Missionary Conferences Set By KC And Benjamin Methodists

The "kick-off" rally of the fourth annual United Methodist Missionary Conference in Knox City will be Friday evening, February 18, at 7:30 to begin the three-day event. This rally will mark Benjamin's second annual conference.

Leaders in the conference will be Betty Anderson of Lubbock, a United Methodist laywoman, who is an outstanding authority on the work of the United Methodist Church. Mrs. Anderson will present the inspirational side of the Quadrennial Missional Priorities.

Her husband, Dr. John A. Anderson, is associate professor of biochemistry at Texas Tech University and they are the parents of two sons, Art, a 19-year-old sophomore at Austin College, and Dale, a Coronado High School junior, who is 16 years old.

Mrs. Anderson earned her B.S. degree in Home Economics at North Texas State University and her M.S. in Home and Family Life at Texas Tech University.

She has done notable work in many civic, governmental, and cultural causes and in

conference, lives in Roscoe and is a ministerial student at McMurry. David has been in "mission" in a number of unique ways to which he testifies.

Jacinto Alderete made his home in Socorro, New Mexico, until he finished high school. He then studied two years at the University of Texas at El Paso. He received a degree from Pan American College at Edinburg. Alderete earned his Masters of Theology from SMU's Perkins School of Theology and served churches at Weslaco, Sherman, Harlingen, and Crosbyton.

His wife, Betty, is a graduate of West Texas State University and teaches in Amarillo's Caprock High School. Their son, Wesley, is a junior pre-med student at SMU. Their daughter, Francine, is an eighth grade student. Jacinto has held his present directorate of Wesley Community Center in Amarillo for eight years.

A prominent farmer-businessman, churchman and United Methodist of Hart, Robert Hawkins is another leader for the conference and a very effective witness.

Having been inspired through the Lay Witness Movement, he has taken every opportunity to sing and tell the news of Jesus Christ. Recently, he and others from his church were in Girlstown for a special service and saw the need for a chapel for which a fund was started. Hawkins spends much of his time and talents singing, witnessing, and raising funds for "Hart Chapel" in Girlstown, USA.

Carroll Lanier, superintendent of the Whiteface campus of Girlstown, USA, will also lead in the missionary conference. He has a natural enthusiasm in telling the "Girlstown Story" and travels often with Robert Hawkins to spread the news of the Hart Chapel project.

Separate schedules have been set up for the Knox City and Benjamin churches.

Knox City's schedule begins Friday at 7:30 p.m. with a missionary rally in which Johnny Ray Watson and David Hestand will participate.

On Saturday at 7:00 a.m. there will be a men's breakfast in the Fellowship Hall with Johnny Ray. Watson will again participate in the noon luncheon at 12:00 for youth, seventh through twelfth grades. At 2:30 p.m. a ladies' tea is scheduled followed by a covered dish supper at 6:00 p.m. and missionary rally at 6:30 p.m. with Jacinto Alderete and Johnny Ray.

Sunday's schedule includes Sunday School at 10:00 a.m., followed at 11:00 by the missionary service with Jacinto and Betty Anderson. The closing missionary rally is set for 6:00 p.m. when Robert Hawkins and Carroll Lanier will be in charge. Youth Fellowship will be the final event and will begin at 7:00 p.m.

Benjamin activities will begin Friday at 1:00 p.m. when Johnny Ray Watson presents a program during assembly at the Benjamin School. A missionary rally is set for 6:00 o'clock the same evening with Johnny Ray and David Hestand.

On Saturday at 10:00 a.m. there will be a missionary coffee and children's refreshments with Johnny Ray.

Beginning Sunday at 9:45 a.m., a missionary service will be held with Jacinto Alderete and Betty Anderson as leaders. Sunday school will follow at 10:45 a.m. and the closing missionary rally with Robert Hawkins and Carroll Lanier is set for 7:30 p.m.

A Benjamin man, Clifford Damron Roberson, was killed instantly Sunday at approximately 11:05 a.m. in a one-car accident 3.3 miles south of Crowell, on State Highway 6 when he apparently lost control of his car and hit a bridge abutment, according to a Department of Public Safety State Trooper.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock in the Vera Methodist Church with the Rev. Roland Moore of Tulia officiating. Burial was in the Vera Cemetery under the direction of Smith Funeral Home.

Born May 16, 1903 in Erath County, his parents were the late Jim and Lottie Roberson. He married Cordie Lee Roberson on February 25, 1922 in Vera. She preceded him in death on March 4, 1975 in Knox City. He married Stella Hudspeth in 1976. Mr. Roberson was a retired farmer and a Methodist.

Survivors include three sons, Joe Wayne of Gariand, Charles of Plano, and Bobby of Benjamin; one brother, Fred Roberson of Denton; two sisters, Mrs. Quantia Jefcoat of Dallas and Mrs. Jack Timberlake of Levelland; seven grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

City Sales Taxes Increase In '76

AUSTIN -- Comptroller Bob Bullock announced Thursday that Texas cities received a total of \$302.9 million in city sales tax rebates last year, a 14 percent increase over the 1975 calendar year.

The cities received \$264.5 million in 1975, Bullock said. The totals are included in an analysis prepared by Bullock's office showing the total rebates received by Texas cities for the calendar years

1975 and 1976. The City of Houston led the state in total rebates with a total of \$62.6 million in 1976. Dallas collected \$35.3 million, San Antonio \$18.9 million, Fort Worth \$12.3 million and Austin \$9.1 million.

The one percent city sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the four percent state sales tax and is returned to the cities by the Comptroller's Office on a monthly basis.

Knox City's 1976 total was \$32,490.44, up 15 percent above the 1975 total of \$28,154.91.

Munday showed a 13 percent gain, totalling \$28,391.52 in 1976 over its \$25,160.08 in 1975.

Haskell had \$75,044.18, a 16 percent gain over 1975's \$68,114.94.

Rochester's \$8,739.71 for 1976 reflected a 45 percent increase over the 1975 total of \$6,046.89.

O'Brien had a seven percent increase, totalling \$706.52 in 1976 to \$659.09 in 1975.

Seymour's \$73,551.11 was a 12 percent gain over last

year's \$65,849.65. Stamford had \$107,402.41 in 1976 to its \$85,351.40 in 1975, up 26 percent.

Rule had a 14 percent increase from \$9,274.24 in 1975 to \$10,565.29 in 1976. Aspermont's \$24,684.14 in 1976 was up 11 percent over the 1975 total of \$22,261.24.
