Lone Star Gas Asks For Increase In Rates

Dallas, Texas - Lone Star Gas Company announced that it filed an application with the Texas Railroad Commission Friday, May 11, for an increase in the city gate rate for gas delivered to each town served by the company in Texas. Lone Star said the proposed increase is the result of higher costs of maintaining an adequate gas supply for customers and contracting for new supplies to meet the growing demand. The cost adjustments would mean an 8.1-cent per thousand cubic feet increase in the city gate rate, and an increase of \$10.5 million in Lone Star's annual revenues when costs are flowed through to customers, based on a 1972 volume of approximately 130 billion cubic feet. The company further noted that all proposed rate increases are cost justified and with nationally established price control guidelines for utilities established last year. Dr. W. H. Questions and Answers

Q. I've been farming for the past 3 years, and I had a net profit each year of about \$2,000, but I've never paid any social security contributions. Can I go back 3 years and get social security credit for these earnings?

A. Yes, you can get social security credit if you file tax returns reporting these earnings. Get in touch with any office of the Internal Revenue Service to file the returns and pay the social security contributions. The Internal Revenue Service will forward the information to the Social Security Administration.

Q. I'm retired and get monthly social security checks. My son, who's almost 18 and has been an epileptic since he was born, also gets monthly payments. A friend told me he thought I should find out about childhood disability benefits for my son. Since my son already gets a check, what would be the point in applying for another benefit?

A. There are two reasons you might want to consider. Your son's checks will stop at 18 unless he is a full-time student. However, if he qualifies for childhood disability benefits, he can get checks as long as he's disabled. And if your son is found disabled and gets childhood disability benefits, he will also be eligible

for Medicare benefits after he has been receiving the disability benefits for 2 years.

Q. My uncle applied for monthly social security retirement payments last summer, and his checks started about 6 weeks after he applied. However, my father, who applied last November, had to wait nearly 3 months before his first check came. Why is there such a difference in how long it takes for the first check to arrive?

A. One possible explanation is that your father didn't have the necessary papers ready when he applied for benefits. Applications for retirement payments are processed faster if the applicant has complete information—such as proof of his age and a record of his most recent earnings—when he first applies. A birth or baptismal certificate recorded before age 5, a school record, an old insurance policy, or the birth certificate of a child that shows the applicant's age are acceptable age proofs. A record—such as a W-2, check stubs, or a tax return—is also acceptable proof of earnings. These proofs help start payments sooner.

Q. I'll soon be 65 and eligible for Medicare hospital insurance. Can you tell me

what costs Medicare hospital insurance helps pay for?

A. Expenses covered under Medicare hospital insurance include a semi-private room, operating room charges, regular nursing services, drugs furnished by the hospital, laboratory tests, X-ray and other radiology services, medical supplies, use of appliances and equipment, and medical social services.

Hospital insurance can also help pay for some follow-up care after you leave the hospital.

If you want more information about Medicare, call, write, or visit any social security office.

Q. My brother, who's 49, can't work because of a heart condition. He gets income every month from a small apartment he rents, and he claims he can't get disability benefits from social security because of this rental income. Is he right?

A. No. Even though your brother has rental income, he can get monthly social security disability payments if he is found eligible for them. Have your brother call, write, or visit any social security office as soon as possible to apply.

A dependent widower may elect to receive reduced social security payments at 60 and full payments at 65.

Teachers May Be Eligible

School teachers who get social security monthly benefits on their own work record, as a widow, or as a wife, may be eligible to get some social security benefits during some of the summer months.

Although a teacher's contract is an annual salary, paid in twelve monthly installments if the teacher so requests, there can be one, two or three months during the summer when no work is done.

For teachers, the same as any other social security beneficiary, when they do not work and earn more than \$75 a month gross, they can get their social security check.

There's an easy way for teachers to determine if they are qualified for their monthly social security check. Divide your yearly contract salary by the number of the work days set by your state. This will give you the daily rate of pay.

For example: If you have an annual salary as a teacher of \$600 and your state requires 190 workdays, you divide the \$600 by 190 and you then have a daily rate of pay of \$3.16. If you work only three, or any part of three days during a month, then you would have earnings of less than \$75 a month. If you work on four or more days during a summer month, then you would be over the \$75 a month and would not be entitled to get your social security check for that month.

Discover Flash For Fun And Pictures

NEW YORK (ED)—Does photography, to you, mean a steady day job or are you possibly missing some of your greatest picture opportunities by not your thinking and started using flash.



Flash adds little to the complication of your picture-taking, while adding greatly to your subject possibilities. Complication, actually, is probably too strong a word. All you have to remember when you are using flash is that, first, it is most effective from 4 to 10 feet. Too close and you will get a washed-out effect; too far and the picture will be dark.

The second thing to remember is to stand at an angle to any shiny surface, so that the flash does not reflect in it. To avoid shadows, keep your subjects away from the wall.

To achieve even lighting in a group picture, try to have each person reasonably equidistant from the camera.

Finally, keep an ample supply of film and magazines on hand so you'll be ready whenever the opportunity offers. With a magazine on your

camera, you'll be able to snap four shots in quick series to capture all the action.

The other basic rules of good picture-taking, such as holding your camera steady and shooting your subjects while they're doing something other than staring at the camera, apply indoors as well as out.

Bearing these few simple hints in mind, you're ready to flourish into indoor picture-taking. Your subjects can vary from the baby expressing his opinion of spinach (flash first, clean up later) to Dad expressing his reaction to the big game on TV. From formal party to casual get-together, see that your camera is ready and handy.

Remember with an aim-and-shoot model such as the Kodak Instamatic X-15 camera, anyone can snap a picture. Encourage your family and

For Great Sauces—Think Italian



SALSA DI POMIDORO — tomato sauce, simmering in the kettle — is as useful to the chef as a short course in Italian cooking.

NEW YORK (ED) — As every good cook knows, nothing breaks up the monotony of mealtime as tastily as a repertory of international specialties. Italy's gift to American tables starts with her memorable sauces.

Spaghetti dressed in real Italian sauce is nothing less than a dining experience. What's more, Salsa di Pomodoro — basic tomato sauce — is as useful to the chef as a short course in Italian cooking. Once you've mastered the original, there's no limit to the possible variations on the theme. Add chopped chuck, or a spicy combination of beef and sausage meat, and you have a rich meat sauce. Spoon the sauce over pork chops and oven-bake for an easy version of traditional pizza. Or just serve as-is over your favorite pasta.

You'll find so many uses for this sauce that it will pay to make substantial quantities, reserving the extra for next week's dinner. This recipe — adapted for American quick-cooking preferences by Progresso kitchens — makes four cups of sauce; double ingredients for larger amounts.

HOMEMADE TOMATO SAUCE

- 1/4 cup imported Italian olive oil
- 1/4 cup onion, chopped
- 1/4 cup green pepper, chopped
- 3 large cloves garlic, chopped
- 2 cans (8 oz. ea.) imported Progresso Italian peeled tomatoes
- 1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce
- 2 tps. salt
- 1/4 tsp. fresh ground pepper
- 1 tsp. oregano
- 1 Tbsp. sugar

Using deep saucepan, saute onion, green pepper and garlic in olive oil, five minutes. Add tomatoes, tomato sauce, salt, pepper, oregano and sugar. Break up tomatoes slightly. Bring mixture to a boil, cover and simmer gently 45 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove cover, simmer fifteen minutes. Makes four cups.
