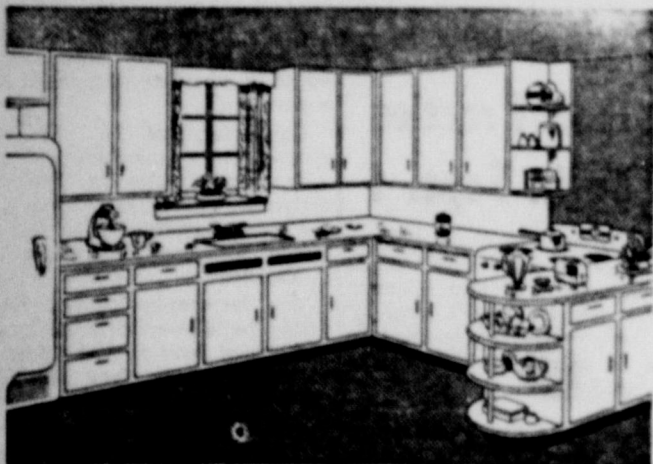

Show Flock Wins Honors for 4-H'er

(The following article about Charles Todd, Knox County 4-H boy, is reprinted from the Farmer-Stockman.)

Charles Todd, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmo Todd, does his 4-H Club work in two counties—Knox and Foard—but the center of his activities is the sheep business. One of his best projects is a herd of registered Hampshire sheep. He is also feeding a calf and is a member of the 4-H rifle club.

Charles started in the sheep business early. By the time he could walk, he was helping herd sheep.

The past year Charles and his sister purchased a half interest in a registered flock of Hampshires through the sale of bonds and cattle money. Then during 1952-53, he had excellent experience in learning about the high cost of feed and what water shortage means.

Charles first entered show competition in 1951 at the Texas and Oklahoma Fair. Since then he has shown crossbred and Hampshire sheep in Knox and Foard counties, San Angelo and Fort Worth shows, and the purebred sheep breeders show and sale at Georgetown and Temple. His sheep have won 4 grand championships, 3 championships, 2 reserve, 15 firsts, 11 seconds, 7 thirds, 3 fourths, 3 fifths, one seventh, 2 eighths and one twelfth.

In 1952 Charles was awarded the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Assn. county award for 4-H work completed.

Premium money, and money from sale of sheep have paid his expenses getting equipped for show business, his expenses incurred showing, and also feeding his show flock.

At present his show flock for registered sheep consists of two yearling rams, three yearling ewes, three ram lambs, three ewe lambs and three wether lambs.

Charles lives near Truscott in Knox County but attends school at Crowell in Foard County. He is 11 years old and will be in the seventh grade this fall.

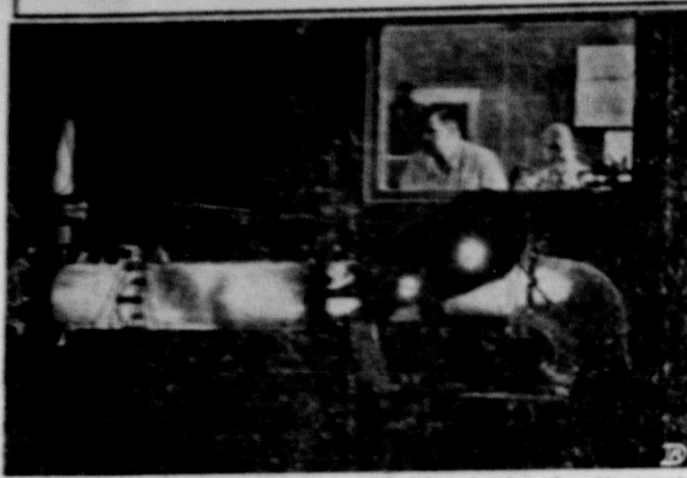

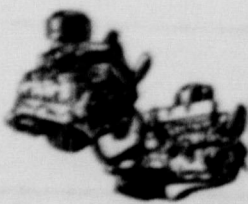

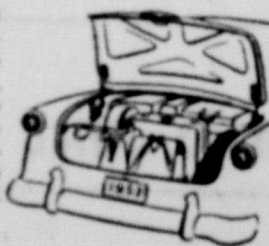

Wheat Referendum To Be Held Friday

Knox County farmers were reminded this week of the wheat marketing quota referendum which will be held tomorrow (Friday).

Seven voting places in the county will be open from 9 a. m. to 7 p. m., and each will be in charge of a local referendum committee of wheat growers appointed by the County PMA Committee.

J. T. Gilpin, supervisor of the Knox County PMA office, points out that the prices farmers receive for their 1954 wheat will be materially affected by the results of the referendum. If two-thirds or more of those voting favor marketing quotas, wheat loans at 90 percent of parity will be available to those who plant within their wheat acreage allotments.

If marketing quotas are rejected by the growers, quotas will not be in effect and the support rate on 1954 wheat will drop to 50 percent of parity for cooperators.

Acreage allotments will be in effect for the 1954 wheat crop regardless of the outcome of the referendum, Gilpin explained. If marketing quotas are in effect, those who exceed their allotments must store or dispose of their excess wheat as directed by the Secretary of Agriculture or pay the marketing penalty. The marketing penalty is 45 percent of wheat parity as of May 1, 1954.

Polling places for the referendum are: Benjamin, Court-house; Vera, Veterans Building; Goree, City Hall; Munday, City Hall; Sunset, School Building; Knox City, PMA office; and Rhineland, Lodge Hall.
