Mrs. Worlow Dies Here Sept. 14

Funeral services for Mrs. Mary Etta Worlow, pioneer resident of Sayre, Okla., were held Tuesday, September 16, at the First Baptist Church in Sayre, with the Rev. Willie Fox officiating.

Mrs. Worlow died Sunday, September 14, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Willie Mae Thomas, in Knox City after a lengthy illness.

She was born March 6, 1870 in Ozan, Ark. She married E. Worlow on April 10, 1892 in Ellis County, Texas. They moved to Oklahoma in November, 1904, and homesteaded a farm near Sweetwater. She was a member of the Primitive Baptist Church.

Preceding her in death were her husband in 1952; two daughters, Mrs. Nelia Goodwin and Mrs. Flora Stewart; two infant sons; and an infant daughter.

Survivors are a son, John, of Sayre; five daughters, Mrs. Thomas of Knox City, Mrs. Cora Wilson of Checotah, Okla., Mrs. Thelma Cupp of Plainview, Mrs. Viola Jenkins of Ingleswood, California, and Mrs. Dollie Davis of Port Orchard, Wash.; two sisters, Mrs. Gussie Williams of Shawnee, Okla., and Mrs. Pearl Boyer of Hereford; two brothers, Bob Barkley of Greenfield, Calif., and D. E. Barkley of St. Louis, Mo.; 35 grandchildren; 80 great-grandchildren; and 32 great-great-grandchildren.

Burial was in the Mulberry Cemetery with Serogghs Funeral Home in charge.

Funeral services for Robert Lee Thompson, 91, year old retired farmer of O'Brien, were held at 3 p. m. Tuesday in the O'Brien Baptist Church, with the Rev. Mart Hardin, pastor, officiating.

"Uncle Bob", as he was affectionately called by friends, was found Monday morning at his home where he lived alone. Death was attributed to a heart attack.

Born March 18, 1867 in Texas, he married Willie Virginia Fannin on May 15, 1893. She died in 1955. Mr. Thompson had lived in Haskell County since 1905.

Burial was in Rochester Cemetery under the direction of Mansell-Smith Funeral Home.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Chester Yates of Amarillo, Mrs. Mamie Britt of Welch, and Miss Lula Thompson of Wichita Falls.

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'Hounds to Meet Lockett In First '58 Home Game

The grandstands are expected to be filled tomorrow (Friday) night when the Knox City Greyhounds are hosts to the Lockett Panthers in the 'Hounds' first home game of the season.

And with their morale boosted by last week's win over Hermleigh, the Greyhounds will be looking for another victory, since Lockett has already bowed to

Rule and Rochester of this district. Coach Ted Darland reports that his team's blocking and tackling has sharpened up this week, and there have been no serious injuries. The boys are still plagued by fumbles and mistakes, but he expects them to give a good account of themselves against Lockett.

The Greyhounds' improved physical condition showed last week when they hammered out a 18-6 victory over the bigger, more experienced Hermleigh Cardinals. Hermleigh's only tally came in the first period after a Greyhound fumble on the Knox City 10. The Cardinals' Donald McHaney scored on the second play.

In the second quarter Benton Bolin returned a punt 40 yards to the Hermleigh 40, but the ball was again lost on a fumble and both teams went scoreless during the period.

In the third, Halfback Jimmy Phillips scored for Knox City after end Donald Johnson had blocked an attempted punt by downing the kicker on the Cardinal 10 yard line.

Monte White received a Hermleigh punt on the Cardinal 30 in the fourth period, and made a nice run-back to the nine. White then scored on two quarterback sneaks.

The 'Hounds threatened again when White intercepted a Hermleigh pass on the 30 and returned it to the 13 yard line. The scoring attempt stalled on the four-yard line, however, and the ball went over on downs.

White and Johnson both showed well on offense and defense. Bolin was also a stand-out on offense, and Arnold Casillas did his job well. Jim Anderson and M. C. Vincent looked sharp in the defensive line.

School officials have been well pleased with the number of fans who made the long drives to the first two games, and hope the 'Hounds will have all their fans behind them Friday night.

O'Brien Bulldogs downed Moran, 32-27, Friday night in a six-man football game at O'Brien.

Danny Walsworth scored four TD's for O'Brien on runs of 48, 40, 45 and 5 yards. He passed to Junior Hester for a tally and threw to John Tom Johnston and Jerry Covey for extra points.

Benjamin was also victorious Friday night, beating McCaulley 57-6. Benjamin's scoring came on runs of 35, 30 and 20 yards by Jackie Idol, 40, 30 and 5 yards by Billy Brinegar and jaunts of 30 and 45 yards by Charles Jennings. James Coppedge also scored, taking a 20 yard pass from Donnie Ryder.

Tonight (Thursday) O'Brien travels to Paint Creek, who bowed to Mattson last week, for a District 3 game. Benjamin will play North Side at Vernon Friday night in an eight-man practice game.

In other District 3 action, Mattson plays Goree at Goree tonight and Weinert plays Vera at Vera, also tonight.

In grade school play this week Paint Creek beat O'Brien 26-0 and Benjamin walloped Sager-ton 68-0.

Savings Bonds Sales in County Total \$135,793

"Savings Bonds Sales for the first seven months of 1958 totaled \$135,793," W. E. Braly, chairman of Knox County's Bond Committee reported today. "Our county has now reached 57.3% of its 1958 goal of \$237,000. July sales were \$20,563."

Sales in Texas for the first seven months of 1958 were \$103,806,066 which was 3.9% greater than the same period in 1957.

"A part of every American's savings should be invested in Savings Bonds, to provide for his future and to add strength to the national economy," stated Mr. Braly, county chairman.

Delamarter, domestic relations consultant for the stewardship and direct missions department of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, will be one of the principal speakers at the annual Haskell-Knox Baptist Association meeting today (Thursday) September 25 at the First Baptist Church of O'Brien.

M. D. Rexrode of Haskell, moderator of the association, said Mr. Delamarter will report on denominational work and outline goals for next year's state Baptist program.

Named to his present position in September, Mr. Delamarter works in an advisory capacity with administrators of Texas Baptists' six children's homes, the benevolent homes committee of the BGCT and the direct missions program. He also helps city and associational missionaries in dealing with family and juvenile problems.

Before accepting his present position, Mr. Delamarter was public relations coordinator of the six children's homes owned by the convention.

A graduate of the University of Illinois with a degree in social work, he formerly was executive director of the Community Planning Council at Lubbock.

Purpose of the associational meeting is to bring messengers from all churches in the association together to share progress reports, get firsthand information on denominational work and to hear inspirational messages.

The Knox County Program Building Committee, an organization of farm and ranch people to assist in the planning of the county extension program of work, met Monday night, Sept. 22, at the courthouse, Benjamin, for its regular fall session, with 15 members present.

L. B. Patterson, vice-chairman, called the meeting to order and new officers were elected for 1959. Jack Idol of Benjamin was elected chairman, W. M. Ford of Vera, vice-chairman, and Mrs. O. R. Miller of Gilliland, secretary.

Mr. Idol reappointed committees on Grain Crops, Cotton, and Livestock and Range to be convened at a later date to review problems concerning these three phases of work. Also reappointed were committees on Foods and Home Improvement.

Following the business session, the county agent reported on result demonstrations conducted during 1958.

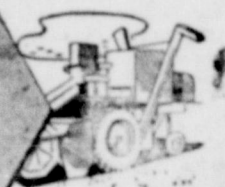

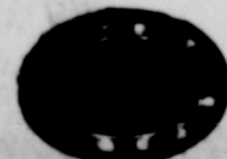

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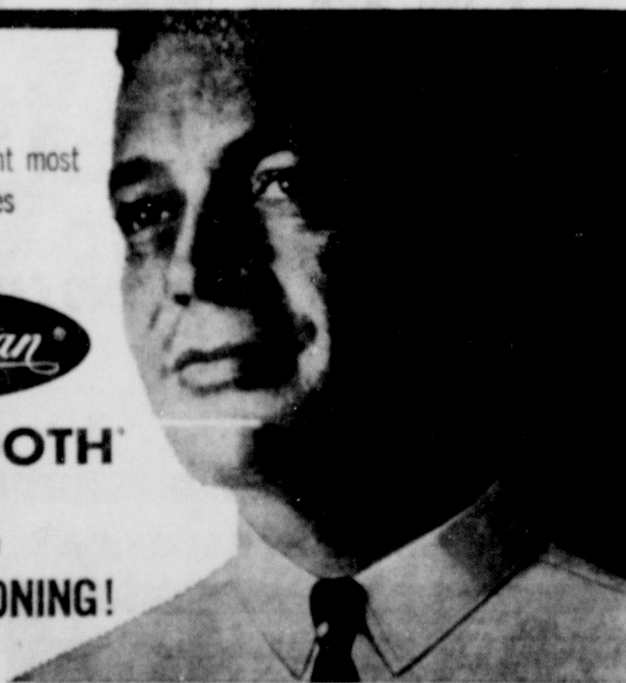
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
