Cotton Damaged By Heavy Hail

Storm clouds drifting in from the southeast late Tuesday afternoon brought high winds and a small twister, accompanied by a driving rain and some hail.

The wind damaged the roof of the Barney Arnold home, and picked up a small sheet-iron building from the Arnold lot and deposited it in the Henry Jones lot. A chicken house at the Roy Baker home was overturned, and George Hardberger's television antenna tower was blown down.

East 4th street was blocked by a large mesquite tree, estimated to be fifty years old or more, that was broken off just above the ground. Elsewhere over town, several trees were broken or uprooted.


