That the Knox City vicinity is in urgent need of road improvement is common knowledge to all. But a discussion on the subject entails some danger of confusing the matter to a still greater degree. There has been some contention that there should be a considerable sum available for this purpose outside of the Bond issue. But if we have our information right a county commissioner has no authority to extend county aid in road improvement until the road overseers have used up the road time of those subject to road work; then if there is still further need the county fund becomes available. The road overseers have until the second Monday in February to make their report and they almost invariably wait until just before that time to do the work. There is then no time left for extra work, a new road overseer is appointed and waits his turn to do his portion of the work. In this way road work has drifted down to the minimum in this district. If the overseers could warn out the roads and put in the time now a great benefit would result to the crop movers through the fall and if any places get impassable later on, the county can be appealed to and a proportion of the common fund applied. What our road situation is at present is extremely bad. In all we may expect very little to be accomplished during the extra session.

It happened over at Wichita Falls, a woman asked permission to mend her stocking behind the counter of a department store. With her going also disappeared two expensive dresses. There is always some organization of men on the strike and it is the Texas miners. The operators claim that the present agreement is a matter of about 25 cents of wage, which is \$2.65 per ton for ordinary underground work, places the coal out of the reach of the buyer, and therefore, they claim that operation is impossible. They have prepared a schedule of \$2.00 per ton and \$5.00 per day for underground work, but the miners flatly refused the offer and so the mines will be closed indefinitely. Whether the miners think they can do better by not working at all than for a reasonable wage we cannot say, but one thing is sure beyond any reasonable doubt; miners will have to accept less than \$7.50 per day if cotton raisers and editors are expected to buy any coal.

Photography 100 Years Old.

This is the centenary of photography. So rapidly does the world progress, so essential a part of our civilization has become the taking of pictures, that it is difficult to realize that the art was unknown when Monroe first entered the White House. Yet in 1820 Niepce, first of all men, succeeded in producing what might be called a photograph, a rude impression on a silver plate rendered sensitive by a layer of asphaltum saturated with oil of lavender.

And though this discovery awakened world-wide interest at the time, this method could not be put into general use, and not until 1839 did Daguerre succeed in producing the first practical photograph. After that date the art advanced rapidly, so rapidly, in fact, that before 1850 the daguerrotype was common in every village in every family. From the silver plates of Niepce to the motion picture of today is a long step, a step which but illustrates the rapidity with which modern civilization advances.

It Did Come Suddenly.

An unusually interesting communication was received by a New York life insurance company from the Dahlstrom Metallic Door company of Chicago. A letter, pointing out the advantages of insurance, was mailed to Dahlstrom on November 16, 1920. A part of this letter read as follows: "Have you ever thought that your turn may come suddenly. Suppose it did--" The answer to this question, as written by some unknown person, is as follows: "It did. He's dead. Returning letter and postcard. Can't forward. Keeping blotter. Can use this."

Homes That Preachers Came From.

It is interesting to note the type of homes that preachers come from. In the Methodist denomination 66.7 per cent of the preachers come from farmers' homes and 11.8 per cent from preachers' homes. In the southern Presbyterian denomination 47.7 per cent come from farmers' homes and 18 per cent of the preachers come from parsonages. In the Presbyterian of the United States of America 50 per cent come from farmers' homes, while 15 per cent come from parsonages--From Georgia Methodist Conference Notes in Atlanta Constitution.
