

KC To Have Transient Labor Camp

L. W. Graham, secretary of the Board of City Development announced Monday that final details had been completed for a transient labor camp to be located in Knox City.

Needs for property have been secured and funds for erecting a building are cleared, according to Mr. Graham. The camp will be located on lots west of the Wampler blacksmith shop, on the street going west to the depot.

The project was launched recently by the Knox City Lions Club. Lions Claude Reed and Ancel Waldrip have been working on the proposition for several weeks.

Need for the facilities has been evident for some time. Transient harvesting labor has been forced to camp in the woods, on the banks of the river, and in other places, creating a health hazard and a nuisance to the community.

To insure a steady flow of labor during the rush season, it was imperative that some action be taken to care for them.

The camp will serve as a stop-over place only and will not be for permanent residence. It will serve as a clearinghouse from the time transients arrive until they are placed locally, or move on.

An old building on the present site will be taken down and a permanent structure erected. Water and rest room facilities will be provided, and what other conveniences are necessary. Expense of the project will be borne by local public subscription and a liberal sum from the Department of Agriculture, under whose direction all transient labor is handled.

That the camp is in operation, Knox City will be placed on a map handed out by field men of the Department of Agriculture and Extension Service.

The labor, showing signs of such facilities, will be a big drawing labor to the city.

He has served as chairman for many important committees and as the author of several good pieces of legislation. His statement to the voters of this community follows:

Again tragedy brought sorrow to Knox City and vicinity Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock, when Bessie Allene Hester, 16-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Marlin Hester of Knox City, fell from a truck on which she was riding and suffered head injuries that resulted in her death Tuesday afternoon at 1 o'clock.

The accident occurred about four miles north of Knox City, on the Benjamin highway, in company with a group of her school girl friends, she was riding on a flatbed truck when she accidentally fell from the vehicle, her head striking the pavement. Rushed to the Knox County Hospital, she died before regaining consciousness, although rallying at times.

Bessie Allene was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Marlin Hester, residing a mile south of Knox City. She was born October 12, 1929. Several times in her life serious illness had almost taken her from this earthly home, but she had rallied to health and at the time of her death she was thoroughly enjoying the youthful vigor God had restored to her. Each day was complete happiness to her.

Bessie well revealed a picture of beautiful youth and shared in distributing God's love in her strong devotion for the in sorrow and her unselfish friendliness for all. She was a Junior in high school and was very active and popular in school, and was very active and popular with her wide circle of friends who say, "She was good company."

To the parents whose hearts are so crushed, she leaves sweetest memories of her pride and joy, her devotion for them and echoes of childish cries and laughter that had made their home complete. Many friends give to Mr. and Mrs. Hester their deepest sympathy in true friendship over the loss of their precious child.

She is survived by her parents, her maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Lane of Santa Ana, Texas; her paternal grandparents, Mrs. Josie Hester of Knox City and J. P. Hester of Plainview; several aunts and uncles.

Crop Insurance Again Offered Cotton Growers

Applications for federal cotton crop insurance must be signed before the crop is planted, Doyle G. Thomas, secretary of the county ACA committee, pointed out today.

In Knox County the deadline for obtaining insurance on the 1946 crop is April 23, 1946, the ACA official explained, but he emphasized that the applications must be made before the crop is seeded.

The insurance covers all unavoidable risks, he continued, such as hail, drought, floods, excessive rains, diseases, wind, frost, snow, wild life, hurricanes and tornadoes, but it does not protect against avoidable losses such as negligence, damage to quality, or failure to prepare land, plant or cultivate, according to good practice.

A year Knox County farmers filed 187 contracts covering 249 farms. This insurance came in handy for about 35 farmers that had losses. About \$25,000 worth of cotton will be paid to these farmers for their losses.

"The agents are attempting to contact every cotton grower in the county," Mr. Thomas said, "but it is possible some may be missed. The insurance is available to all producers, and those who are not reached by the agents should come to the office to sign up."

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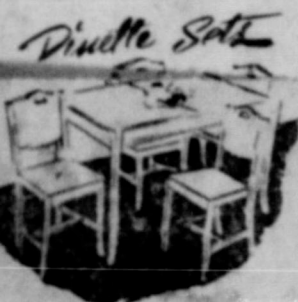

Club Boys Start Calf Feeding for Show Purposes

Eleven 4-H Club boys of Knox County have started their calf feeding program for this year, which includes 17 calves now on feed. There are strong indications that this number of boys will be increased within the next week or 10 days, according to R. O. Dunkle, county agent.

All calves now on feed are of very high quality and most of them are on nurse cows, insuring some of the best animals that have been fed in the county. The calves all possess a very desirable type, quality and conformation and were selected from the League Ranch of Benjamin, the Edgar Norton ranch in Hardeman County, and the McFadden interests, Benjamin.

Most of the 4-H Club boys feeding calves are those that have had previous experience although three of the boys are feeding calves for the first time this year. Being interested in beef cattle, the boys are willing to devote considerable time to carry out the small details which are necessary to keep their calves on full feed, and to make the maximum gain.

The calves are being started on a ration of whole oats for the first month, later the boys will add whole yellow corn to the ration, normally consisting of 70 pounds of whole oats and 30 pounds of whole corn. As the feeding period progresses the boys will decrease the oats 10% and increase the yellow corn 10% up to September 1st, at which time they will start grinding the mixture and add sweet feed. By this time they will be feeding a ration composed of 45 pounds cracked yellow corn, 40 pounds rolled oats, 5 pounds cottonseed meal and 10 pounds sweet feed. During the final stages of the feeding period, in December and January, the corn and oats will be reduced by 5 pounds and 10 pounds of crimped barley will be added.

HEALTH LETTER

The child who cannot hear is badly handicapped. Hard-of-hearing children are often considered backward and become retarded in school when in all reality they may be highly intelligent but simply cannot hear much of what is said to them. Children who appear backward in school should be observed carefully to determine if hearing is a factor in the situation.

According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, many injuries to the ear can be prevented by keeping foreign objects out of the ear canal, taking good care of the ears during colds and other diseases and observing certain precautions when swimming.

"The cause of middle ear trouble often is diving and swimming," Dr. Cox said. "Whenever the nose is under water the breath should be continually and gently expelled through the nose to keep the nasal passage free of water. Protect the ears further by wearing a rubber cap."

The State Health Officer declared that no hard instrument of any kind should be used in cleansing the ear canal since it may be injurious. Using ordinary precautions can do much to avoid minor ear trouble which may later lead to partial or complete deafness, the doctor added.
