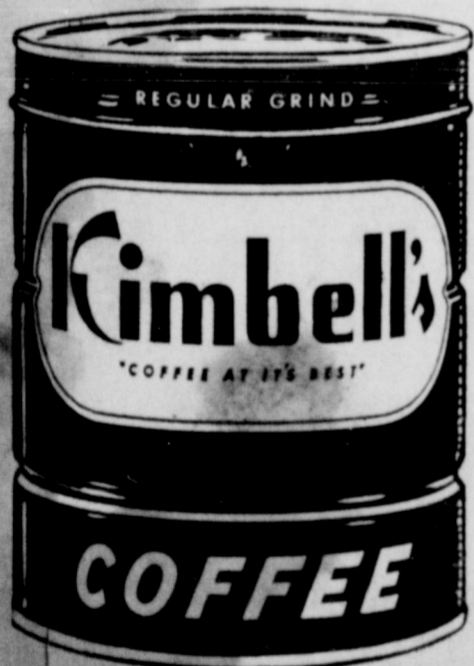

### Use of Fertilizer Important To Soil

The use of fertilizer on Texas crops and pastures will pay big dividends in the areas where plant food is needed to boost yields.

The cheapest, easiest and best method for determining fertilizer needs is to test the soil. But, adds W. F. Bennett, extension soil chemist, the soil test is no better than the soil sample from which the test is made.

In fact, points out Bennett, chemical tests based on poorly taken soil samples may actually be misleading. Here are suggestions from the chemist on how to take a good soil sample.

A spade, probe or auger can be used for taking the soil sample. Sampling should be done to a depth of six inches. If a spade is used, dig a V-shaped hole to the six inch depth and take a half inch slice of soil from the smooth side of the hole. Then cut away all but the center one inch of the slice and place it in the container being used for collecting the individual samples from which the composite sample will come.

Take a composite sample from each soil type in the field. For example, take a sample from the level ridgetop and another from the slope. In getting the composite sample, from 10 to 15 individual samples should be taken from over the area. These should be collected in a clean container and thoroughly mixed before the soil for the composite sample is placed in the sample box. In taking the random samples, Bennett says field depressions, old fence lines or unusual areas within the sample area should be avoided. Too

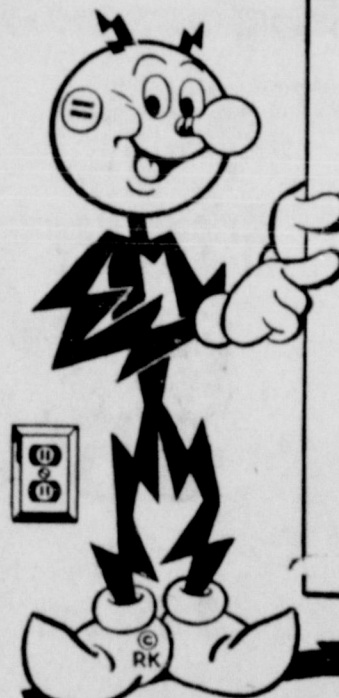

## CONFERENCE FOR COUNTY JUDGES, COMMISSIONERS SLATED AT A&M

County judges and commissioners from all sections of Texas will attend a conference scheduled for Texas A&M's Memorial Student Center, February 24-27. The County Judges' and Commissioners' Conference is being co-sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and County Judges' and Commissioners' Association of Texas.

According to V. G. Young, state agricultural agent, and President Ralph M. Hall, of the sponsoring organizations, the three-day "back-to-school" conference program was developed from suggestions by county officials. Its primary purpose is to give those attending a better understanding of the many problems which face commissioners courts in these fast-changing times.

Such topics as the legal aspects

of commissioners courts and county judges offices; road machinery operation and maintenance; county finances, including budgets tax rates, county funds and boards of equalization; probate and juvenile courts; road construction and maintenance; right-of-way problems and the importance of agriculture to the economy of Texas counties will be discussed by outstanding authorities in the respective fields.

Many of the speakers will come from the various parts of the Texas A&M College System, State Highway Department, Office of the Attorney General, and the Judges' and Commissioners' Association. District Judge J. Harris Gardner and Attorney R. Dean Moorhead both from Austin are also featured speakers.

Young said that advance registrations for the conference were good. He added that information on registration along with copies of the program had been sent to all county agricultural agents and that they would be happy to supply additional information to county officials on the conference.

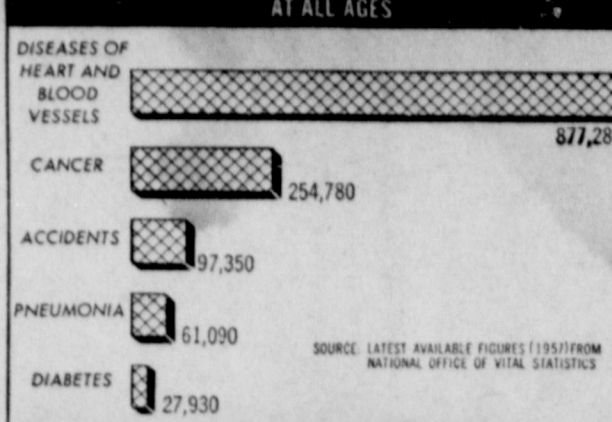

## Less Grasshopper Damage Expected During Summer

Grasshoppers are likely to be more widespread in the west and midwest this summer but are expected to be less destructive than in 1958.

A USDA-State survey made last fall showed almost 23 million acres with enough grasshoppers to damage crops and grass. The effective chemical treatment of 5 million infested acres last summer not only saved crops and grass but is now paying dividends in fewer grasshoppers.

The total acreage infested in Texas is placed at 3,460,000, according to Texas Agricultural Extension Service entomologists. The heaviest infestations were found in the two northern tiers of counties in the Panhandle and those along the Oklahoma line on the eastern side of the area.

In the South Plains area only spotted infestations were found by the surveyors. The infestation in the north central area was listed as light and these counties primarily are those located to and including the Red River Valley from Childress eastward to Grayson. Other light infestations were noted in McLennan, Coryell and Lampasas counties in Central Texas and in the river bottomlands of Johnson, Ellis and Navarro counties.

The entomologists point out that weather conditions between now and hatching time will have a strong bearing on the number of hoppers which emerge from egg beds found during the survey last fall. Cool, wet weather with heavy rains during the spring hatching season could greatly reduce the hopper population, say entomologists. Predators and grasshopper parasites

and also have pronounced effect on the infestations, they add. A check will be made during the hatching season to determine the areas where control measures may be needed. Farmers and ranchers in the areas where infestations could cause trouble are advised to keep a close watch on the egg beds during the hatching season.
