## Nursing Care Unavailable

Nursing service and/or direct health care personnel will not be on duty at The Knox County Hospital before July 15, due to the liability involved.

Monday afternoon Knox County Hospital administrator Glen Rumley was advised by phone from the regional office of the Bureau of Health Insurance in Dallas, that, due to the fact that Knox City did not have a physician in attendance, able to attend patients or cover the emergency room, the hospital's certification had been removed from governmental health programs.

Rumley told the News office that a re-certification survey and routine inspection would be held on June 30, July 1 and 2 for the purpose of determining the hospital's eligibility to participate in governmental health programs.

An additional survey will be made on July 29 and 30 to determine conformity to the rules and regulations established for continued participation in all health care programs.

The hospital business office will remain open weekdays from 8:00 to 4:00 and limited personnel will be remaining on duty 24 hours a day, primarily for repair, minor alterations, and cleanup of the hospital itself, as well as security reasons in looking after the hospital and its contents.

## Arts, Crafts, Hobby Show Is Set July 3-4

Plans are underway for the annual Knox City Arts, Crafts and Hobby Show to be held the July Fourth weekend this year.

The Show, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, will again be held in the American Legion Hall.

Entries will be accepted Thursday, July 1 from 9 to 5 and Friday morning July 2 from 9 until 10 only. No entries will be accepted after that time. Judging will be at 2 p.m. Friday afternoon, and the building will be closed at

that time until the show opens Saturday morning at 9. Plans are to have the show open longer this year, from 9 to 7 on Saturday and from 1 to 5 Sunday afternoon, July 4.

Exhibitors may pick up work after 5 p.m. Sunday and from 9 to 10 Monday Morning, July 5.

New divisions this year include a special Bicentennial category, Decorated Shirts in the Handwork division, and a Foods Division for baked and canned foods.

All work will be judged in three divisions: children (through elementary grades), youth (junior high and high school) and adult.

The entry fee is nominal. Any entry taking a ribbon or trophy in previous local shows will not be eligible.

All paintings must be mounted or framed, ready for hanging. Collections must be suitably displayed. Anyone desiring to sell exhibited work may do so with the stipulation they do not have the price displayed on the item before judging, and that it may not be removed from the premises until after the show. A commission will be charged on all sales.

Entry blanks may be picked up at the Chamber office and Mini-Mall or when entries are brought.

The release noted that the simultaneous election of leaders from the same hometown is unprecedented. Also, according to the release, these are major technical organizations and the election of these men is highly complimentary to Knox City and its school system.)

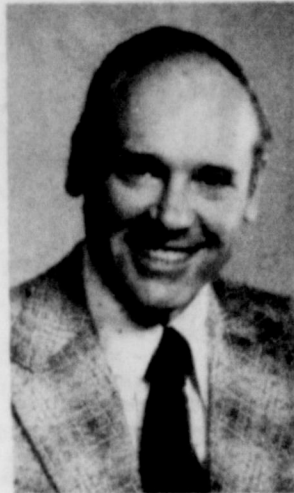
John Ed Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Smith of Knox City, was recently elected chairman of the Permian Basin Section of the Society of Petroleum Engineers of AIME. The SPE is an international technical and professional organization for engineers in the exploration, drilling and production phases of the petroleum and natural gas industries. The SPE has 25,166 members in 88 chapters located in the major oil producing area of the world. The Permian Basin Chapter was formed on November 14, 1945 and is the second largest chapter in the world with 1,171 members.

John Ed is an associated operation engineer with Mobil Oil Corporation in Midland. He graduated from Knox City High School in

1952 and from Texas Tech in 1957 with a B.S. degree in petroleum engineering with production and natural gas options. He has worked for Mobil since graduation and has had numerous assignments during that time on various projects in the U.S., Mexico, Canada, Europe, and Africa. John Ed is coordinator of the Production Techniques Group in Mobil's Midland area, which is comprised of West Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Southern Utah, and Southwestern Colorado.

Donald E. Caussey was recently elected president of the West Texas Geological Society. The WTGS was founded in 1926 and will be celebrating its 50th anniversary this fall. This rapidly growing organization currently has 1,325 members, which is an all-time high. The WTGS is an affiliate of the American Association of Petroleum Geologists, an international professional and technical organization. Current worldwide membership is 17,400 divided among 70 affiliated societies, of which the WTGS is the second largest.

Donald is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. O.W. Caussey of Knox City. Following graduation as valedictorian of his class of 1947 at Knox City High School, he received, in 1951, a B.S. in geology from the University of Texas in Austin. As division geologist

## SS Checks Include Increase

A cost-of-living increase in monthly social security benefits will be included in checks delivered in July, according to Carl R. Beisner, Social Security claims representative in Vernon.

The increase will amount to 6.4 percent for most persons who are getting social security payments. The cost-of-living provision was added to the social security law in 1972.

"Persons getting social security checks do not have to do anything to get the higher payments," Beisner said. "The increase will be added automatically."

The increase is based on the rise in consumer prices from the first three months of 1975 to the first three months of 1976.

With the cost-of-living increase, average social security retirement payments to retired workers will go from \$210 to \$224 a month. Average social security disability payments to disabled workers will go from \$228 to \$242 a month. Average social security survivors payments to widowed mothers or fathers with two children in their care will go from \$479 to \$510 a month.

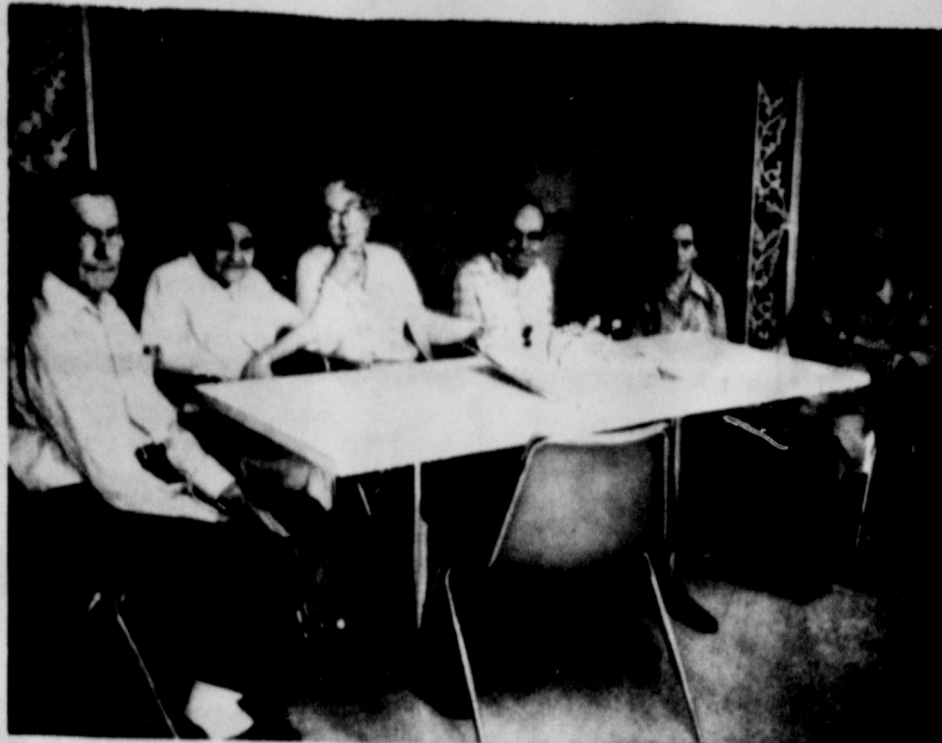

## Screwworm Story Is 'Bad News'

It's "bad news" as far as the story on the screwworm situation in Texas is concerned. The year got off to a bad start with early outbreaks of the flesh-eating pest in South Texas, and things have gotten progressively worse, points out Herman Collier, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Right now, screwworm cases in Texas are running ahead of the record-setting pace of 1972," notes Collier. "The main concern is that the cases are spreading rapidly to the north, west and east. Through May 29 more than 60 counties have reported one or more screwworm infestations."

A primary reason for the higher infestations this early in the year is that the past winter was quite mild, there-

by allowing more of the screwworm flies to overwinter in southern Texas and northern Mexico. And the number of overwintering flies was larger than usual due to the screwworm explosion last fall in South Texas that was triggered by a massive infestation of Gulf Coast ear ticks.

Webb County has been the screwworm hotspot this year with three times as many infestations as in 1972. Other heavily infested counties have been Zapata, Starr, Hidalgo, Jim Hogg and Dimmit.

Screwworm cases have already been confirmed as far north as Baylor County, as far west as Pecos and Terrell counties, and as far east as Colorado County.

All counties with confirmed screwworm cases have been bombed with sterile flies to break up the reproductive cycle of the female screwworm flies. Screwworm flies that mate with the sterile ones will not produce fertile eggs.

"Although situation looks bleak, some help appears on the way although it may not arrive until this fall," notes Collier. "That's when the new insectary at Tuxtla Gutierrez in southern Mexico should be in operation to produce sterile flies to wage the war against the costly screwworm throughout the country of Mexico. This will mean that more of the sterile flies produced at the Mission Lab will be used to battle screwworm infestations north of the Rio Grande."

"In the meantime, the burden is on livestock producers to keep a watchful eye on their stock, to follow a regular spraying program to control flies and other insects, and to treat all wounds with a protective smear," advises Collier. "Both CoRal and Korlan afford some protection for about two weeks."

Of course, if worms are found in any wounds, a sample should be sent to the Mission Lab as soon as possible. Kits for mailing worm samples are available from the county Extension office as well as from veterinarians and livestock inspectors.

## Accidents Investigated

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of April, 1976, according to Sergeant J.W. Garner, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1976 shows a total of 15 accidents resulting in one person killed and seven persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for April, 1976, shows a total of 510 accidents resulting in 10 persons killed and 318 persons injured, as compared to April, 1975, with 425 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 251 persons injured. This was 85 more accidents, eight less killed, and 67 more injured in 1976 at the same period of time.

The ten traffic deaths for the month of April, 1976, occurred in the following counties: Two each in Montague and Wise; and one each in Floyd, Hale, Haskell, Dallam, Potter, and Roberts.

## Can Soil Survey Help Homebuilders?

A house or a lot on which you plan to build is a big investment. Many persons cannot afford to make mistakes. Unsuspected soil hazards can cause serious damage and lead to major expenses. The Soil Conservation Service can help you answer the many questions about your homestead before you build or buy.

Many areas now used for housing were used for farming or pastureland just a few years ago. Many persons do not realize that even a small creek or stream can become a raging, destructive river, following a long period of heavy rain. About five percent of the land in the U.S. is on flood plains and a lot of this land is level and seemingly desirable for homebuilding. A prospective homebuyer should always determine whether or not flooding is a hazard. Soil surveys show the extent of flooding in a given area and indicate the hazards of building in the area.

A high water table is also a great problem in many areas. A water table may be at a safe level most of the year, but rise during the wet season. If the water table rises close to the surface, basements may be flooded, septic tank absorption fields may fail, and plants may be damaged or killed. A soil survey will be able to help the homebuyer locate the high water tables.

If your house is built on certain kinds of clayey soils, the foundation may shift or settle unevenly, and walls, plaster, and foundations may crack severely. Some clayey soils expand as they absorb water, and shrink as they dry. This shrinking and swelling can move a house several inches up and down. Unless the foundation is designed for such stress, it is likely to crack. If the house itself remains in place, the soil may settle away from the foundation. Soil surveys tell whether the soil is organic or mineral, and also give the amount of sand, silt, and clay in each mineral soil and rate the shrinking and swelling potential of the soil.

The average homebuyer doesn't need to know about

all the soils, just about the ones his house is on. Many of the soil hazards can be overcome by special structural design or installation. Homeowners who are aware of major soil hazards can take steps to prevent damage rather than accept the likely expense of repairing it. For example, moderate wetness can be reduced by installing subsurface drains. Shrinking and swelling of soil can be overcome by using a foundation designed to withstand such stress.

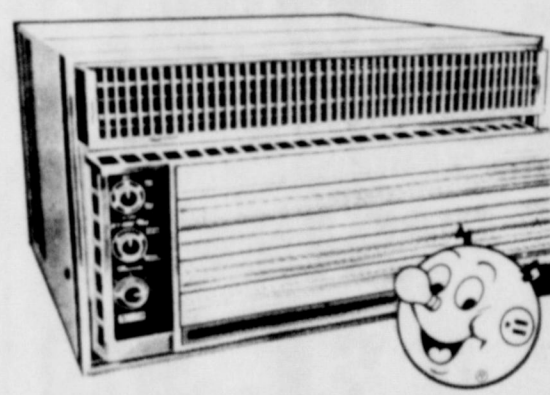
