## Heart Fund Drive Termed Successful

According to Knox City Heart Fund Chairman, Mrs. Ted Alexander, the results of the Heart Fund drive held Sunday, February 17, were very good.

Mrs. Alexander said she wished to express her thanks to the volunteer workers who made the drive and to all who contributed to the Heart Fund.

The volunteer workers who made the drive distributed information concerning the work done by the American Heart Fund and gave each

person visited a pamphlet which lists the warning signs of heart attack and stroke.

Warning signs associated with heart attacks include:

1. Prolonged, heavy pressure or squeezing pain in the center of the chest behind the breastbone.

2. Pain may spread to the shoulder, arm, neck, or jaw.

3. Pain or discomfort is often accompanied by sweating, nausea, vomiting, or shortness of breath may occur.

4. Symptoms may subside and then return.

Danger signals indicating possible stroke are:

1. Sudden, temporary weakness, or numbness of the face, arm, or leg.

2. Temporary difficulty or loss of speech, or trouble understanding speech.

3. Transient dimness or loss of vision, particularly in one eye.

4. An episode of double vision.

5. Unexplained headaches, or a change in patterns of your headaches.

6. Temporary dizziness or unsteadiness.

7. Recent change in personality or mental ability.

Any person having one or more of these signs should act immediately by calling his doctor. If the doctor is unavailable, go immediately to a hospital emergency room.

### Flu 'Bug' In KC

Although the flu "bug" has just about hit everyone in Knox City and surrounding area, the Knox City Schools are still open. According to a school spokesman, the highest percentage of absentees was last Friday with approximately 25% absent that day. Wednesday the absenteeism was down with only about 90 students out.

The teachers have been holding their own with only two or three out at a time.

The Texas Department of Health has advised the school to remain open if at all possible.

According to a hospital spokesman, all flu cases were being treated at home unless they were of a severe nature.

### Dr. Ungvary To Speak At Local Church Sunday

Dr. Alexander S. Ungvary, professor of history at McMurry College in Abilene will be speaking at the morning worship service at The First United Methodist Church this coming Sunday.

Before World War II, Dr. Ungvary was professor in the Department of History of the State University of Kolozsvar, Transylvania, which is now Cluj, Romania. He left this position when the Communists took over the University.

This was the second time that Dr. Ungvary had fled his home for political reasons. In 1940 he had fled from Nazi rule in his home in Hungary. This time he was caught and tried in Rumania for political reasons and condemned to eight years in prison. In 1948 he escaped from prison and came to the United States.

### Hospital Sets Apr. Election

The Board of Directors of the Knox County Hospital District have set Saturday, April 6, for the election of hospital board members. The election will be held jointly with the city and school elections.

Filing deadline is 25 days prior to the election date.

Anyone wishing to file as a candidate must be 18 years of age or older, must be a registered, qualified voter of the district, own land subject to taxation by the district, and submit a petition to the secretary of the board, Richie Smith, in Munday. The petition must contain the names of not less than 25 qualified voters residing within the boundary of the hospital district.

Bobby and Carol Lewis returned to Houston Sunday where Bobby will undergo further treatment at M.D. Anderson Hospital.

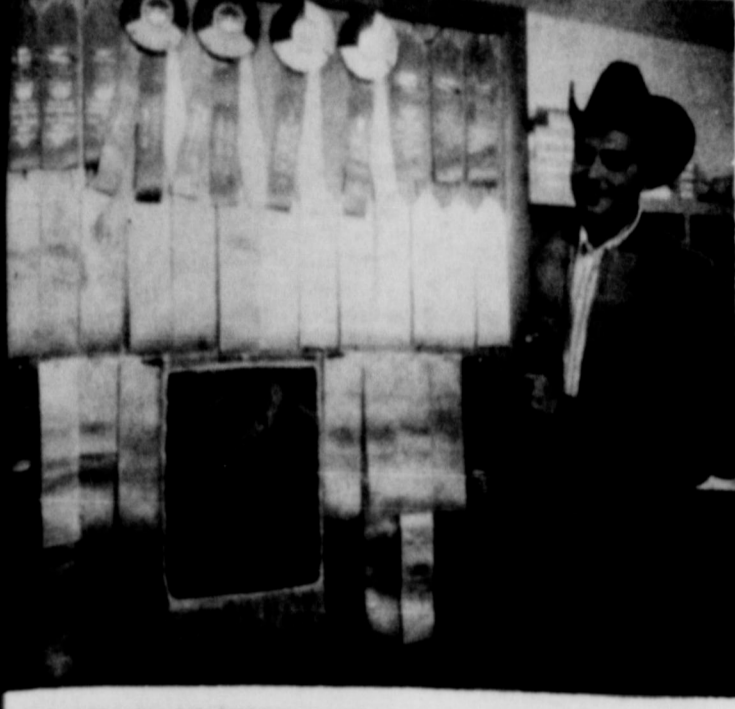
Bobby is in Room 203 West at the hospital.

### Munday Man Asks Election

Clyde Boose has authorized the News to announce his candidacy for the office of County Judge of Knox County, and submits the following statement to the voters of Knox County for their consideration in making a decision at the polls on May 5:

"I am a licensed attorney, having been admitted to the State Bar of Texas in July, 1941. I served as County Attorney of Nolan County for twelve years. I presently live at 541 Irvin Street in Munday.

"I am fully aware of the duties of the office of County Judge, and I pledge to serve all the citizens of Knox County wherever they reside in the County and to spread the services of the County Government provided by law, in such manner that all portions of the County will be represented. Although the County Judge has no vote in the Commissioner's Court, except in case of tie, or to make up a quorum in the Court, it is the responsibility of the office of County Judge to inform all citizens of the matters affecting their rights. I pledge to use every means of communication available to see that all citizens of Knox County are informed of issues so that they may present their views. In other words, public hearings will be had where ever needed and the appropriate notice will be given the public.

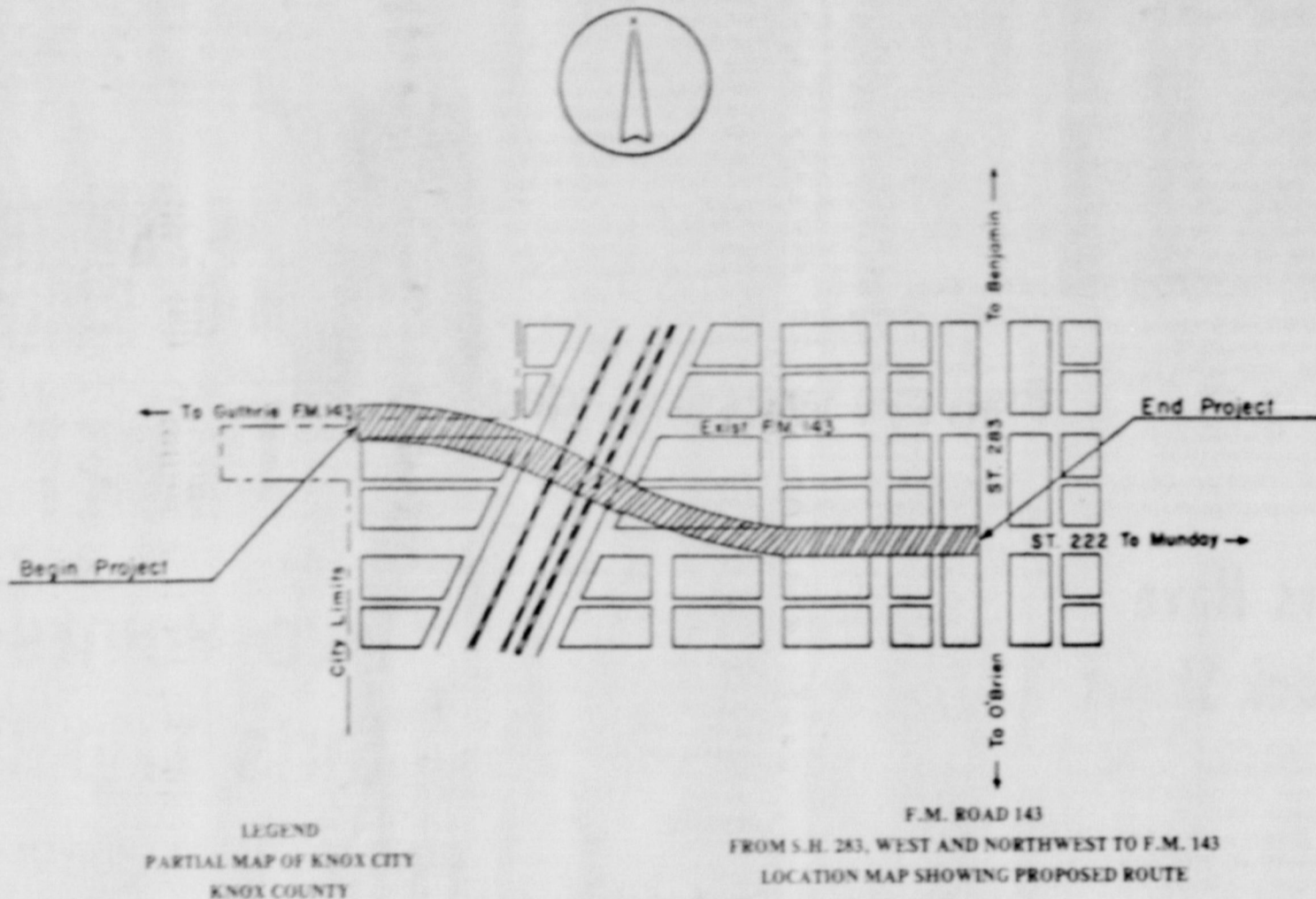

NOTICE AFFORDING OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC HEARING CORRIDOR [LOCATION] AND DESIGN [COMBINED HEARING]

**Legal Notice**

The Texas Highway Department is planning the improvement of F.M. Road 143, from the junction of State Highway 283 and State Highway 222, West and Northwest to F.M. Road 143. The proposed highway project will pass through a portion of the City of Knox City, in Knox County.

The proposed construction consists of concrete curb and gutter, grading, structures, base and surfacing of the route relocation. The relocation is planned in order to provide a more direct route for the continuity of State Highway 222 and F.M. Road 143. A 64-foot face-to-face curb and gutter municipal section is proposed for three blocks, from Main Street to the Santa Fe Railroad crossing, where it will transition into a 20-foot paved surface rural section.

A minimum of 90 feet of right of way will be required for the three blocks from Main Street (S.H. 222) to the railroad, and a minimum of 100 feet from the railroad west to the tie-in with existing F.M. 143. New right of way will be required for the realignment; however, there will be no displaced persons or businesses, or relocations on the project.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design, environmental studies and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the office of Alvin D. Alexander, Assoc. Resident Engineer, Munday, Texas. Also, the drawings showing the proposed geometric design have been placed on file in the offices of the County Judge of Knox County and the Mayor of Knox City.

Information about the

State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displaced, and the relocation assistance office, as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way and construction, can be obtained at the Texas Highway Department District Office, P.O. Box 909, Childress, Texas 79201.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic, and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for this highway project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's office, or to Mr. Lewis H. White, District Engineer, Childress, Texas, on or before March 8th, 1974.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.

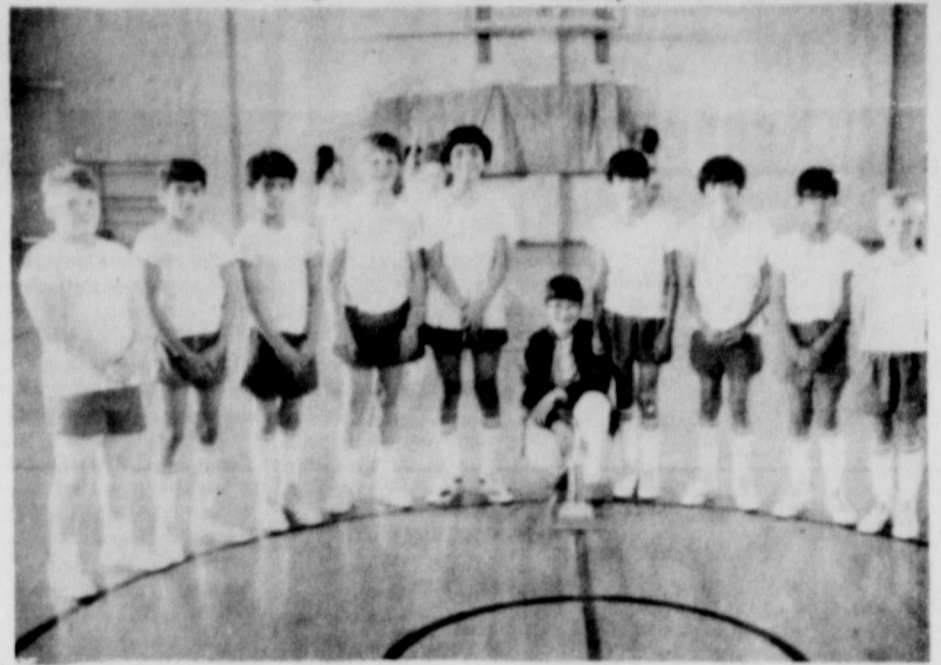

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# Letter To The Editor

Dear Friend of Alaska:

Now that the President has signed the Trans Alaska Pipeline Authorization Act, there is a widespread misimpression that construction of the line already has begun. As many as 600 persons come to Alaska each month in search on non-existent pipeline construction jobs. At best these people are disappointed. Unfortunately, many entire families find themselves stranded, cold and homeless without prospect of relief.

Alyeska began several months ago a campaign through the news media to correctly inform job seekers about pipeline employment. This campaign has been expanded recently to include advertisements, television newscasts and free informational brochures. But many hundreds still learn the truth too late and often tragically.

Perhaps you may have an opportunity to prevent even one such unfortunate occurrence, by sending this letter to a newspaper or an appropriate organization, by posting it in a conspicuous and appropriate place, or by passing it along to an interested friend or acquaintance.

The truth is construction has not begun, and none will begin until many outstanding legal and administrative hurdles are crossed. Furthermore, when this activity does commence, Alyeska will award contracts for the work to various construction companies. These firms will do all the hiring of workmen.

Therefore, applications for these jobs should not be submitted to Alyeska. Persons seeking construction jobs should watch for announcements of the award of contracts and the start of construction in the press and in trade journals, and apply directly to selected contractors.

Above all, we recommend that no one come to Alaska in search of a job. Job seekers should be certain before coming that jobs are available here for them. The unemployment rate in the State is the highest in the nation. The winters are the longest and the most severe. Furthermore, there is an Alaska law giving job preference to Alaskans.

We're trying to make these facts known to prevent hardship.
