

### GOVERNMENT COSTS RISE

For five years the cost of State govern ment in Texas has risen sharply, the U.S. census bureau reported this week after an exhaustive study of State finances.

During the five years between 1932 and 1937, the per capita cost of operation and maintenance rose from \$11.44 to\$17.98, an increase of \$6.54 for every man, woman and child in the State in five years.

The tax burden has increased in proportion, from \$17.12 per capita in 1932 to \$28.79 in 1937, an increase of \$11.44.

It is significant that this increase in cost is in connection with ordinary expenses of government, such as operation and maintenance, and does not take into account the new activities of the government in connection with social security.

Every citizen must contribute \$6.54 p r year year more than he was called upon to pay in 1932.

An investigation to determine the cause of this sharp rise in expenses should be eulightening. The taxation curve has risen much more rapidly than the business. Expenditures have risen much faster than the increase in population.

The figures indicate there is a crying need at Austin for real economy in government. They should tell us also that the people need to understand better how much their government is costing them.

Many of the taxes which provide the revenue to finance the increasingly expensive governmental establishments are hidden, but in the end the man who works for a living pays them.

When this fact is more clearly understood, there will be fewer demands for government benefits and services.

### "SET-UP ALIBI" KNOCKED DOWN

Beer tavern owners who furnish "set ups" to their customers must be liable for the conduct of those customers, Liquor Administrator Bert Fort warned last week.

Several tavern operators, he said, have attempted to evade responsibility for the fights and brawls at their places by claiming they sold no alcoholic beverages, but readily admitting they provided "set-ups" for arinking parties which became rowdy and caused a breach of the peace.

"It is not against the law to provide'setups' but tavern owners are required to police their establishments. The Liquor Board is issuing fair warning to tavern owners that it will not consider the 'set-up' alibi or any similar alibi at suspension or cancellation hearings."

#### 193 CLEMENCIES APPROVED

Typical of a month's work, the October turnover of the State Board of Pardons was reviewed last week by board member T. C. Andrews to give the people an idea of the board's activities.

During October, Judge Andrews said. the board made written recommendation to the Governor for 121 conditional pardons, 11 full pardons, 51 reprieves, and 10 other clemencies, a total of 193 favorable recommendations.

During the period 130 interviews were held with persons seeking clemency for convicts; 1,000 convict files were examined: 1,325 letters urging clemency were received and considered and about 2,250 letters were written to trial officers and others interested in clemency.

This work, Judge Andrews pointed out, is exclusive of the duties of the office of the board at Huntsville, where personal interviews with convicts are had.

### 150,000 TEXANS BENEFIT UNDER WAGE-HOUR ACT

Approximately 150,000 Texas workers have benefited from the Federal wagehour law through higher wages or shorter hours, Harry W. Acreman, executive secretary of the State Federation of Labor, estimated last week.

"The Federal law affects only those industries engaged in interstate commerce and therefore covers only about 300,000 workers in Texas," Acreman pointed out.

Since approximately 1,650,000 Texans have secured social security cards, the new law affects only about one-fifth of the Texas workers engaged in fields other than agriculture, domestic service, and government employment.

The only way the remaining 1,350 workers could be assured a minimum wage and a maximum on hours would be through the passage of a state wage-hour law covering all intrastate business, Acreman pointed out.






