas Technological University, Lamar State College of Technology, Southwestern Assemblies of God College and the University of Houston.

**LEGISLATURE WARMS UP**—Some state lawmakers warmed up for bigger battles ahead during their February special session, while others said a fond farewell to the state capitol.

Plenty of familiar faces will be found in both houses in the regular session next year, despite effects of legislative redistricting.

For nine incumbent representatives have no opponents in the Democratic primary. Incumbents are running against each other in four House races.

There will be new faces in the House, too, for there are no incumbents running in 48 districts.

Fourteen incumbent senators face no Democratic opposition. Five sets of senators are paired off against each other, insuring a total of 19 oldtimers in the 31-member body next year.

**OIL ALLOWABLE UP AGAIN**—Texas oil production for March may be at the highest level since May, 1959, due to an increase in the allowable for the sixth straight month.

Railroad Commission set the figure at 33.2 per cent of capacity. Market demand factor was highest granted since the percentage formula was adopted on January 1, 1963.

Production calling for next month is 3,100,000 barrels daily. Commission set 32.7 per cent production pattern for February.

**TEACHERS SEEK ANOTHER RAISE**—Texas State Teachers Association plans to ask the next Legislature to bring the salary of teachers up to the national average.

That would mean a boost of about \$556 to reach the \$6,506 average mark. A \$353 hike last year cost \$101,000,000.

TSTA notes Texas teachers now rank 29th in the nation pay-wise.

Teachers' legislative goals for 1967 also include five days a year authorized sick leave and retirement system improvements.

from forced sale, can be levied on, seized and sold by the tax collector for delinquent taxes, Atty. General Waggoner Carr held an opinion requested by Bosque County Attorney Charles H. Bolton of Meridan.

In a variety of other opinions, Carr ruled that:

- Two articles of the new Code of Criminal Procedure requiring misdemeanor justice of peace court trials only in precinct where offenses were committed are unconstitutional.

- Fees allowed peace officers under code can be assessed persons convicted of misdemeanors only where prescribed duties actually have been performed.

- Residence property of Cameron Independent School District used by school superintendent and his family is not exempt from taxation.

- Interest on time deposits or short term investments of restricted funds may be expended only for the stated purpose of the restricted funds.

- A school district may legally use available surpluses from operation of cafeterias to provide lunches for needy pupils on finding of board of trustees.

- State Department of Health must provide necessary for tuberculosis examination of first and seventh grade children on request of local health officials but is not required to conduct TB examinations.

- State constitution prohibits payment of short term cancellation premium for "errors and omissions" insurance policy on county clerks and deputies.

- Texas Board of Medical Examiners can pay travel expense of an out-of-state witness subpoenaed to testify.

- State Comptroller may require additional bonds to secure payment of motor fuel tax.

- Search warrant may be issued to search for venison by killing deer out of season.

- Refund of contributions to fireman who ends service prior to retirement is not payable from emergency reserve fund before pensioners are paid.

Where fund is insufficient to meet all disbursements payable under Fireman's Pension Act, disbursements, including refund, are to be proratably reduced.

**ANTI-POVERTY PROJECTS APPROVED**—Four community vacation program grants under the economics opportunity Act and one Volunteer in Service to America (VISTA) project won approval of Gov. John Connally.

Four CAP grants went to groups in Dallas, Brownsville and Beaumont, and to the Alabama-Coushatta Reservation Tribal Council in Livingston. They totalled \$182,467.

VISTA project will be operated by Houston Council on Human Relations for 40 volunteers to work with public and private agencies in extension of services to low-income families.

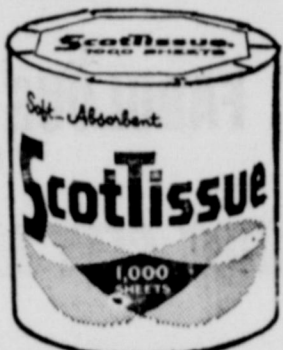
