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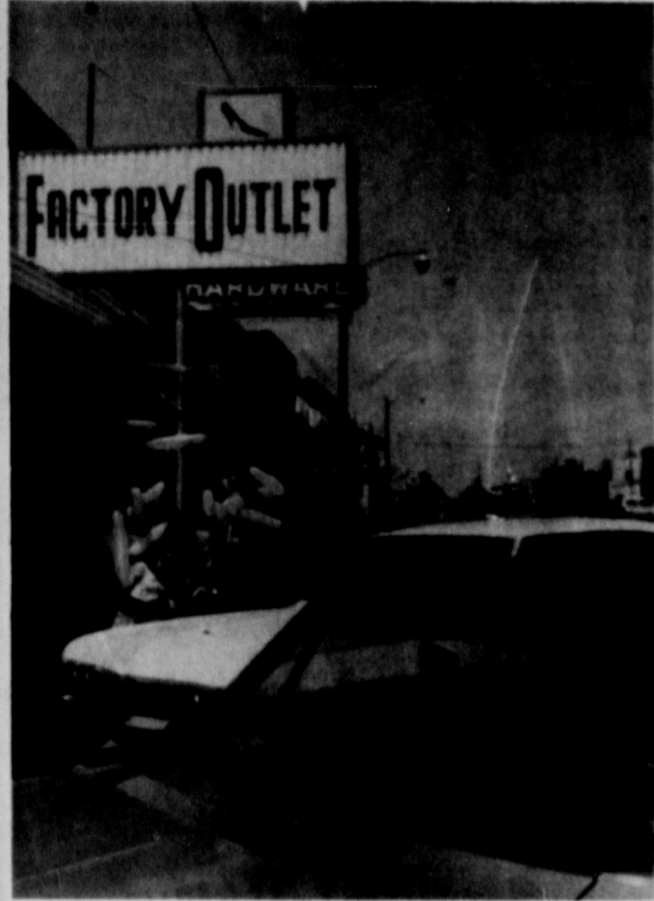

FHA Has Largest Yearly Volume Of Rural Loans

J. Lynn Futch, Texas State Director of the Farmers Home Administration, announced here today that the agency extended credit to rural Texans in the amount of \$155,456,817 during the 1971 fiscal year ending June 30, 1971. This credit was furnished farmers and rural residents through the many loan programs administered by the agency with rural housing leading the way with \$72,302,453. Loans for community services facilities such as rural water systems and sewer system totaled \$24,205,192. Credit extended to individual farmers and ranchers for operating expenses, capital purchases and land purchases totaled \$58,949,172. This was the largest yearly volume of loans in the history of the organization, which has as its overall mission the development of rural areas.

Futch said that he was also pleased that there was a sizeable decrease in the percentage of loan delinquencies as compared to previous years. Due to the severe drought in the spring and early summer of this year, it is expected that the demand for emergency credit to farmers and ranchers this fall and winter will substantially increase the volume of farm loans in fiscal 1972, with all other programs also expected to be expanded. The program is administered in Texas through 144 county offices and the state office in Temple.

F.M. Road 143 In Knox And King To Be Widened And Reconditioned

The Texas Highway Commission today approved the widening, reconditioning, and resurfacing of F. M. Road 143 in Knox and King Counties. This project extends from U.S. Highway 82 in King County, southwest 11.1 miles to 4.0 miles southeast of the King and Knox County Line, and is a part of the 1972 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement Program.

District Engineer V. J. McGee of Childress said that the estimated cost of this project is \$293,000 and will be under the supervision of George R. Wall, Supv. Resident Engineer with offices in Munday.

The 1972 State Highway Safety and Betterment & Farm to Market Improvement Program is a \$40.4 million program to improve more than 4.8 thousand miles of Texas highways and Farm to Market roads which includes 797 projects in 195 counties.

The program is aimed at enhancing traffic safety by modernizing and rehabilitating highway facilities which are becoming obsolete due to age and increased traffic.

Fifty-four per cent of the program includes projects on US and State-numbered highway and 42 per cent of the work is scheduled for F. M. roads. The remainder of the programmed funds are for right of way and relocation assistance costs for a reserve for future assignment.

Approval of the program earmarks funds for badly-needed improvements on the non-interstate systems maintained and operated by the Texas Highway Department.

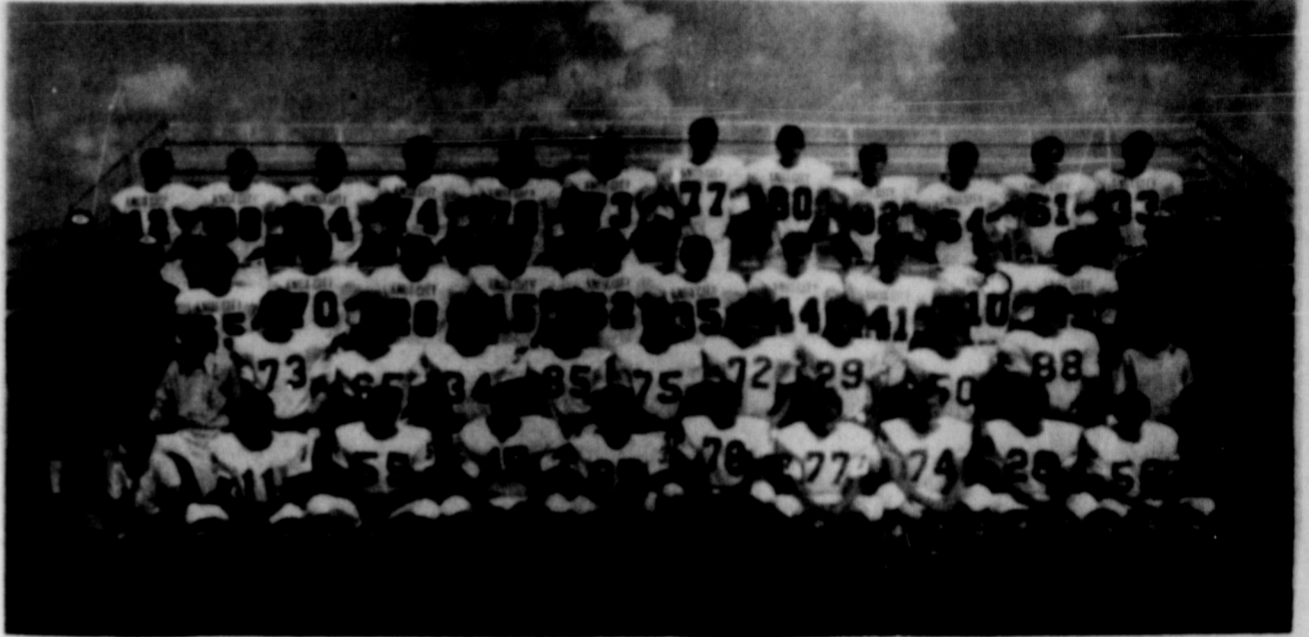
Gayle Campbell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Campbell, returned to Tarleton State College in Stephenville last week.

New Civic Club To Organize

1946 Study Club Disbands

After twenty-five years of social and civic leadership, the 1946 Study Club is disbanding, the present members forming the nucleus of a new civic club which will direct its efforts exclusively toward community service.

This new community service club will open to every woman in the community who has a sincere desire to help make Knox City a better place to live. Since all efforts will be directed toward local projects and improvements, this will not be a Federated Club.

A special invitation is being extended to all women who have recently moved to Knox City, in hopes that their ideas and suggestions may be utilized.

Women interested in belonging to such an organization are urged to attend a meeting at The Woman's Club, located at South Third and Avenue B on Wednesday, September 15, at 10:00 a. m. with Mrs. Paul Clayton as moderator.

The 1946 Study Club, organized as a young woman's club and sponsored by the Knox City Study Club, has served the community well and has been continuously active in furthering the programs of Knox City. To mention all of the achievements of this club would be impossible and the following highlights can only suggest the range of interests of the members through the past twenty-five years.

Twenty-five years ago tomorrow (Friday) the first meeting was held September 10, 1946, in the home of Mrs. Olvis Hamm and was federated the following November.

The first civic project was a religious Christmas program, "The Nativity", with a cast of approximately forty persons.

For its first money-raising project, the club sponsored a minstrel show with the proceeds going to furnish the nursery at the Knox County Hospital.

The members worked as a relief unit after the 1953 tornado, gathering and distributing clothing for the stricken families.

During the years, the club sponsored a Little Theatre group for the school; the Youth Center Project resulted in the city's building the Kennel as a local meeting place for youth groups; and each Christmas, the members sent gifts to the patients at the Vernon Mental Hospital and toys to the Children's Home in Abilene.

The 1946 Study Club also helped keep the city's voting strength at a maximum by faithfully telephoning residents to go to the polls with "Get Out the Votes" campaigns at virtually every election.

Such local health services as the mobile Chest X-Ray Unit and the Red Cross Blood Mobile have used the members as workers and through the years the club has sponsored the drives for the March of Dimes, Cancer Fund, Heart Fund, and West Texas Rehabilitation Center.

The club for years has sponsored the Junior-Senior Prom and one of the most serious projects of the club has been the Scholarship Fund, which provides a \$100 scholarship to a Knox City senior each year.

The dream of a club house for Knox City women has made a reality with the donation of a city lot by the late Dr. T. S. Edwards and Mrs. Edwards. Through the efforts of the Knox City Study Club and the 1946 Study Club, money was raised through various projects and through donations through interested citizens. The Woman's Club was opened to all local clubs, and for private teas, showers, and other social functions.

In the midst of these activities, the women met twice a month for regular programs conforming to the format set up by the Texas Federation. These programs fulfilled the objective of broadening and stimulating the minds of the members as well as offering an opportunity for a social gathering and an excellent

Dove Season Opens In North Zone

Because of limited space in last week's Herald, the map from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department with 1971 hunting regulations did not get in. However, the season for mourning doves opened just the same in the North Zone Wednesday, September 1, with shooting hours from 12 noon to sunset, and will continue through October 30. Daily bag limit is 10 and possession limit 20.

According to the regulations, shotguns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity and may not be larger than ten gauge. Hunting doves

with rifles is prohibited. No hunting is permitted in game refuges, state and federal parks, game reserves, within corporate city limits, or from public roads or road rights of way.

Certainly a tribute should be given Mrs. George Wall who was a charter member and has remained active in the club through all the years.

Although the membership of the 1946 Study Club has changed from year to year, every woman who has worked for the goals set by the club is to be commended for her efforts.

It is hoped that all women in the community will contribute their efforts toward the new community service club. It was emphasized that working women are also invited to participate, even though they are unable to attend regular meetings.

Livestock Brand Law Effective August 30

The new Texas law governing livestock brands went into effect Monday, August 30.

It is now necessary for all brands and marks to be registered with county clerks. According to Knox County Clerk Mrs. Zena Waldron, a new law passed during the last session of the Texas legislature gives producers a six-month period, from August 30 to February 29, 1972 to register to the brands and marks they use and the location on the animal.

"After the six-month period, any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a first-come basis," Mrs. Waldron said.

The new law further states that all such brands and marks must be re-recorded each 10 years. Each county clerk records for his given county only. So many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operation extend into more than one Texas county.

There is no limit to the number of brands or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person so long as requirements of the law governing the

recording and re-recording of livestock brands are met.

Minors who own livestock may have marks and brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or re-recorded as provided by the new law.

Legal Notice

TEXAS LEGISLATIVE SERVICE, 8-27-175.
S. B. No. 249 AS FINALLY PASSED AND SENT TO THE GOVERNOR.

AN ACT relating to the recording and rerecording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties, each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act, all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months, only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this act.


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Coaches' Comments

Knox County Conservation Aids Hunters And County Economy

Hunting season is almost here and if you are a hunting fan it won't be long before you can enjoy this popular sport. Dove hunting starts in September with quail season soon to follow. This season in Knox County promises to be a prosperous one with a good supply of dove and quail in most areas.

Good hunting areas don't happen by accident. Arche Lieb, local Soil Conservation Service representative, says they are the result of planned and established conservation practices by interested land owners.

Lieb said one of the principal objectives of the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District program is to improve the wildlife in the area by improving the wildlife habitat. This is done by providing services and information to farmers and ranchers who are interested in improving the wildlife on their land.

Wildlife food plantings, leaving brush strips or motts when controlling brush, management and conservation cropping systems are a few of the conservation measures being carried out which are improving our wildlife, Lieb said.

Good examples of where conservation programs have improved the wildlife can be seen on the C. P. Baker and D. C. Key ranches south of Munday, also, on the Bush Burnett and League Davis ranches near Knox City.

Each year hunters spend mil-

lions of dollars to hunt dove and quail. Good hunting areas mean more hunters. Land owners can supplement their income with hunting leases. Local merchants will also benefit by increased sales.

The Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District, in cooperation with the local Chambers of Commerce at Munday and Knox City, will continue to supply information to out of county hunters, on day hunting leases available, as they have in the past.
