RED CROSS RELIEF GIVEN TO VICTIMS IN 103 DISASTERS

Tornadoes, Fires, Hurricanes, Floods, Epidemics, Make Record of Year

A history of the disasters in the United States in any year is written annually by the American Red Cross. according to Chairman John Barton Payne, commenting on the report for the year anding June 30, 1934, which has just been issued in Washington.

"Because of the charter provision which places upon the Red Cross the responsibility for disaster relief, our chapter and staff workers are notified of all calamities of storm and fire and flood," he continued. "The emergency period may prove to be brief, in cases where the victims have their own resources to draw on. While it lasts. however, whether it brings the imme diate need of food, clothing and shelter for the homeless, or entails a program of investigation and rehabilitation, the Red Cross is the official director of all

A great variation in type, and a wide geographical distribution, characterize the 103 disasters reported last year. Tornadoes, hurricanes, hallstorms and other storms made up almost one half of the total. Especially numerous were the tropical storms which swept in from the sea to the Atlantic and Gulf Coast region. There were 21 storms of this type, establishing a new record for frequency.

Next in number to storms were dis asters of fire, the report shows. Red Cross aid was given following 25 fires in the United States and insular possessions. The most spectacular was the Chicago stockyards fire, where Red Cross workers arrived shortly after the fire started, administering relief until the emergency period passed, giving first aid to about 1,000 persons.

Floods caused serious damage in some sections, 17 calting for Red Cross relief. Three explosions were reported. and three epidemics of malaria and typhoid fever. A school bus wreck was one of the year's tragedies for which Red Cross funds were needed for re lief and rehabilitation.

"Technique acquired by the Red Cross in these disasters and the hundreds of others we have handled is at the service of the public." Chairman Payne said. "To make this possible the disaster relief service has issued a manual containing instructions for chapters interested in advance preparations for emergencies Disaster in stitues were held tast year in 28 strategic locations, to enable Red Cross and civic workers to formulate plans for possible disaster emergencies in their communities.

Tornado Is Most Frequent Disaster; Causes Heavy Loss of Lives

What type of disaster occurs mos frequently in the United States?

This question is answered from the relief annals of the American Red Cross which show over a period of years that the tornade, or cyclone as it is called in some sections, is the most frequent and claims a beary toll of life. It swoops almost with out warning, and is the terrific whirlpool of its flerce winds it de stroye all in its path.

The Red Cross gave ratlef in 44 tornadoes in eighteen states last year. The tornadoes killed \$16 persone, injured 1,755 and the Red Cross gave aid to 21,788 who were homeless, injured or otherwise vic time of the storms.

Toll of the Earthquake

When a severe earthquake killed 95 persons; injured 4,911 and destroyed several thousand homes in Southern California last March, the Red Cross was first upon the ground with emergency relief. It required more than three months for the Red Cross to restore the needy to a self-sustaining basis. The organization expended a relief fund of \$411,000.

Through the Bureau of Vitial Statistics, complete and accurate birth registration is kept, as well as records indicating death which occur among children from preventable dis

Contagion is prevented or controlted against further spread through the encouragement of immunization early in life, through the prompt reporting of infectious diseases. Public health labratories and sanitary engineers provide additional bulwarks of protection about child life

Adequate health organization and wholehearted support on the part of various state and local agencies are essential if these activities are to be successfully maintained
