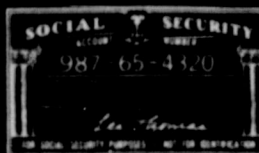

Q. I have been told that to be insured for disability benefits I had to work out of ten years before I became disabled. I am only 26 years old and have been working steadily since I got out of college at the age of 22. Since I have only been working four years does that mean I cannot receive disability benefits?

A. No. For persons between the ages of 24 and 31, you only need credit for having worked half the time between the ages of 21 and the time you become disabled.

Q. If I become disabled at an early age, would my family be entitled to receive social security benefits?

A. Yes. If your disability is so severe as to prevent you from doing any substantial work, if it is expected to last (or has lasted) for at least twelve months, or results in your death, you, your wife, and your children would be eligible for benefits. You can receive benefits as long as your medical condition prevents you from doing any substantial work; your children can receive benefits until they marry or attain age 18, and if they continue in school as full time students, they can receive benefits until age 22. If your children work, their earnings would also be taken into consideration. Your wife can receive benefits if her earnings permit, and she has minor children or a disabled child in her care.

Q. If I go to a Social Security Office to file an application for disability benefits, do I have to take my medical reports with me?

A. No. You will be asked to sign medical and hospital release forms, and the State Rehabilitation Agency will contact the doctors and hospitals for this information. You should be able to provide Social Security with the names, addresses, phone numbers, and dates of services for each doctor and each hospital.

Q. What documents should I take to the social security office if I file an application for disability benefits for myself and my family?

A. You should take infor-

widow would have to bring your social security number, proof of age, proof of death, proof of your last year's earnings, your marriage license, your children's birth certificates, and their social security numbers. If your wife or any of your children work, they will also have to give us an estimate of their current mation about your doctors, hospitals, their addresses, phone numbers, and dates of services. In addition you should take your social security number, proof of your last year's earnings, your children's birth certificates and their social security numbers, if they have numbers. If you wife or your children work, you should be able to give an estimate of what they will earn for the current year. If you attained age 22 after 1951, or if you were born after 1929, you will also have to take proof of your age (preferably an original birth certificate).

Q. I know that if I die my children will be eligible for Social Security Benefits. But I want to know if my husband can also receive benefits from my record?

A. Yes. Your husband can receive social security benefits from your record as long as he does not marry, he has minor children or a disabled child in his care, and his earnings permit payment.

Q. What would my family have to do to start receiving social security benefits after I die?

A. Your widow would have to file applications at the

Social Security Office. Your year's earnings.

If you have questions concerning disability, retirement, survivors, or supplemental security entitlement benefits, you can call the local Social Security Office in Vernon. The phone number is 817-552-9346 and the address is 1701 Cumberland Street.

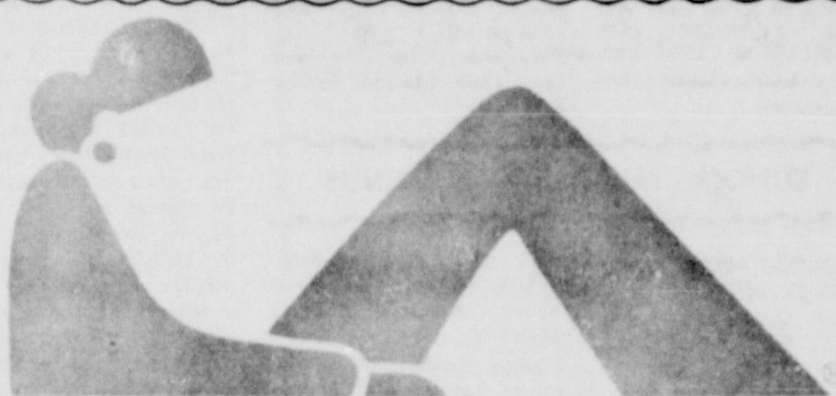

Federal, State System Could Damage Savings And Loans

NEW ORLEANS, LA. -- The president of the National Savings and Loan League recently warned that a weak dual system of federal and state savings and loans could seriously damage the thrift industry's chances for survival.

D.D. McClatchy, who also is president of Olney Savings Association, Olney, Texas, said, "I believe that we need a dual system that is complementary to one another, and one which supports the other -- without the kind of encroachment that we've seen in recent years, particularly that coming from the federal level over the state."

"We have always had some tugging and pulling from the federal level to the state level," said McClatchy. "But it seems that the tugging and pulling in recent years and even months has turned to

shoving and...at times, even shouting."
McClatchy's remarks came in an address to the Annual Convention of the National Association of State Savings and Loan Supervisors.

McClatchy pinpointed the problems of the dual system in recent years as coming in large part from the near flood-tide of consumer or compliance-type legislation mandated by federal regulatory agencies. Saying that while the dual system now appears strong, in recent years that strength has been severely tested, with one side attempting to usurp the other's authority.

"We're going to be looking at a third element within the dual system," he added. "That is the growing role played by the public interest groups. That's an element," McClatchy said, "that is going to become increasingly important in financial institution branching and chartering decisions, as well as in determining whether mergers will take place."

McClatchy said he is convinced the dual system can be preserved by "maintaining our independence on the one hand and by making certain that we defend the concept of thrift and home finance" on the other.

CLEAN AIR CONDITIONER EQUAL EFFICIENCY

A clean, well-maintained air conditioner means more efficient cooling and comfort for the family.
Regular inspection and cleaning of filters and grills in home air conditioner units keeps the house cooler - and saves fuel.
Filters are traps for the almost invisible impurities in the air and regularly build up an accumulation of dirt.
Air conditioner filters in most units - and those in older buildings - require vacuuming and warm-water washing monthly. Shake off excess water, dry and replace filter.
An alternative to that is the disposable filter - available in various sizes, usually easy to change, and inexpensive.
New homes - or recently remodeled homes - may need more frequent filter changes or cleanings during the first cooling season, because of extra dust in the system.

Carolyn's Chatter

For cleaning room grills, use a soft cloth, mild soap and warm water - not waxes or cleaners.
If the system seems sluggish after cleaning, call a service man certified by the manufacturer of the air conditioner - or an electrician.
Since cleaning filters and grills is relatively simple, someone in the family should be responsible for giving them a frequent check.

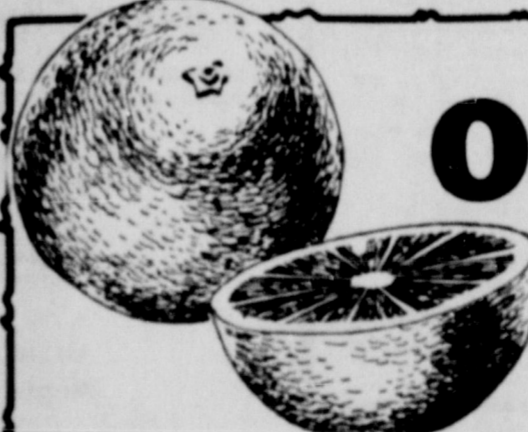

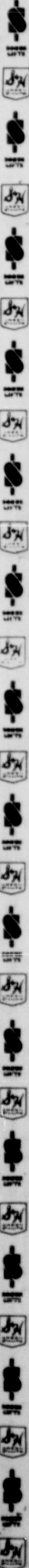

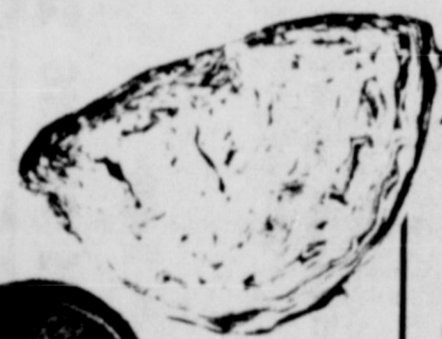
