

ternal RevenueService, A popular question at our Internal Revenue offices is, "Where is My Refund?" The chances are pretty good that it's being processed rapidly by our Internal Revenue Service employees and the computer. The computer generally sends between 900,000 and a million refund checks to taxpayers in our half of Texas, On a good day when the electricity is flowing smoothly through the computer transistors, 15,000 refund checks will be sent out. If everything goes real well the total may go up to 25,000 or more

Most taxpayers who sent their tax returns in early in January have already spent their refunds. Some few have been notified that their return needs audit, or they have been audited. #### Students Should Apply For SS Card Now

Students who plan to work this summer should get their social security cards before they go looking for a job. An employer will ask for the number on the card, and without it the student may not be hir-

Edwin Draughon, manager of the Vernon social security office, pointed out that each summer thousands of students get their first jobs and have their first experience with social security. Since almost all work today is covered by social security, the student will need his number to get proper credit for his work. The employer must have the number to report the student's earnings for social security so that it will be credited to the right social security

Many companies will either not hire a worker who doesn't have a social security number or will hold up his pay until the number is furnished, Mr. Draughon pointed out, All work credited under social security builds valuable insurance protection for these young people. All their earnings from now on will count toward not just their future retirement benefits, but also toward disability benefits in case they become disabled or die.

Since most students apply ing through banks and utility for their soical security numbers near the close of the school year, a logjam sometimes builds up at the social security office and the cards may be delayed,

To avoid a delay in getting your social security number in Tenn., June 9 and arrive in time for your job, apply early, Mrs. Draughon said.

Farm and Ranch News By Herman Collier

Most home gardens in Knox County are off to a good start, But insect control may be required sometime during the growing season to keep them healthy and producing at maxi-

All home gardeners should keep in mind that not all insecticides are recommended for home garden use. Therefore, gardeners should learn chemical which best controls them. Poor insect control may result in the use of the wrong insecticide and perhaps a bigger problem could come from insecticide residues on the treated vegetables.

The Food and Drug Administration has set restrictions on the use of insecticides applied to edible crops. Observance of these restrictions protects the consumer from the harmful residues, explains the county

Information on controlling insects in the home garden and a list of the insecticides which are widely used and generally available are included in L-642, "Control of Insects in the Home Garden," Copies are available at the County Extension Office.

The county agent suggests that gardens be checked frequently for insect infestations, and if they are found, that control measures be applied before the situation gets out-of-hand.

PRODUCING LONGERSTAPLE COTTON STILL BEST BET

A kind of dilemma is facing many cotton farmers on the Texas Rolling Plains concerning the growing of longer staple varieties. There has been a rapid movement to the production of longer fibered cottons over the last two years, but prices during the past season have been disappointing to growers. At present, textile mills are more interested in shorter staple cottons because they are cheaper. A partial answer goes back

to last year's market activity. Stocks of longer staple cottons have increased rapidly relative to short staple to short staple cotton hand, Furthermore, last year's wide price spread between short and long staple cotton was an abnormal situation and could not be expected to remain.

In most cases, however, longer staple cotton is still bringing \$15 to \$25 more per bale than short staple cotton, Another encouraging aspect is that cotton breeders are developing longer staple, stormproof varieties which have the vield ability of popular 15/16 inch cot-

In yield trials in Dawson ounty the past season, researchers from the Texas A&M University Agricultural Center at Lubbock found that new stormproof cottons with an inch plus staple averaged slightly more in yield than old 15/16inch staple varieties. Yield was 646 pounds of lint per acre for the longer staple varieties compared to 605 pounds for the short staple varieties.

Longer staple varieties in the trails included Paymaster III. Lockett 4789, Lockett 4789A, Lankart 3840, Lambright X-15-5, Stripper-Cala S and Tamcot 788.

Knox County producers are encouraged to continue to strive to produce high quality cotton. This means cotton with a relayou are making an investment tively long, strong fiber that is that pays off in the saving of well matured. Mills with increasingly higher spinning

speeds will continue to need and demand longer, stronger fiber in the future.
