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



Grasshoppers are likely to be more widespread in the west and midwest this summer but are expected to be less destructive than in 1958.

A USDA-State survey made last fall showed almost 23 /m'ilion acres with enough grass hoppers to damage crops and grass. The effective chemical treatment of 5 million infested acres last summer not only saved crops and grass but is now pay ing dividends in fewer grasshop

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
