# Train Mail Service May be Stopped

Reports reached the Herald this week that the Postoffice Department plans to discontinue its mail contract with the P&SF Ry. Co., and transport mail to and from Knex City and other towns now served by the train by motor truck instead.

The latest report is that preliminary work has been completed and the changeover will take place July 1.

Jeff Graham, Knox City postmaster, confirmed that the department had conducted a survey and the customary "re-sur-vey" of the mails in recent weeks, but said he has not been informed of the results of the survey or of definite plans for changing the service.

Graham added that he was recently informed that some postal officials believe the contemplated change might save as much as \$65,000 annually, and that Knox City and other towns affected would receive "equal or better" mail service.

The move is meeting considerable opposition from the 11th National Postal Transport Association, organization of railway postal clerks in this divi-

The public relations committee of the association contends that the change will not effect any saving, and will result in curtailed service because the mails will not be worked "between stations" if hauled by truck. They also point out that loss of the mail contract will likely cause the railroad company to discontinue passenger and express service on the line.

The association urged local residents to write their con-gressmen and senators protesting the change.

We feel that if we can select the best yielding cotton and the biggest percent of the farmers grow it, we can establish a market for our cotton at a premium price because of the uniform product. All mills would like to buy a large volume of uniform cotton and will pay to get it if available

There was very little difference in the yields last year with Western Stormproof being the highest yielder with 500 pounds of lint per acre and Stormproof No. 1 being second with 477 pounds.

The tests have been conducted for five years and the average per acre lint field for all tests over the five years has shown Deltapine 15 to be the highest yielder with 303 pounds of lint, Western Stormproof 285 pounds, Hy-Bred 275 pounds, Paymaster 263 pounds, Northern Star 246 pounds, Lankart 240 pounds and Qualla 238 pounds


