

ORDINANCE NO. 1638

An ordinance amending and supplementing ordinance No. 1013 contained in Book 2. Page 50 in effect fixing and determining the general service rate to be charged for sales of natural gas to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Knox City, Knox County, Texas, and providing for the manner in which such rates may be amended and supplemented; providing for effective date of this amendment; and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, the City Council having found and determined that the Railroad Commission of Texas did on the 28th day of January, 1975, in Gas Utilities Docket No. 500, issue its Order directing Lone Star Gas Company to commence paying to Lo-Vaca Gathering Company, a supplier of natural gas to Lone Star Gas Company, for natural gas purchases the interim rate set by the Railroad-Commission of Texas: and.

WHEREAS, having found and determined that the Railroad Commission of Texas did order that Lone Star Gas Company shall be allowed to flow through to all of its customers the additional gas costs resulting from the Order: BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF KNOX

CITY, KNOX COUNTY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Effective with first gas bills rendered from the date of final passage of this Ordinance, the present rate Ordinance No. 1013, contained in Book 2, Page 50, in effect and establishing and fixing rates for the sales of natural gas furnished to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Knox City, Texas, by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is to include in addition to the rates presently in effect the amount per Mcf of any increase or decrease in the intracompany city gate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of Texas for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where said increases or decreases are caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas purchased by Lone Star Gas Company from Lo-Vaca Gathering Company beginning January 28, 1975, and

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulationy bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. It is hereby found and determined that the meeting at which this Ordinance was passed was open to the public, as required by Texas law, and that advance public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was

SECTION 4. WHEREAS, it appears that the rates, terms, and conditions under which the Lone Star Gas Company renders residential and commercial consumers gas service require amendment and approval, which creates an urgency and emergency in the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, and safety, and requires that this Ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage, in the manner set forth in Section 1 hereinabove. and it is accordingly so ordained.

PASSED AND APPROVED on second reading on this the 12th day of February, A.D. 1975.






