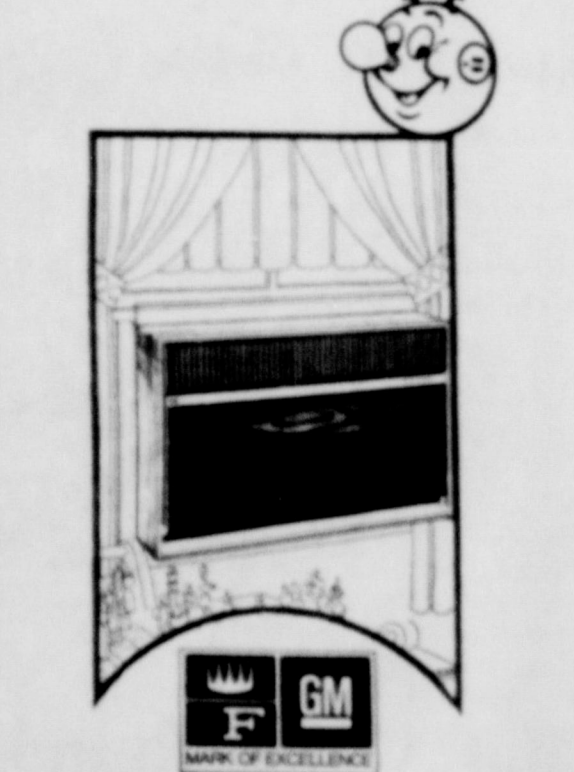

Speakers for the program were Glen Rumley, administrator of the Knox County Hospital and Mrs. Doyle Graham, supervisor of the Brazos Valley Care Home. Mr. Rumley told of the many improvements which have been made to the hospital in recent months, also some of the problems that are now facing the county relating to needs of the hospital, which has been serving this area since 1929. It was the first hospital built in this area and drew patients from several surrounding counties.

Mr. Rumley said that he had been serving hospitals for 22 years and that the Knox County Hospital is the best equipped small hospital he has worked in. He said there is a possibility that another doctor will move here in the near future. Rumley reminded club members that health care today costs more and more each year and it will be necessary to have more income to staff the hospital in the near future. Mrs. Graham spoke on the operation of the Brazos Valley Care Home, which she and her husband supervise. She said the 61-capacity home was filled to capacity at all times with ages of patients ranging from 48 to 97. She also, told of the many

## Citcop 4E, New Corn Fungicide Developed

Citcop 4E, a new corn fungicide developed by Cities Service Company, has been approved by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency for use in 1971. Citcop 4E is being marketed to Midwest corn-growers by Cities Service's Custom Farm Service division, it was announced today. Field tests in Iowa and Indiana in 1970 showed Citcop 4E effectively controlled Southern Leaf Blight infection on the ears. Plots sprayed twice increased yields 23% over unsprayed plots and 10% more than other corn fungicides, Cities Service stated.

Most experts predict that Southern Leaf Blight will again attack in 1971, even though the extent of the attack is debatable. In 1970, Illinois average yield dropped from 98 bushels to acre to 75, it was noted. This almost certainty of attack is predictable since only 22% of the corn will be fully genetically immune in 1971 and

League President Everett J. Grindstaff of Ballinger said the pilot program would be known as the Texas Lions Camp for Diabetic Children. The special summer session - June 7 through June 25 - will be held at the facilities of Camp Manison near Friendswood, between Houston and Galveston, where a diabetic camp has been operated for the past 14 years. The League is the non-profit, charitable organization which represents all the Lions of Texas, Grindstaff said. The diabetic camp represents another important step forward by the Lions of Texas in serving children who require special attention, Grindstaff said. At the home camp in Kerrville, nearly 12,500 blind, deaf, mute and crippled children have enjoyed two weeks of summer fun. ## Effect Of Proposed Farm Truck Driver Regulations Told By Knox County FB

Farmers and ranchers are being urged by Knox County Farm Bureau, to let the federal government know how proposed farm truck driver regulations would affect their operations. Letters should be addressed to John A. Volpe, Secretary, U. S. Dept. of Transportation, Washington, D. C., 20515. Proposed U. S. Dept. of Transportation regulations pertaining to farm truck driver qualifications will become effective on July 1 unless farmers and ranchers can convince the government that they should not be put into effect. The regulations were scheduled for last January 1, but were postponed to permit Farm Bureau and other organizations to study the regulations and file statements. The regulations would affect drivers of all farm trucks - including pickup trucks. Although the new regulations would be applicable to interstate commerce, recent court decisions indicate that the interstate commerce clause applies to anything and everything which might at some time enter interstate commerce. Proposed regulations would include the following requirements for drivers of farm trucks:

- (1) Be at least 21 years of age.
- (2) Carry a certificate, executed by a physician during the preceding 24 months, evidencing fitness to drive a truck.
- (3) Pass a road test in truck operation.
- (4) Take and pass an examination on the federal Motor Vehicle Safety Regulations.
- (5) If driver is employee of farmer, he must supply the farmer with evidence of compliance with the four preceding requirements, plus an application for employment which shall disclose traffic violations and disposition thereof, plus an annual supplementary statement relating to traffic violations.
- (6) A farmer who employs a driver would be required to "verify" the driver's driving record - and to maintain for each driver a file containing items 1 to 5 above, plus a record of the employer's verification of the employee's driving record.

Letters to Secretary Volpe should include the farmer's personal appraisal of how his farm or ranch operation would be affected if the regulations are adopted. The local farm leader urged each farmer in the county to request that present exemptions for farm truck drivers be retained. Also, he said, Congressman Purcell and the two Texas Senators should be contacted and requested to intervene with Secretary Volpe in the matter of retaining present exemptions, or at least in modifying proposed regulations so that they will not be so damaging to agriculture. Farm Bureau is requesting that present exemptions be retained, he said. In the event that this is impossible, the Farm Bureau is asking that the following recommendations be included in any regulations which are issued:

- (1) An exemption for small farm trucks under 10,000 lbs. gross weight. This would include pickups.
- (2) An exemption for local farm hauling.
- (3) Postponement of effective date for six months more.
- (4) A comprehensive educational campaign in news media to let farmers and ranchers know what is about to happen to them.
- (5) General distribution of a summary of the regulations.
- (6) A procedure for development of permanent regulations based on common sense, actual need and good judgement.

The local farm leader said that farm truck drivers have an excellent safety record. In Texas, for example, the amount of bodily injury claims paid per farm truck policy is only one-tenth of the amount of bodily injury claims paid per policy for all non-fleet commercial trucks, he said.



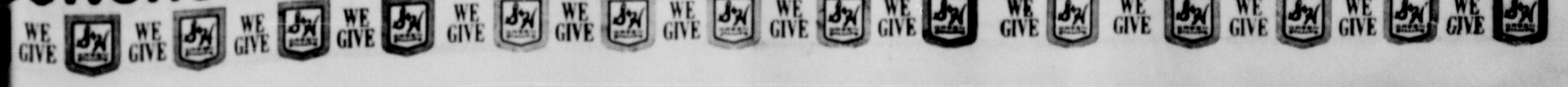

## Science Dept. News

As the school term nears the end, so are the rat labs for the Advanced Biology students. The students had a lab over the respiratory system of the rat this Wednesday.

Studying the lungs, they found the thoracic cavity to be separated into three parts. First the pericardial cavity, into which the heart projects, the right pleural cavity, into which the right lung projects; and the left pleural cavity, into which the left lung projects.

Other parts they observed were the pleura which is the lining of the cavity and the lung. The parietal pleura lines the cavity and the visceral pleura covers the lung. The left lung has three lobes and the right lung has four lobes.

The alveoli are small air sacs within the lung. The lung is attached along its dorsal surface by the pulmonary ligament. Between the two lungs the visceral pleura are in contact forming the mediastinal septum. The mediastinal is the space between the two layers of the mediastinal septum.

The parts of the larynx and trachea observed were the bronchi, bronchioles, glottis, thyroid cartilage, arytenoid cartilages, cricoid cartilage, and false vocal cords.
