

"From tests run by the home equipment specialists of the Rhode Island Agricultural Exper iment Station, a procedure of steps has evolved," she says.

First, take up all the loose dirt on your floor by sweeping and dust mopping

Next, wipe the floor with a clean cloth wrung from lukewarm water and borax soap sol ution. Rub stubborn spots until they're out.

Third, wipe the floor clean with a cloth wrung out in lukewars

Then wipe with a dry cloth t take up all possible moisture. Fifth, let the floor dry com

pletely without walking on it. Sixth, refinish with the original finish if the floor needs even if it means repainting, var nishing or shellacking. Be surthe floor is completely dry be-

fore taking this step.

The last step puts a protective coating over the floor, keeps the scuff marks off and makes it easier to remove those that do appear. Apply three to five coats of good water emulsion wax, be ing sure to allow each coat to dry for at least 30 minutes. With such protection on your floors. with a clean cloth dampened with emulsion wax.
