sources, provides for converting 875 acres of lower grade cropland to permanent grass pastureland and revegetation on 75 acres of rangeland. About two miles of new fence have been constructed to protect grass plantings during establishment. This year Russell established

160 acres of Coastal bermuda grass pasture. He now has 740 acres of irrigated Coastal bermuda pasture. To complete his conservation plan, an additional 130 acres remain to be planted. Since this planting will be dry land, Blackwell Switchgrass will be used. Switchgrass was used in range reseeding on a 75 acre pasture and the results were so good Russell decided to use the grass for his pasture plantings.

According to Russell the key to successful establishment of grass planting is seedbed preparation, weed control, and fertilizer, "We have tried several methods of seedbed preparation" Russell stated, "but have had the best results with a clean, well prepared seedbed. Wood competition must be controlled. We have sprayed our seedings with 2-4-D sometimes two and three times," Russell continued, "As soon as competition is properly controlled, the proper amount of fertilizer should be applied," Russell concluded. The job is started on the Russell farm but Mr. Russell knows the management and follow-up which is needed will be the key to success or failure of his soil and water conservation plan. It takes time and money and technical know how, determination, and patience. The farm, and Mr. Russell stated it was the best thing that ever happened to the farm

II to show the appreciation of the citizens of Texas for the time spent in the service of this country by Texas veterans. The program was designed to enable a veteran to purchase a piece of the land which he fought to preserve and protect with only a small down payment, low interest rates. and payments covering a period of 40 years.

Since the days of the Republic, Texas has always rewarded her fighting heroes by donations land grants. Now that all public land has been disposed of, the Veterans Land Program is the next best way to permit Texas veterans to own a piece of land, Since its inception in 1949, the Veterans Land Program has stood on its own as one of the soundest state endeavors in modern times. It has been most successful and throughout the years has not cost the tax payers for its operation and the purchase of land. On the contrary, it has made a profit for the people of Texas over and above its cost of operation, according

Mr. Fitzgerald reported that all veterans who entered the service from Texas and are presently living in Texas would be permitted to purchase under the program. All those who resided to Texas for at least five years prior to making application to purchase under the program would also be eligible. Each veteran would be permitted to purchase under a contract of sale \$10,000 worth of land with a 5 per cent down payment, appraisal and service fees of \$50, and legal and recording fees not to exceed \$100. Interest charged the veterans on past purchases has not exceeded 4 1/2%. Payments would be semi-annual and re-payment

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

### Last Chance, Sign For Medicare Now

About 41 persons in Knox County will have their last chance to enroll for the voluntary part of Medicare during the general enrollment period which began October 1, reports Edwin S. Draughon, social security Manager for this county. These are the individuals who were over 65 by May 31, 1966, and who failed to sign up for "doctor bill" portion of Medicare, Others who did not sign up for this supplemental medical insurance within three months after their 65th birthday, now also have a second change to enroll.

Mr. Draughon said that approximately 96.3% of the eligible persons in Knox County have taken advantage of this part of Medicare.

Most persons who will be

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eligible during this "second chance" period, will receive a letter from the Baltimore office of the Social Security Administration some time this month. This letter will provide enrollment form which should be filled out and mailed

directly to Baltimore. Anyone wishing additional information should contact the Vernon Social Security office or see the representative when he comes to your city. \*\*\*\*\*

Apparently filing a tax return wasn't as bad a task as most taxpayers claimed here in Northern Texas, Sixty-five percent of the taxpayers filing individual income tax returns during 1967 got a refund. The computer rolled out 987,000 refund checks amounting to more than \$137 million, Brother, that's a lot of dough!

The good tax folks say that they still have several thousand refund checks that could not be delivered. If you haven't got your refund and haven't heard from it, either you made an error, or one of the processing employees gave the computer the wrong information, or else you hauled off and moved. If you still have a refund check coming and have not been noti fied of problems on the refund, sit down and write the Internal Revenue Service--tell them when you filed, what your social security number is, and how much refund check you are due. You will probably get your check.



### The Wonders Of Bacteria

This past week, the biology students have been making a close study of bacteria. They began their study with a detailed report on some of the characteristics and habitats of the small plant. The students then made a culture media, a substance on which the bacteria thrive, and innoculated them with four different kinds of material in which bacteria was present. After two or three days, the students observed the bacteria under microscopes. While observing the tiny plants, they noted its movements, if any, and its shape. During the time the bacteria was growing in the culture dishes the students tested different antibiotics and other such treatments to see if they had any effect on the growing bacteria. The results of these tests were recorded and turned in for grading by Mr. Winchester.
