Funeral services for William F. Brown, 55, were held at the First Baptist Church in Benjamin Tuesday, Feb. 3, at 2:00 p. m. Officiating ministers were Rev. Lester Belcher, pastor of the Petrolia Baptist Church, and Rev. J. L. Holloway, pastor of the Benjamin Baptist Church.

Mr. Brown was injured Saturday when a two-ton truck backed over him at the new Abilene Municipal Airport. He died Sunday in Hendrick Memorial Hospital, Abilene.

Mr. Brown had been living in Abilene about two months. He was born in Weatherford Sept. 21, 1897, and married the former Alice Ford in March, 1923, at Quinlan. He moved to Knox County in 1927.

Survivors include two Kenneth of Abilene and Alfred of Dallas; two daughters, Mrs. John Constable and Mrs. John Dillard, both of Abilene; three brothers, Marvin of Fort Worth, Mattie McMinn, Knox City, and mother, Mrs. W. J. Brown of Knox City; and three grandchildren.
