The returns of said posting shall be attached to the minutes of this meeting and shall be a part thereof for all intents and purposes.

KC Girl Writes Of Trip

(Editor's Note: The following letter was received by Mr. and Mrs. Wayne McKinney from their daughter, Connie, who is touring Europe with Singers' of Hardin-Simmons University. The letter was so descriptive, thought that it might be of interest.)

Dearest Mom, Dad and Charley,

We made it! We landed in Frankfurt Wed. afternoon, then a bus with an escorting officer named Lt. Jim Carl (who will be with us until March 8) picked us up and brought us to this tiny old town called Bad Kreuznach where we are now and will be for three more days now.

We are staying in a charming old guest house in town. I'm glad, because it's away from the base, so we're right here with the native people.

A guest house is a combination home and boarding house. The rooms are big with antique portable closets, wall paper, hard wood floors, and a big window that opens out over the street with handmade lace curtains and a big marble window seat. The beds are king-size with feather mattresses covered with a hand made bottom sheet. There is no top sheet or blanket. Instead we have a much lighter feather bed to cover up with called a coverlet. It looks a lot like a comforter, but is much heavier. This is covered with a white embroidered slip cover (also hand made). The pillows are huge (king-size) and are also feathered. For this I'm glad that Jody didn't come. She'd really be sick with all these feathers. There are no bathrooms for each room, but there is an old fashion wash basin. The commodes are also separate from the baths. Places to use the commode are called water closets which is exactly what they are. They are tiny little closets stashed in the corner of a hall on the stair landings. The bathtub is upstairs in what used to be the attic.

Breakfast is always served us here at the guest house in the dining room downstairs. This is my favorite meal of the day. All German food in small villages such as this one serve nothing from cans. Everything is homemade or home grown. Breakfast includes hot coffee or tea; several different types of homemade bread (German bread is completely different in flavor and texture from any bread I've ever had. It is very tough, hard to chew, but extremely moist and strong with flour.) My favorite is the German dark bread, homemade raspberry jam, fresh goat cheese, fresh goat butter and honey. All the other meals are served in courses. Soup is always the appetizer (never salad). You order good-shaw soup which is delicious. Thursday night the soup had homemade noodles in it which were fantastic. After the soup came the main course which consisted of wurst (like a foot long vienna sausage) and creamed potatoes these are very unusual because they are whipped with lots of butter and cheese making them creamy and gooey. For dessert we had homemade applesauce prepared with a non-alcoholic wine which was delicious.

The town consists of tall old brick homes and guest houses built on small narrow streets. All of them have big windows with brightly colored shutters. The streets are usually brick. There is an adorable little park in the center of town (one block away from us), full of statues and rose bushes everywhere. I'd love to be here

in the summer to see it in bloom.

The weather has been great. It's been clear but cold, but the cold is hardly noticeable since there is no west Texas wind.

I love the people here, Germans are almost as friendly as Texans. I especially love the old people because they are so lovable. The little old ladies are all round, attired in black coats, boots (ankle high with fur around the edge of top), and brightly colored felt hats with a short feather sticking up on the left brim.

You know, I never realized how much I loved you until now. Loving is wanting to share and I just wish so much that simplicity of life and nature here in Germany. No words I could use could ever describe the beauty of the tall evergreens whose trunks are covered with green fungus, the picturesque villages with their tiny houses and white churches with tall steeples. I can never tell you what it's like to walk beside the beautiful river that runs through the village with ducks and swans lazily drifting along its course as a church bell rings out the time in the distance. This is a joy that one must see and experience for himself. Jim, our escorting officer, tells us that there are no slums in Germany. Also, one can walk through the streets here in Bad Kreuznach alone with no fear of being mugged. It's so beautiful.

All souvenirs I buy will be packaged and shipped to you so be expecting them. Also, I'll be sending film later on.

I love and miss all of you but I'm having the time of my life.

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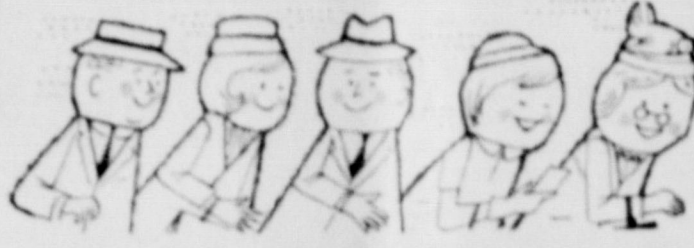
