## KC Greyhounds Overcome By Moguls In Second Half 27-19

The Knox City Greyhounds, according to Coach Charles Hibbitts, played like mad dogs here Friday night before a large homecoming crowd and were not overtaken by the Monday Moguls until almost the last quarter of the District 11-A tilt.

The Greyhounds were remarkable on defense giving up only three first downs in the entire contest and making eleven themselves.

The 'Hounds began the scoring early in the game on a 65-yard drive which ended with halfback Charlie Lieb's scoring on an eight yard screen pass from quarterback Mike Newton. Try for extra point failed.

Again early in the second quarter, Rogers Lankford scored on a 35-yard pass from Newton and as the PAT was no good, the score stood 12-0 in our favor.

Munday stormed back on a 50 yard TD from quarterback Wayne Zeissel to end Wayne Bufkin narrowing Knox City's margin 12-6 at the end of the first half.

Knox City wasted little time after the half as Ronald Curd scored on a 30-yard run around right end with tremendous blocks thrown by Tommy Waldrip, Charlie Lieb, and Mike Newton. The PAT was kicked by Randy Hise, making the score 19-6 with 5:01 remaining in the third quarter.

Munday came back again three plays later and halfback Ricky Hamilton scored on a 50 yard dash up the middle. The PAT was a pass to Bufkin good for two points making the score 19-14 with 4:45 left in the third period.

The Moguls came back on a third down and 30 situation and made the first down on a long pass to Bufkin. Two plays later, fullback Billy Carden went 30 yards around right end for the score. Again the PAT failed, and Munday led at the beginning of the fourth quarter 20-19.

In the middle of the fourth quarter, Knox City had a pass intercepted resulting in a touch-down for the Moguls. The PAT kick was good giving Munday 27 to Knox City's 19. With five seconds left in the game, Knox

City attempted a desperate pass into the end zone which was incomplete.

Coach Hibbitts said it would be hard to single out any one man on defense, because everyone played a great game. On offense, Rogers Lankford caught

four passes for 100 yards, Ronald Curd, Charlie Lieb, and Mike Newton were all outstanding as well as the entire offensive line, the coach said.

The Greyhounds will play Nacoma there Friday night continuing district play.

## Tenth Graders To Take NEDT Tests Oct. 28 - 31

More than 90 tenth graders of Munday, Knox City, Benjamin and Goree students will take the three-hour National Educational Development Tests (NEDT) on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday - Oct. 28, 29, 30, and 31st, according to Helen D. Drozda, Knox County Counselor.

"The NEDT battery," Miss Drozda said, "is a series of tests in English, social studies, mathematics, natural sciences, and word usage designed to measure each student's ability to apply basic learning skills rather than his ability to memorize facts."

"We will use the test to help students, parents, and teachers identify individual strengths and weaknesses in each student's educational development and in making a realistic appraisal of his educational and vocational goals."

**RANCH MANAGEMENT TRAINING CLASS TOURS LEAGUE RANCH**

Instructors, John Merrill and Raymond Kenny, with 23 students from Texas Christian University's Ranch Management Training Class toured League Ranch at Benjamin Monday, October 21.

Jack Idol, Manager, and Stanton Brown, Operations Manager, of League discussed in detail the ranch's overall cattle operation for the group. Preconditioning of home grown calves as well as light stockers bought outside, grazed and fed a warm-up ration to about 650 pound average, was of much interest to the group.

Feeding rations, range and temporary pasture management as well as the farming phase of the ranch was discussed.

Mr. Merrill, Mr. Kenny, and the students expressed their appreciation to Mr. Idol and Mr. Brown for the opportunity to visit a ranch where such a complete set of records are kept.

**SCREWWORM OUTBREAKS**

During the month of September, 1,558 confirmed screwworm cases were reported for Texas; this is almost twice the number of cases reported for August. According to Dr. S. C. Gartman, veterinarian in charge of the Screwworm Eradication Program based at Mission, "...the worst period is still ahead of us. Based on infestations of previous years, October has always had more outbreaks than September." Dr. Gartman said that a severe cold front could change the picture but otherwise the situation is expected to worsen during the next four to five weeks.

North Texas Stockmen learned Thursday, October 10, that a positive case of screwworms was discovered in a calf on the Malcolm Stewart Ranch near Jermyon on the Jack-Young County line. This is the first confirmed case of screwworms this far north in Texas since the 1962 drive to eradicate it from the Southwest. Other Rolling Plains Area Counties where confirmed screwworm cases have been reported are Jones, Shackelford, Coke, Concho,

**'1968 Santa Claus Special' Sails In Nov.**

Tons of St. Nick's gifts will be going to members of the Armed Forces in Vietnam by special ship this year, thanks to a joint Pentagon-Post Office venture.

A fast U. S. cargo ship will be designated the "1968 SANTA CLAUS SPECIAL," sailing from Oakland, California next month with Christmas parcels.

To meet the sailing deadline and assure pre-holiday delivery of gifts sent with surface postage, items should be mailed during the October 14-November 9 period. They should be marked "SANTA CLAUS SPECIAL" just below the stamps. The "SANTA CLAUS SPECIAL" will sail during the latter half of November and stop at Da Nang, Qui Nhon, Cam Ranh Bay and Saigon, Vietnam. It takes approximately three weeks for a fast ship to cross the ocean.

All gifts should be packed in strong containers with adequate cushioning and correctly addressed, including APO and FPO numbers.

There are several options available for mailing to the military which can save money. Post offices across the nation have free pamphlets which outline the mailing programs for servicemen and women overseas.

## Hospitals And You

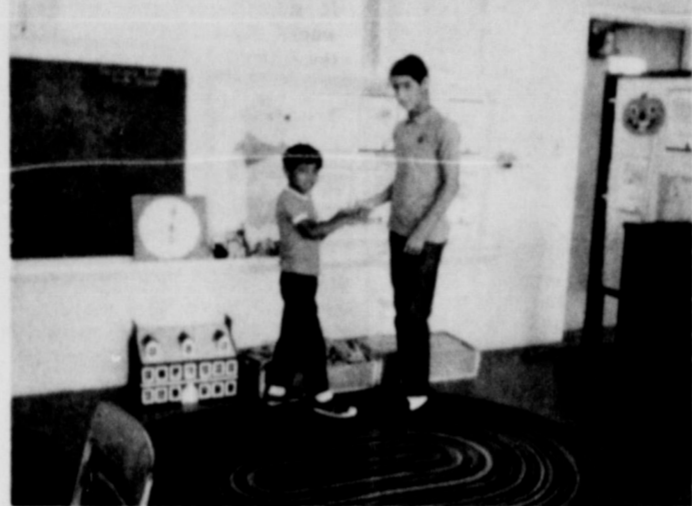
The sole reason for hospitals, its employees and volunteers is the patient. If that patient did not need the attention of the hospital and its staff, the hospital would have no reason to exist.

"This obvious fact can sometimes be relegated to the background of our thinking as we become increasingly concerned with the complexities surrounding the daily routines," Lyndol Cypert, administrator of Knox County Hospital explained.

"Don't forget the patient!" is

the theme of this year's Texas Hospital Association's president, Bill Burton, who is mindful of the qualities that a patient has a right to expect. They are easily recognizable qualities which a personal contact can lead to respect and trust, or conversely, to suspicion, fear and hostility.

These qualities are demonstrated, either affirmatively or negatively, by every person working in the hospital, whether he be the administrator, auxiliary, nurse, credit clerk, porter or one of the other many persons who make up the staff. And these qualities are demonstrated each and every time the patient and an employee or volunteer have contact.

"To the patient, the employee or the volunteer is the hospital, and the hospital's reputation throughout the community it serves is based on the total, accumulative contacts, and the good or bad influence that the staff member has had on the patient," according to Cypert.

"Let us think of the qualities deemed most desirable in each person who represents the hospital to the public," Cypert said. "In taking the word PATIENT, P represents patience; A, adaptability; T, tact; I, initiative; E, energy; N, neatness; and T, treatment."

The first six qualities are those which each staff member, each person representing the hospital, attempts to exhibit to the patient each time there is a visual or verbal contact. From these qualities and the patient's recognition of them comes the ultimate, and difficult-to-change reputation of the hospital.

The last letter of the word, T, represents Treatment which can be the most effective and efficient professional treatment offered and still not be recognized by the patient as such, if one fails to properly exhibit the first six qualities.

"Complaints of treatment received frequently come from misunderstandings engendered by thoughtless personal actions rather than from actual treatment procedures," said Cypert. "As a result the hospital staff that reflects these qualities is certain to be recognized in its community as an institution with a soul and one where people sincerely care."

By exercising these six qualities, the people who work with and around patients use compassion which is defined as "sympathetic consciousness of others' distress together with a desire to alleviate it."

"There can be no greater satisfaction to the dedicated hospital employee or volunteer than to see the compassion received in the same spirit as it is exhibited," Cypert said. "Compassion is contagious, and we hope that an epidemic starts in all of our community hospitals."

## Election Ballot Change May Confuse Some Voters

Two factors may cause some balloting confusion in the November 5 general election, election officials in Texas forecast this week.

The "scratch" method of voting, which some people prefer, is still permitted. However, voters using this method are cautioned to be certain to mark through all names in all three party columns for which they do not wish to vote.

The two factors are:

1. A new State law has inserted a new top line on the paper ballots so that persons desiring to vote a "straight party ticket" may do so by making one mark. This new line is expected to confuse not only the "straight ticket" voters, but also the "split ticket" voters.

2. "Split ticket" voters are expected to be more numerous than ever before, especially since there is a third party, the American Party, and it has candidates for only President and Vice-President and no other offices.

Voters are cautioned to be certain that their ballots are properly marked so that their intentions will not be subject to interpretation by election officials.
