If the Connally amendment should remain on the Federal enactment and the Johnson amendment be removed, Texas' problems would be solved. at least temporarily; for it would be possible to make a pension grant of an average of around \$20. But if the Johnson amendment remains on, a special fund-raising session of the Legislature would seem almost inevitable, and at the earliest possible moment because of the fact that no bil' is likely to get the two-thirds vote necessary for immediate effectiveness and hence would require ninety days before the money would start coming in.

The Governor consistently has said that he will not call a special session, on the logic that the Legislature could not be expected to do in thirty days what it did not do in nearly five months; but the Governor's statements in this regard were made prior to developments in Washington.




