### KEEP YOUR HOME FROM BURNING

Fire is a terrible destroyer of life and all as property. It causes more loss than occur in all our railroad accidents, including the grading and crashing we hear so much of. It causes more deaths than any other. In fact, it is surpassed only by automobiles and falls. Over 100,000 fires occur every year in the United States. Nearly seventy thousand persons are killed every year in fires that destroy homes.

It is common to say that the majority of fires are caused by carelessness. While carelessness is a factor in permitting fires to start, many of the many existing hazards, so that fires are due to carelessness is a too casual answer to the problem. The word "careless" leaves the impression that there is nothing that can be done, nearly all fires in the home can be prevented. The majority of fires in the home can be traced to four major causes: (1) Improper disposal of rubbish. (2) Defective chimneys. (3) Combustible roofs. (4) Defective heating apparatus, (5) Careless and careless smoking. (6) Improper use of kerosene and kerosene. (7) Defective wirings, and (8) Improper disposal of hot ashes. Rubbish should never be collected

for any length of time and should be burned in a metal container. All chimneys should be built solid from the ground up, not depending for their support on any wooden construction, and they should never be used to support any part of the house itself. No wooden shingles roof will resist taking fire from sparks from chimneys, bonfires, locomotives, or burning buildings. Fire-retardant roofings should be used. Much care should be taken in the placing of stoves and heaters in the home. Metal should be used to protect floors and the wood work. All fireplaces should be protected by substantial screens. Fires should always be looked about before one leaves the house, or before retiring for the night. Matches, by all means, should be kept away from small children. All smokers should cultivate the habit of careful smoking. A liberal supply of ash trays should be provided throughout the house. One should never smoke in a barn or a garage. If anyone values his life, he should never smoke while in bed. Gasoline, kerosene and other flammable liquids should never be taken into the home where there is a great danger of explosion. Gasoline and kerosene should be carefully used while cleaning soiled garments. If a home is to have an effective wiring system, a professional electrician should be the one to do the job. Electric irons should never be left connected during the absence of all the members of the household. New fuses and cords should be used when needed. Hot ashes should never be put in paper or wooden containers, but in metal cans. Rubbish and ashes should never be mixed. Precaution, as to fireworks and candles, should be taken in celebrating holidays such as Christmas, Halloween, July the Fourth, and others.

Every home should be equipped with several fire extinguishers and every member of the family should be able to operate them. When a fire is small it can be put out easily. A rug or a heavy garment will smother a small fire. Such action at the start of the fire may be more effective than the work of the entire fire department. No one should retire for the night without knowing the quickest and the safest way to leave the house. All doors should be closed to retard the spread of possible fire. Everyone should remember to save life before property.

It is hardly possible to estimate the loss of all the municipalities as a result of fire tragedies. All municipal and state governments depend upon taxes as their source of financial support. Every building is a tax-producing entity. When the property burns, the taxes cease. What community can face this problem without defects from the financial standpoint? My community cannot, can yours?

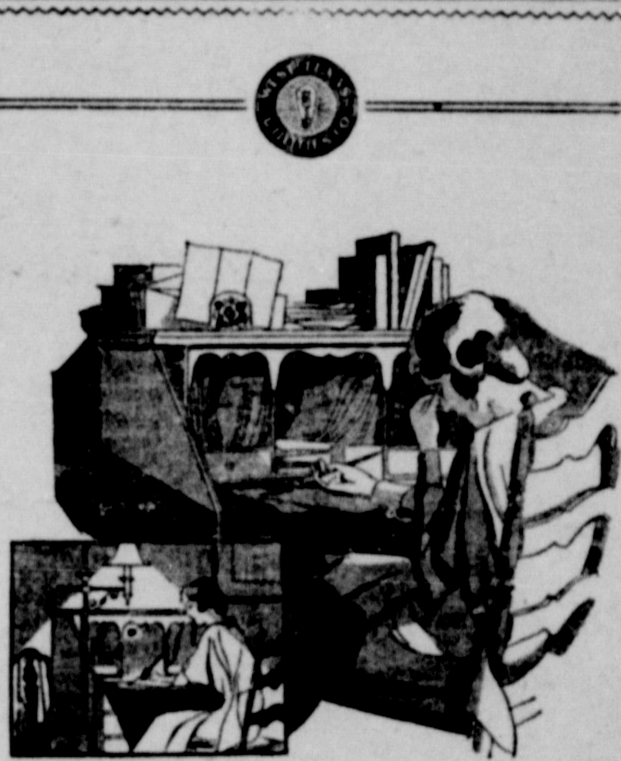
