TWO HOMES, TWO BUSINESSES

Knox City Continues To Build

Knox City is "on the move" as evidenced by all the new building and remodeling now taking place. Two new residences are under construction, one for Mr. and Mrs. Sammy Grindstaff on South Fourth Street and one for the parsonage of the First Baptist Church located directly west of the present parsonage on South Central and South Third (West).

The Knox County Lumber Company, which began its new construction several months ago, is greatly adding to the appearance of Avenue A with the almost-complete, new building covering 3,200 square feet which adjoins the existing 1,600 square foot structure.

Tommy Kent, owner of White Auto Store, has purchased the two buildings adjoining his present corner location at South Central and North Second Street and is in the process of remodeling the building south of the one he now occupies for a new furniture store in addition to his present stock. The building directly west has been bought for additional storage, he said.

Mrs. Dessie Egenbacher and Mrs. Romain Stubbs, who with three of their brothers, own the building at South Central and South Second are having the old awning removed, thus adding to the appearance of the downtown area.

Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Sanderson are adding a room and double garage to their residence at 302 South Third. Lynn Electric Motor Company completed an addition to their building on Main Street several months ago, and General Telephone Company of the Southwest has just finished construction of a building to house additional equipment.

The construction seems to indicate a healthy economy for our town. In fact, several merchants reported this year's Christmas business as the "best ever."

Most Knox City businesses will be closed again next Monday January 1, in observance of New Year's Day, one of the holidays chosen by the general membership of the Chamber of Commerce.

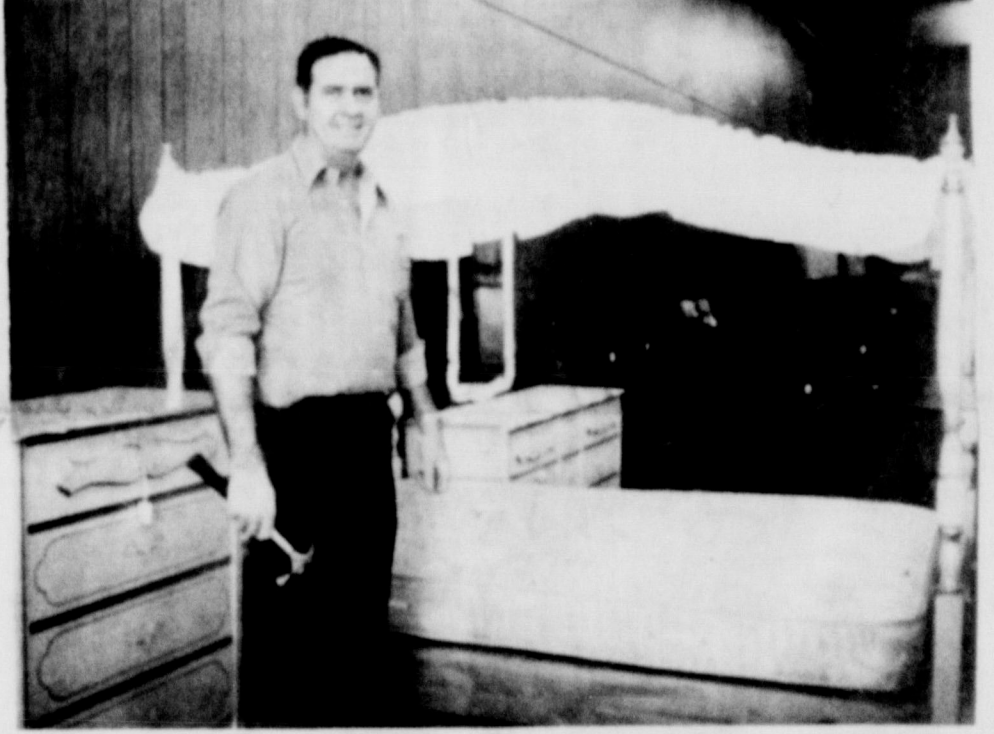
Mrs. Doris Crowover explained that last Monday was the only day set for the Christmas holidays but several businesses chose to remain closed Tuesday also.

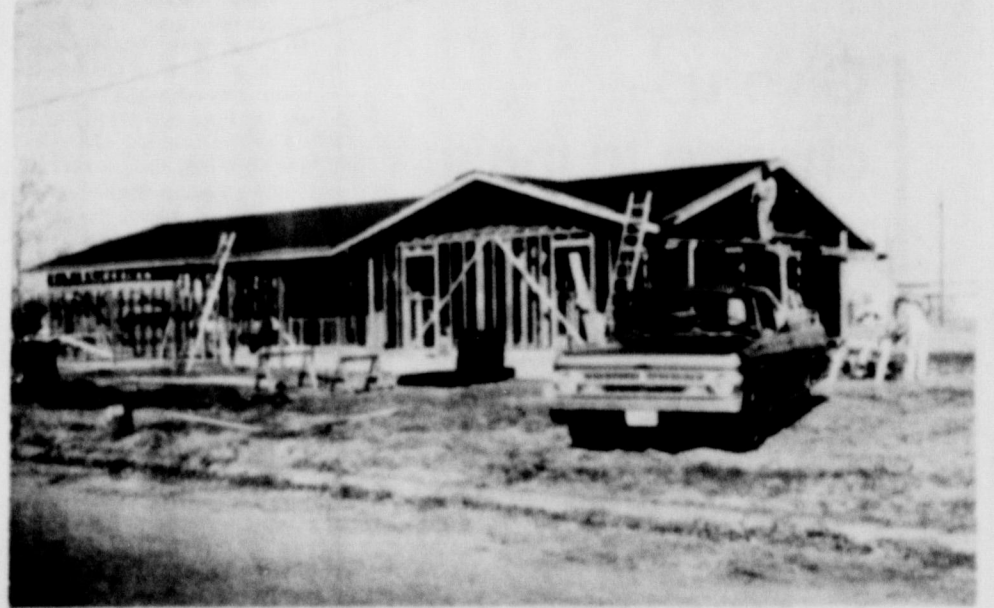
Several service stations and cafes have indicated that they would remain open Monday.



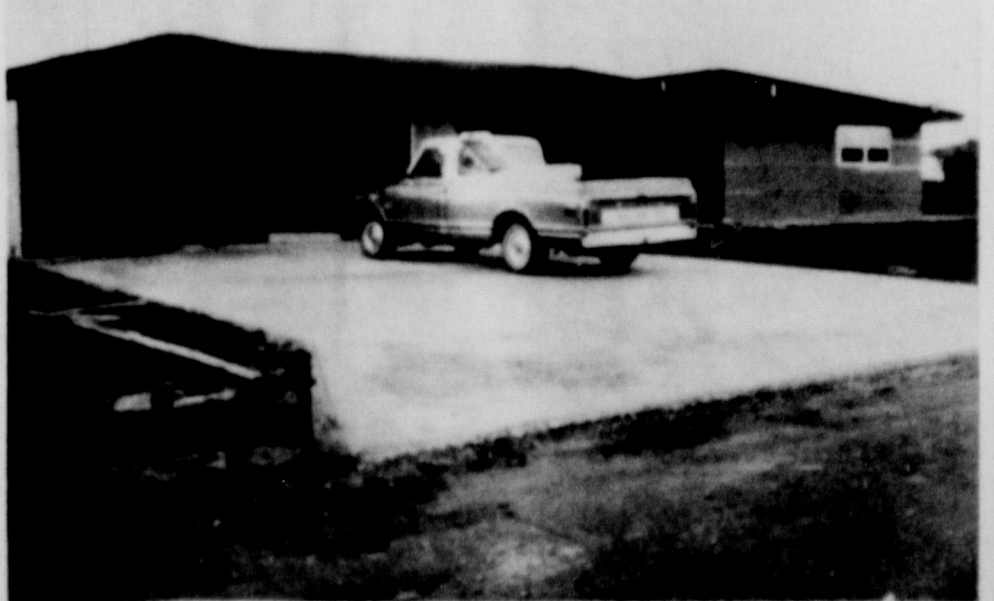

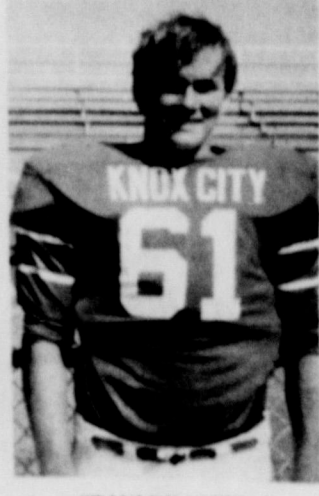

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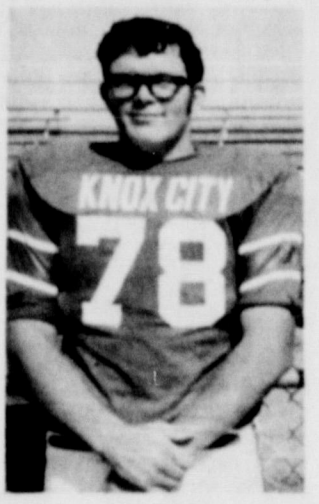

Haskell County has gained sites for two new wildcats. Deeper of the pair is Geo-Tech Petroleum Management Corp. of Dallas No. 1 J. L. Reid, slated for 6,000 feet. Location is 3 1/2 miles south of Rochester on a 153-acre lease.

Drill site is 3,600 feet from the north and 1,783 feet from the east lines of GCSF Survey 1, A - 693.

Other wildcat is Hayden Farmer of Olney No. 1 Fischer. Having a proposed depth of 5,000 feet, it is five miles east of Sagerton on a 100-acre lease.

It spots 1,400 feet from the north and 1,533 feet from the east lines of Subdivision 2, Coryell CSL Survey 62.

Twin Peaks (Upper Strawn) Field 17 miles southeast of Guthrie in King County has gained a new well.

It is Tumbert, Steed, Gun & Medders of Wichita Falls No. 3-A-W-S, B. Burnett Estate.

Location is 1,980 feet from the north and east lines of Section 27, Block F, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 178 barrels of 36 gravity oil, plus one barrel of water. It is pumping from perforations at 5,206 feet, treated with 300 gallons of acid.

The 4 1/2 inch casing is set at 5,355 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 5,369 feet.

Applicants Should Apply For Medicare Before Age 65

Farmers and ranchers in this area should be sure to apply for Medicare during the three months before the month they reach age 65, even if they continue working. Jerry Cherry, Chantz social security manager in Vernon.

"You don't have to retire to enroll for Medicare," Cherry explained. "That you must apply with your social security representative and provide him with adequate proof of your age by continuing."

Since Medicare is administered by social security, the same evidence is necessary in applying for Medicare as that required when you apply for social security benefits.

This evidence includes proof of your age (such as your birth or baptismal certificate), proof of your most recent earnings (your last years income tax return and W-4 forms), and your social security card.

Chantz also mentioned that many farmers and ranchers 62 or over may find themselves eligible to receive some social security monthly benefits, even though they continue working, if their net yearly profit is low.

National sales during the month totaled \$845 million, a 10.2 percent increase over 1971 sales of \$847 million. January-November sales were \$6.7 billion for 89 percent of the national sales goal of \$7.5 billion. Excesses of Series E and Savings Notes for new Series E Bonds amounting to \$108 million were reported for the first eleven months of 1972, 33 percent above the \$231 million exchanged in 1971.

Chustz also reminds area residents that a general enrollment period for Medicare Part B begins January 1 and will continue through March 31, 1973. Anyone who could have enrolled previously but did not, may enroll during the general enrollment period. There is no longer a three-year time limit for eligible persons to enroll, due to a 1972 amendment to social security law. Anyone who is interested in applying for Part B of Medicare or in procedures for filing claims for Medicare payment is invited to call or visit the social security office.

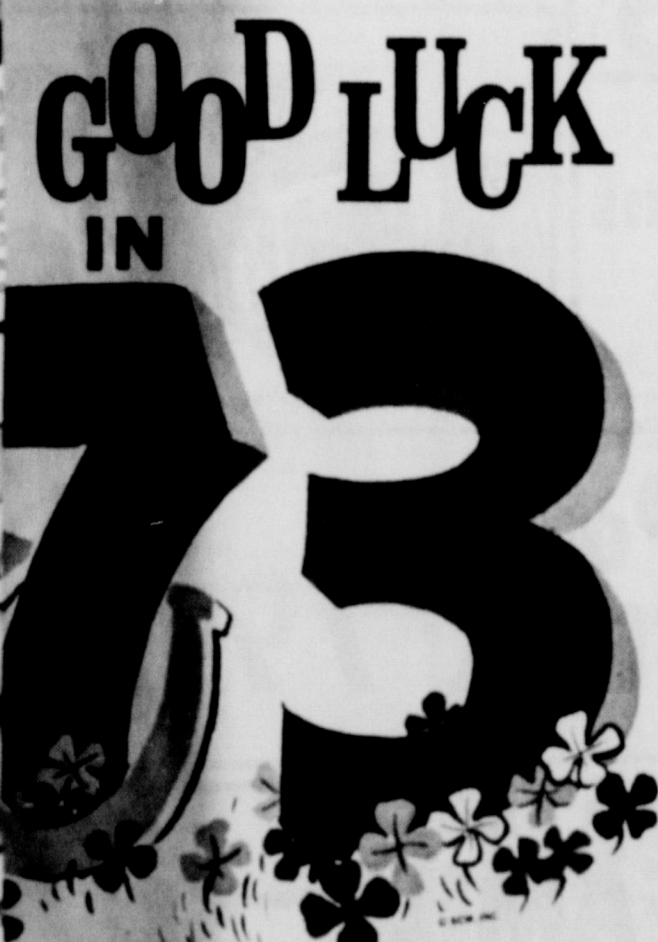

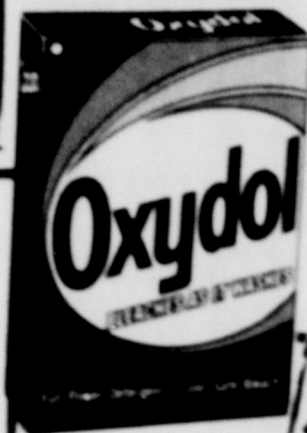

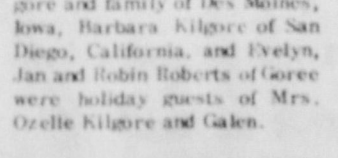

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SCS Booklet Available On Grassland Restoration

Can increased wildlife, better hunting, and more beef result if native rangelands are restored to their once lush condition? Or, do increased beef supplies and grassland improvement spell doom for wildlife?

There are some of the issues discussed in a new booklet "Grassland Restoration and Its Effect on Wildlife" published by the Soil Conservation Service at Knox City, grassland improvement can be done in such a way that will benefit man, livestock, and wildlife.

All uses of the land need to be considered when grasslands are treated. Our biggest need on grassland in Knox County is BRUSH CONTROL. We believe that brush control must be coordinated with range seeding, proper grazing use, watering facilities, and other measures to benefit all users of our grassland resources.

Some good examples of brush control methods discussed in the new booklet can be seen in the Knox County area. On the Bush-Burnett Ranch west of Knox City, brush control was planned to leave strips of brush which provided escape cover and travel lanes for wildlife. Ray Escobar, ranch manager, also leaves strips of sorghum along fields adjoining grassland to provide cover and feed for wildlife.

Other good examples of this type planning can be seen on the League-Davis ranch between Knox City and Benjamin, on
