Consolidation Passes

Voters turned out in large numbers Saturday and approved the consolidation of the Knox City and Carney Independent School Districts. Voters in Knox City gave overwhelming approval with 314 voting for consolidation and nine against.

In O'Brien, the vote was extremely close with 111 votes cast in favor of consolidation and 99 against.

Election judges were Otis Harbert in Knox City and Mrs. A.A. Cox in O'Brien.

In the July 10 referendum. Knox City voted 346 for to 15 against, while O'Brien had 119 for and 86 against the merger.





summer months of vacation. students receiving Social Security benefits based on school attendance should remember that it is very important to contact their Social Security representatives if they have a change of plans for the approaching school year. Some changes may affect entitlement to student benefits.

One of the requirements to receive these benefits is that an individual be enrolled as a full-time student in an approved educational institution and carrying a subject load which is considered full-time for day students under the institutions standards and practices. Less than full-time attendance according to the institutions criteria for fulltime attendance in any particular month does not entitle a student to social security benefits for that month even though he may complete all required work for the school year at a later date. Entitlement to payments is based on full-time attendance for a specific month and not on the total number of hours earned

Normally students enroll fewer subjects during summer school classes but a student still will be able to receive his social security benefit check if he is considered a full-time student by the school. Also, remember that a student may be entitled to benefit checks through the summer months even though he does not attend summer school providing he was a full-time student in the spring semester and he plans to

resume full-time study in the fall semester. To receive benefits under these conditions a student must have an intent to return to school, and the period of non-attendance cannot exceed four calendar months.

To avoid possible overpayment, it is extremely important that student beneficiaries notify Social Security Representatives immediately if they decide during these summer months not to return to school for the fall semester. A change of plans to attend a different school also requires reporting. Many students assume that as long as they are full-time student in an

accredited school that it makes no difference which school they attend because they would be eligible for benefits by attendance at either school. This is true, but after the semester begins social security verifies student attendance with the local

registrar of the school that the student said that he would attend. If the student is reported as not in attendance or less than a full-time student then his benefit checks are suspended. Of course the benefit checks will be reinstated after the student inquires about the non-receipt of his check and after social security verifies that he is in fact a full-time student in a different school.

Failure to report immediately a change of school attendance can at best cause an interruption of benefit checks at the time or shortly after school registration and this is the time when the checks generally are needed the most.

Another reminder to student beneficiaries receiving benefits on their parents records is that marriage tersocial minates security student benefits on this record even though the individual continues in school on a full-time basis.

In summary, to receive the correct payment amount student beneficiaries who marry, change schools, drop out of school or reduce their scholastic studies to less than fulltime attendance should check with social security representatives as soon as possible

Patterson Jr., John Wesley Patterson came to the newly organized county of Knox in 1897 and homesteaded land six miles east of Benjamin, east of the 'narrows'. Patterson and his two oldest sons. Bailey and Henry and son-inlaw, Albert Lawrence, built a home on the Patterson land and a home on land homesteaded by Albert, on the east joining the Patterson land.

J.W. and his wife. Elizabeth Dees Patterson with their children. John Bailey. Henry Alexander, Lena Mae, Albert Venmore, Joseph Carl, Orel Lee and Ruth along with their older daughter. Cornelia and her husband, Albert Lawrence arrived in Knox County in 1898. Two older daughters. Adah Jane and Laura Ann were married and had settled elsewhere.

Soon after the families arrived in Knox County, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Lawrence were blessed by the arrival of daughter, Cora Estelle on August 4, 1898. Two years later, October 15, 1900, the Patterson family welcomed little James Kenneth. Seven months later on May 22, 1901 tragedy struck. John Wesley was kicked in the stomach by a horse and was critically injured. He died a few hours later at the age of 57. He was buried in the Benjamin cemetery.

Elizabeth with the help of the older children and neighbors kept the family on the farm in the home built by her husband. She raised chickens and sold eggs, grew vegetables to sell and for her own home use. The older boys hired out building fences. clearing land, farming and ranching for neighbors.

The baby Kenneth died of the croupe on March 26, 1903. Three years later, the seventeen year old son, Albert, dove into a tank, broke his neck and died June 10, 1906. Both boys were buried beside their father in the Benjamin cemetery.

Offered In Benjamin

The Benjamin School serves nutritious meals every school day. Lunch may be bought for the following price: Grades K-6 45 cents, Grades 7 - 12 50 cents, Teachers and School employees 75 cents, other adults \$2.00.

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the attached scale are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. If the children are eligible for free meals they are also eligible for free extra milk. The réduced price for lunch is 20 cents. "If your income is greater than those shown, but you have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of your income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses. your children may still be eligible," Supt. Kenneth Roberts explained.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced-price meals and free milk during the period of unemployment. provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of the si

"To apply at any time during the year for free meals and free milk or reduced-price meals for your children, complete an application and return it to the school. Within ten days of receiving your application, the school will let you know whether or not your children are eligible. If you do not agree with the school's decision you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing me, Box 166, Benjamin, Texas, Phone 454-2231." Supt. Roberts said.

"In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such meals and milk for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application.

"All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex. color, or national origin.

"If we can be of any further assistance or if your family size or income changes during the year, please contact us,"





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
