

Knox City High School junior student Brett Boone, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Boone, received notification this week that he has qualified for the National Merit Scholarship.

Brett scored in the top five percent of over one million students who took the test for the Merit Program last October. He is being considered for recognition in the 1978 Merit Program and will be notified in the fall if he qualifies for the semifinals.

The purpose of the Merit Program is to bring high performers to the attention of colleges and universities in the United States. It is the hope of broadening educational opportunities for these students that the program is continued.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for April, 1977 shows a total of 462 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 273 persons injured, as compared to April, 1976, with 510 accidents resulting in 10 persons killed and 318 persons injured.

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



You can receive benefits as long as your medical condition prevents you from doing any substantial work; your children can receive benefits until they marry or attain age 18, and if they continue in school as full time students, they can receive benefits until age 22. If your children work, their earnings would also be taken into consideration. Your wife can receive benefits if her earnings permit, and she has minor children or a disabled

child in her care. Q. If I go to a Social Security Office to file an application for disability benefits, do I have to take my medical reports with me?

A. No. You will be asked to sign medical and hospital release forms, and the State Rehabilitation Agency will contact the doctors and hospitals for this information. A clean, well-maintained air conditioner means more cleaners. efficient cooling and comfort for the family

Regular inspection and cleaning of filters and grills in home air conditioner units keeps the house cooler - and saves fuel.

Filters are traps for the almost invisible impurities in the air and regularly build up an accumulation of dirt.

Air conditioner filters in most units - and those in older buildings - require vacuuming and warm-water washing monthly. Shake off excess

water, dry and replace filter. An alternative to that is the disposable filter - available in various sizes, usually easy to change, and inexpensive.

New homes - or recently remodeled homes - may need more frequent filter changes or cleanings during the first cooling season, because of extra dust in the system.



McClatchy pinpointed the problems of the dual system in recent years as coming in iarge part from the near flood-tide of consumer or compliance-type legislation take place.' mandated by federal regulatory agencies. Saying that while the dual system now appears strong, in recent years that strength has been severely tested, with one side attempting to usurp the other's authority.

In restoring wicker furniture, after a careful cleansing, the piece should be studied carefully from top to bottom, inside out, to determine repairs that need to be made.

The most common types of repairs that are required by old wicker furniture include (1) regluing and strengthening framing, (2) reattaching loosened reed wrappings, and (3) reweaving or mending holes and slits

New Glue For Old Joints Old glues in joints can easily release if the furniture piece has been used outdoors or in high humidity:

New glue can be forced into loosened joints by using a glue needle or a hypodermic syringe filled with a tightbonding furniture glue.

Joints should be clamped or bound with strips of rope or an old tire tube until thoroughly dry. Don't attempt to break apart a solid joint to apply glue to a loose one. With a hand drill and a small bit, insert a hole into the loose joint so that glue may be forced in with the syringe.

Sections of the woven wicker should not be removed from the frame since it may fray out or the shape become distorted.

Reattaching Loosened Reed

Through use and drying out of the wood, the reed in wicker furniture often becomes brittle, breaks and unwinds from the frame. (Illustration 1)

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




Those eligible include 4-H youth. FFA members, men women and children who owned livestock within the past twelve months There is no age limit or

minimum requirement of numbers of cattle owned in order to qualify to vote. Any que tions about bonafide ow. rship can be resolved by tax receipts, sales slips, registration papers or any other valid paper showing owner-

A partnership, cooperative, corporation or similiar business is considered as only a single entity for the purpose of voting in the referendum. Where a husband and wife own cattle jointly, this will be considered a single entity and only one may vote. If each owns cattle separately and has documented proof of ownership, this is considered as two entities and each may

In the event that a person owns cattle in a county other than where he lives, or if he cannot make it to the polls during the registration or voting period, it will be possible to write or telephone the county ASCS office for an absentee ballot.

If approved, the Beef Research and Information Program will allow establishment of projects for advertising. promotion, education, producer information and consumer information with respect to the use of cattle, beef and beef products.

With bright, sunny days in the offing, pinkeye often becomes a problem in most cattle herds. Pinkeye is caused by an organism that is still unidentified and can lead to various ulcerations of the animal's eye and even blindness in many cases if untreated. The impaired vision and discomfort restrict the animal's ability to graze and can result in serious weight losses which has been proven in

many tests. To keep pinkeye problems at a minimum, producers can follow these suggestions: 1. Check animals closely for excessive watering or dis-

charge of eyes. 2. Control flies and gnats as they help spread the trouble. 3. Adequate vitamin A helps keep tissues healthy. Good pastures provide enough Vitamin A. but when they dry up and turn brown some supplementary source of Vitamin

A may be needed. 4. Shaded loafing areas allow cattle to get out of direct sunlight.

Many treatments are available for treatment of pinkeye but should be applied to both eves, and treated animals should be kept separate from the rest of the herd.
