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Officers Seize Marijuana Plants

Charlie Johnson, Knox City Negro, was arraigned Monday before Justice of the Peace W. L. Robnett on charges of possessing and growing narcotics.

The magistrate set bond at \$5,000, which was later reduced to \$1,000. Wednesday, the accused had not made bond.

According to reports, officers raided Johnson's home Sunday night and found marijuana plants growing in his back yard. Participating in the raid were Sheriff H. T. Melton, Deputy Sheriff H. C. Stone, and County Attorney Tom Bullington.

Conviction on the charge, according to the county attorney, would mean a mandatory sentence of 2 to 10 years.

During approximately three years of fighting in Korea, casualties have been almost four times greater for the Reds than for UN forces as seen in the above chart. Official figures recently released reveal American losses to be 24,119 dead, 100,665 wounded, 11,345 missing. South Korean casualties are 256,901. The 15 other nations fighting on the UN side reported a total of 2550 dead, 9056 wounded, 1006 missing. Officially estimated total casualties for Red Chinese forces are 1,695,000. North Korean casualties are estimated at 802,000.

National Magazine Calls Sen. Johnson Head of Democrats

Time Magazine, in its issue of June 22, devotes a better part of five pages to a discussion of the Democratic party and a history of the political life of Texas' Sen. Lyndon Johnson.

Discounting both Adlai Stevenson and former president Harry Truman, the magazine calls Johnson the real leader of the Democratic party, and pays tribute to his record and his qualities of leadership.

The article hints that Johnson might be the logical candidate for president on the Democratic ticket in 1956, but adds that the Senator himself says, "I'm not smart enough to make a president. I come from the wrong part of the country. I like the Senate job; it's the best job I ever had. I want to stay here."

Time concludes that the future is a matter of uncertainty for both man and party, but there is "no doubt that, for the Democrats, Johnson is exactly the right man in the right place at the right time."

Farmers Cautioned To Watch Fields For Army Worms

"Army Worms" have invaded the Vera community and are causing considerable damage to young cotton, County Agent W. C. Pallmeyer said this week.

All farmers in Knox County were cautioned to check their cotton for the worm, and if they are found in sufficient numbers, farmers are advised to apply controls, as the worm can ruin a stand.

Wilbarger and Hardeman counties already have large infestations, Pallmeyer said, and only by control measures can damage be prevented. Toxaphene or DDT are recommended for control of the worm.

Knox 4-H Boys Making Cotton Variety Tests

Cotton variety tests have been planted in the Rhineland, Vera and Gilliland communities by Knox County 4-H members under the supervision of W. C. Pallmeyer, Knox County Agent, and Roy Saunders of Munday. Another test plot will be planted at Knox City when moisture is sufficient to insure a stand.

The test at Rhineland is planted on the Arnold Wilde farm, and the Vera test is on the Carl Coulston farm. The Gilliland test is on the John Quintero farm, and the Knox City test is to be planted on the George Davis place.

Varieties to be tested in the 1953 program are Stormproof No. 1, Deltapine TPSA, Empire, Lankart, Paymaster 54, Northern Star, Deltapine Fox, Western Prolific, Hi Bred, Qualla, Acala, and Deltapine 15.

In addition to the varieties to be tested, Pallmeyer said, thick and thin spacing of plants will be checked, with one planting of 1 plant per foot of row and one planting of three plants per foot of row.

Aim of the tests, the county agent said, is increased cotton production per acre, rather than an increase in acreage.
