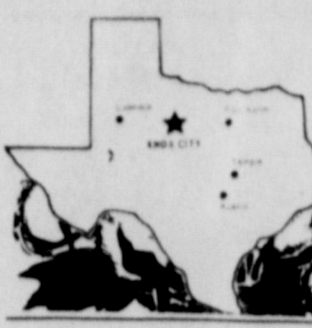

## KC Greyhounds Win Opener Friday With A 19-0 Shut-Out

The Greyhounds defeated the Rochester Steers 19-0 here Friday night in the season's opening game before a spirited crowd and in excellent autumn weather.

Total scoring came in the first half of the ball game and began after a 60 yard drive gave the Greyhounds a first down on the Steer's 5 yard line. Quarterback Mike Newton hit Splendid Rogers Lankford for the first touchdown and the extra point was a kick by Ivan Logsdon.

making the final score a 19-0 victory for the Knox City Greyhounds.

Rochester led in first downs 11-8, and passing yardage 59-44, but trailed in yards rushing 154-99. Knox City lost three fumbles, while Rochester had one pass intercepted and fumbled twice.

Coach Hibbitts reminded the Herald that his team will again play hosts to the Rule Bobcats at Greyhound Stadium here Friday night at 8 o'clock. He explained that Rule has a big line and a fast backfield and the key to stopping the Bobcats is Number 44 Jimmy Lisle, a 6'1", 200 pound game breaker with a 10.2 speed. He added that the Rule team plays a good passing game and the Bobcats are also excellent receivers.

The Greyhound coach expressed appreciation for the fine support of the fans at last week's game and invited each and everyone back for the game this week.

Knox City - The Brazos Valley Recreation Association recently purchased the Branham property south of town for \$5,000.

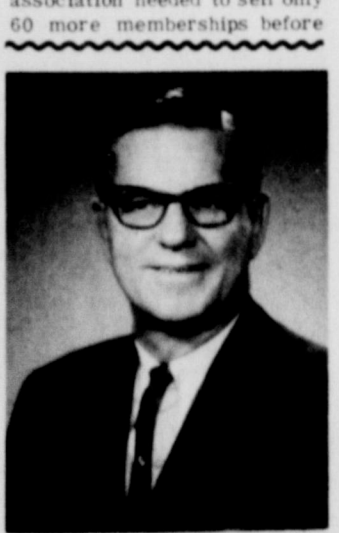
Plans are to build a live-stock show barn, Little League baseball field, and a roping arena on the site to be used by local residents as well as those of surrounding towns.

## Lowrey Attends VSO Conference

Allen Lowrey, Veterans County Service Officer for Knox County was in Austin last week attending the 22nd Annual State-wide Rehabilitation Conference for Veterans Service Officers, which was held at the Austin Hotel, September 8-11.

The Conference was conducted by the Veterans Affairs Commission of Texas, in cooperation with the American Legion, Disabled American Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Veterans of World War I, and the Veterans County Service Officers Association of Texas. The purpose of the meeting was to offer Service Officers from the entire State of Texas an opportunity to gain first-hand knowledge of recently enacted legislation dealing with benefits to veterans and their dependents and survivors. Topics under discussion during the four-day Conference included disability compensation and pension, Government insurance, GI loans, education and training for veterans and children, hospitalization and medical treatment, and veterans employment and reemployment rights.

Conducted annually, this Conference serves as an in-service course of training for all National, State, County, Post and Chapter Veterans Service Officers.

## Baptist SS Rally To Be In Munday

Knox City - Dr. W. Howard Halsell with the Baptist Sunday School Board in Nashville, Tennessee will deliver the message at the Sunday School rally to be held on Thursday, September 25 at 7:15 p.m. in the First Baptist Church in Munday.

A native of Arkansas, Dr. Halsell holds a bachelor of arts degree from Ouachita Baptist University. He attended Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and served in the US Navy in World II. He presently holds the rank of Lieutenant Commander in the Naval Reserve.

Prior to his present assignment on the SS Department staff in October, 1962, Dr. Halsell served as secretary in the SS Department of the Kansas Convention of Southern Baptist.

In addition to Dr. Halsell's message, the rally will include conferences for age group workers meeting in seven different conferences from the beginner department through the adult department.

Eighteen Baptist churches in both Haskell and Knox Counties will be represented by over 300 Sunday School workers.

## Lt. Anderson Flies Air Strike

With U. S. Combat Air Forces, Vietnam - First Lieutenant David P. Anderson, formerly of 1108 W. Fourth, McGregor, Tex., was a member of the six-man U. S. Air Force team that knocked out 39 enemy fortifications during a recent air strike north of Saigon.

Lieutenant Anderson, flying the Air Force's smallest jet fighter, the A-37, rolled in to bomb an enemy supply area 50 miles north of Bien Hoa.

The tactical fighter pilots pounded the encampment amid flying debris, uncovering numerous fortifications and bunkers. In addition to inflicting enemy casualties, they also riddled through yards of trenches and two supply caches.

Lieutenant Anderson is assigned to Bien Hoa as a member of the 604th Special Operations Squadron, the only Air Force unit that flies the modified Cessna T-37 trainer as an attack aircraft in the Vietnam war.

The lieutenant, son of Mr. and Mrs. P. W. Anderson, is a 1963 graduate of McGregor High School. He attended Texas A&M University and in 1967 received his B. B. A. degree from North Texas State University where he also was commissioned through the Air Force Reserve Officers Training Corps program.

His wife, Samantha, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jeff T. Graham of Knox City, Tex.

## Benjamin Vote Unanimous For Sewer Project

Benjamin voters unanimously approved a sewer project, three years in the making, Tuesday, Sept. 9. The tabulation was 107 votes for and none opposed from among 141 eligible voters.

The overwhelming yes vote gives the City of Benjamin a free hand in completing a \$73,000 loan from the Farmers Home Administration. It also makes use of a \$60,300 federal grant which will not have to be repaid.

Mayor Vernon McCanlies had said before the voting that no increase in city taxes would be required for the project. Fees from participants will pay off the long-term loan.

The city of Benjamin is free of bonded indebtedness, having recently paid their lake bond issue in full.

Benjamin citizens had been told that if the project was rejected the grant money would go to another community.

## Apply Now For LVN Training

Mrs. Maurine Reeder, Knox County Hospital administrator, announced Monday that the hospital is now taking applications for the Licensed Vocational Nurses' Training School to begin at Crowell in November.

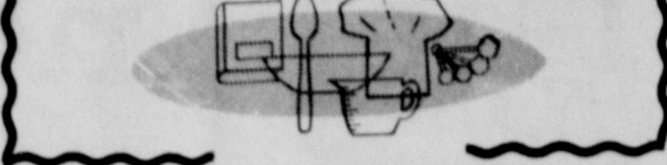
"I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me," Phil. 4:13.

## Cotton Pickin's

ROLLING PLAINS COTTON GROWERS INC.



Stamford - Representatives of the major cotton producer groups of the United State, including the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., have been invited back to Washington this week for a second session with representatives of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

J. B. Cooper, Jr., Roscoe cotton farmer and president of RPCG, and Charles G. Bragg, executive vice president of the organization, represented the Rolling Plains growers at a meeting in Washington last week to discuss the cotton provisions of the next farm act to be fashioned by Congress following expiration of the present program in 1970.

At last week's session in the national capital, Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin was not specific about what the department's policy will be toward new farm legislation, according to Bragg.

The secretary is scheduled to go before the House Agriculture Committee September 24 to present the USDA's position on a program to replace the Food and Farm Act of 1965, which expires in 1970.

"At last week's session with the department officials," Bragg said, "representatives of producer groups let USDA officials know that they are

generally satisfied with cotton provisions of the 1965 Act.

"Also, that they oppose placing a limit on the amount of direct payments a grower may earn for participating in the program on grounds that it would destroy the effectiveness of any provisions to control cotton production".

Spokesmen for cotton producer groups attending last week's conference further advised USDA officials that the organizations are in agreement that the Food and Agriculture Act of 1965 has succeeded in its goals to increase producer income; that it generally has stabilized cotton production and income and that it has, except for a brief panic in 1967, adequately provided domestic markets with the kind of cotton needed.

While in Washington, Bragg, Cooper and other cotton producer representatives conferred with Ken Frick, administrator of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, with Clarence Palmby, assistant secretary; and with Joseph Moss, long-time employ of USDA who has been placed in charge of the department's cotton program.

Moss served as chief of the

department's cotton policy staff under Orville Freeman, former USDA secretary, before being named Director of the newly created cotton division.

While in the capital, the Texas group met with the congressional delegation from the state, who pledged their support of a strong cotton program in the new farm act.

Besides the RPCG representatives appearing before USDA officials, others included the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Western Cotton Growers of California, Delta Cotton Council of Mississippi, Missouri Cotton Producers Ass'n., Agriculture Council of Arkansas, Georgia Cotton Producers Ass'n., Arizona Cotton Growers Ass'n., and New Mexico Cotton Ass'n.

Four leaders in agriculture, particularly in the area of cotton production are to take part on the program at the annual membership meeting of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. on September 23, according to Charles G. Bragg, executive vice president of RPCG.

The meeting will be held in the new Taylor County coliseum in Abilene. This is the first time the annual session has been held in Taylor County since the organization of the cotton producer group in 1964.

A dinner-business meeting of the 64 directors from the 32 counties in the organization will be held Monday evening, September 22, at the Ramada Inn, located on US 80 east of Abilene. This session begins at 7:30 p.m.

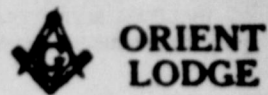

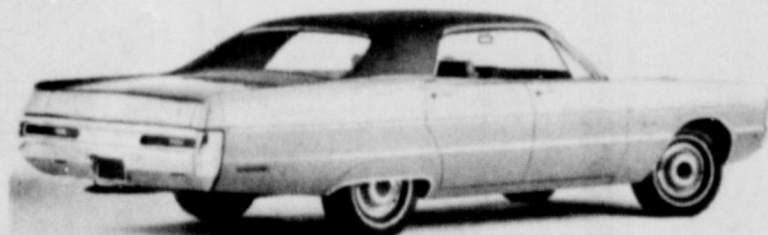

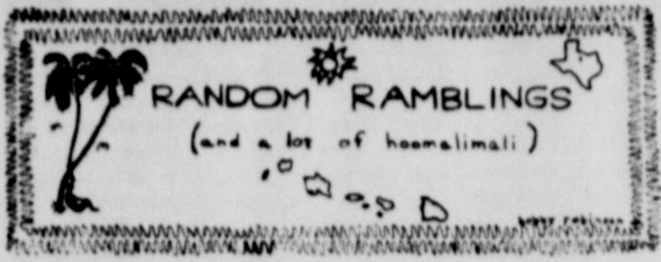

I wonder how I'll react to the fact that at home a person can drive straight for fifty miles without having to worry about slipping over a cliff and into the ocean? Here it feels like we're always driving around in circles.

It may sound strange to some, but I miss the wide open expanses of Texas plains and the salt cedar beauty of the Caprock and breaks between Knox City and Lubbock. The purple mountains and sweeping valleys of Oahu are certainly sights to behold, but I'd rather be home.....

It's been over a year since my first visit to California where I spent several great days with my mother's sister, Sue Cusimano, and her family. It was then that my cousin Joe took me to windy Candlestick Park, home of the Giants of San Francisco, to Haight-Asbury Streets, and to the Golden Gate. That was the time my Uncle Joe treated us all to dinner at Fisherman's Wharf in San Francisco. And, believe it or no, there was where I saw my first palm tree. (I've seen a few more since then, too, I'll tell you!) I wouldn't take a million bucks for all the fun and good times I've had with my kinfolks in California, Colorado, and Texas...

There is so much to do and so little time to do it in. The time flies.

**Cattlemen's Round-Up To Be Held This Month**

Abilene -- Abilene, the Texas version, will again become the "cattle center" in September, but the trail drives will come over Interstate highways instead of dusty trails.

The occasion is the 1969 "Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children," the annual event for which ranchers and stockmen donate stock to be sold at auction with all proceeds going to the non-profit West Texas Rehabilitation Center here.

This year's Round-Up is scheduled for September 29 at Ranchers and Farmers Livestock Auction in Abilene, and officials are hoping to surpass the \$71,000 that the one-day sale raised last year.

Area chairmen have already been appointed by General Chairman Charlie Morris of Abilene (serving his eighth straight year in this capacity), and pledge cards have been mailed out.

In the very near future, volunteers will spread out all over Texas in a convoy of borrowed trucks, trailers and pickups to pick up stock donated to the sale.

"We're between a rock and a hard place this year, what with the long, hot summer and the loss of Mr. Wylie's leadership, but we're looking for another successful Round-Up," Morris said.

Mr. Wylie is the late Conda Wylie, 86, who suffered a fatal heart attack at his Fort Chadbourne ranch last January. He had earned the title of "Father of the Cattlemen's Round-Up" by virtue of his generous support over the years.

He actually started the

Round-Up in 1960 when he gave the WTRC Executive Director Shelley V. Smith 20 calves with the instructions "See if you can use these to help the Center."

Nine years later, the WTRC has its own spacious holding pens to care for the stock donated by generous ranchers like Mr. Wylie and others.

With contacts with ranchers all over the state, the WTRC is able to get the best prices for top cattle and channel the funds into a place where it will benefit more people than the donor ever realizes.

Without regard to race, creed, age, or financial circumstance, the WTRC provides physical, occupational, speech, educational and language therapy services, in addition to audiology, psychometry, and pre-vocational evaluations.

The WTRC also offers six special diagnostic and evaluation clinics in physical medicine, general neurology, pediatric neurology, learning disorders, otology and orthopedic disorders.

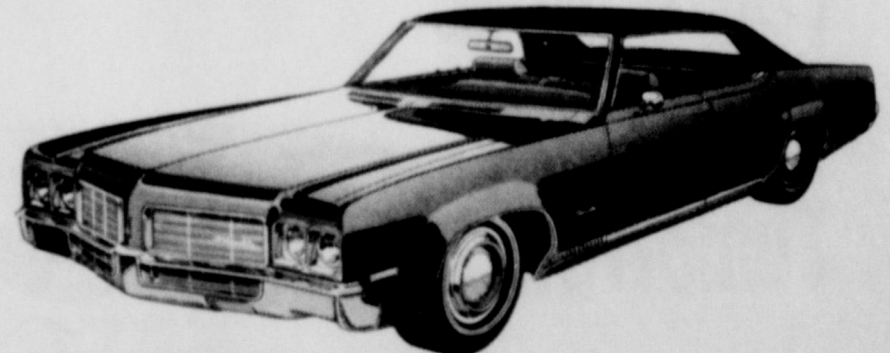
