Hendon Ranch House Buried Here

One of Knox City's pioneer citizens, Mr. E. J. Hendon, died Friday about 5 p. m. He was buried Saturday afternoon following services held in the Baptist church. Reverend Stovall was assisted in the service by Reverend J. H. Sharp.

Mr. Hendon was born in the state of Mississippi in 1859. In 1880, he was married to Miss Walker, which union eight children were born. One of these, with Mrs. Hendon, survive the father; they are W. T. Hendon of near Odessa, A. B. Hendon of Lorensa, Barrow, Hendon of Knox City and Mrs. Hout of Arizona. The three sons were in attendance of the last days of the father, but the daughter was unable to come.

Mr. Hendon, with his family moved to Texas, McLennan county in 1890. In 1904 they moved near Childers where they stayed two years, then moved to Knox county. Since 1906 he has lived in Knox County. He was one of the pioneers of the county and a highly respected man, known and loved wherever known.

Ranch House Burned

Sunday morning, about three o'clock, the ranch house on the League Estate, being occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Easton, was completely destroyed by fire. The Eastons were away, having left Saturday for Childers for a few days with Mrs. Easton's sister. The fire was discovered by Mexicans on the ranch who went to aid Mr. and Mrs. Easton, but found them away. They noticed the fire burned from the top of the building which led them to believe it started in the top of the house.

Mr. and Mrs. Easton received word of the fire and returned home about nine o'clock Sunday morning. They are staying with Mr. and Mrs. Trimmer, who live near the ranch house on the League Estate.

The house destroyed was a large two-story building. Within the last few years it has been remodeled. It was not only completely lost but also the furniture, clothing and personal belongings of the Easton family were destroyed.

The origin of the fire is unknown.

Red and White Store Banquet Here

Due to the severe weather and the fact that all members of the Red and White Stores could not be present, a number of the local men were present. It was with regret of their absence that those present continued in the meeting.

Reverend Sharp, toast master, conducted the evening in a most entertaining way. Through his courtesy each out of town man present, and his wife, was introduced to the crowd. Upon being given an opportunity to speak, each of the men expressed his appreciation for the occasion as arranged for by the Red and White Stores, and for the splendid did they (using the words of the speaker) in which the hidden prepared and served the food. This was done by the Methodist ladies.

Although only a few of the merchants of the Red and White Stores in the Stamford Unit were present Wednesday, the banquet was a success and those present will be most eager to attend the next occasion.

At the age of sixteen Mr. Hendon was apprenticed and joined the Methodist church. He took an active part in church work during his earlier life. His family were members of the local Methodist church.

At the time of his death Mr. Hendon was living at his home north of town. His absence will be missed by the Herald staff and the bereaved family.

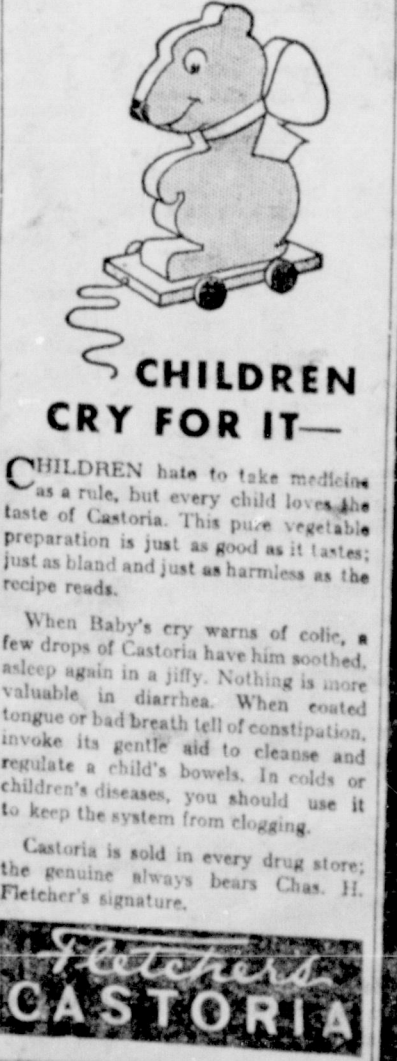
