## WHAT DOES THE BIBLE SAY?

**CLIPPING THE BIBLE:**

Paul, an inspired writer, said: "There being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." (Rom. 5:1) James, another inspired writer says: "By works is a man justified, AND NOT BY FAITH ONLY." (James 2:24) Question: Does Paul contradict James? Certainly not! Does James contradict Paul? No! Should we out-REJECT the statement of either inspired writer? We should never be guilty of REJECTING any portion of God's word, but look for a solution. Cutting out a verse of scripture does not settle the problem. Paul had been arguing that we are justified by faith in Christ, instead of by works of the law. James was arguing that faith without works would not justify. James was not arguing that the works of the law of Moses would justify, but that faith in Christ would not justify without obedience. NOTE: "Though he were a Son, yet learned he obedience by the things which he suffered; and being made perfect, he became the author of eternal salvation UNTO ALL THEM THAT OBEY HIM." (Heb. 5:8-9) AGAIN: "But God be thanked, that ye were servants of sin but ye have OBEYED FROM THE HEART that form of doctrine which was delivered you. BEING THEN MADE FREE FROM SIN; ye became the servants of righteousness." We are going to have a clip this out of the Bible or else admit that a man is justified by a faith which works, and NOT BY FAITH ONLY. Let us not be "Bible clippers," but accept all of God's word.
